COLD STORAGE SPACE FOR GENERAL PUBLIC

Order-in-Council Adds Several New Clauses to the Act

Ottawa, July 7.—An order-in-council has been passed adding several important new sections to the Dominion Cold Storage Act. It is provided that the owners and managers of cold storage warehouses shall give the public the preference in the use of the refrigerated space in such warehouses. It shall be deemed to be a violation of the regulations if the owner of the warehouse refuses to receive goods from the public at the approved rate for storage, on the ground of lack of space, when any part of the space is occupied by goods which are the property of the owners of the warehouses.

Owners and managers must not contract or agree to give all the refrigerated space to one or more firms to the exclusion of the general public.

Owners or managers of cold storage warehouses with whom contracts have been entered into for the payment of subsidies under the Cold Storage Act, and who receive fish for storage shall accept herring at the usual rate, and if delivered in the usual manner, irrespective of whether the herring are to be used for food or for bait.

Every person who violates any of these regulations shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding \$50. The new regulations go into force at once.

BOMB EXPLOSION KILLED FIFTY PERSONS

Six-storey Brick Structure Demolished in New York City

New York, July 7.—A bomb of terrific power exploded either on the roof or on one of the upper floors of a six-storey flat house in Harlem and wrecked a third of the building, killing at least three persons and injured others. One of the dead was Arthur Caron, a machinist, and a leader of the Industrial Workers of the World. The other two known dead were women.

The explosion was at first attributed to dynamiting in a nearby subway excavation and in the excitement on the collapse of the building, estimates of the dead ran as high as fifty.

Inspector Egan, chief of the Bureau of Inspectors, said the bomb was powerful enough to have wrecked the entire neighborhood if properly placed.

Persons across the street were blown from their beds and window glass was shattered for blocks.

Whether any of the occupants of the building were buried in the ruins, it was at first impossible to determine. The police were inclined to believe, however, that three would cover the total dead. The building, a brick structure, was inhabited mostly by Jewish families.

YOUNG BARONET LOSES HIS LIFE

Jumps Overboard Into Thames River When the Women Chaff Him

London, July 7.—A sensation has been created in London society by the tragic outcome of a midnight river party arranged by Sir Denys Anson, the young baronet who a month ago succeeded to the title on the death of his uncle, Sir William Anson, a leading constitutional lawyer and member of Parliament for Oxford.

Young Anson on Thursday engaged a river steambot to take himself and a party of friends up the river from Westminster, which they left at midnight. On the return journey from Kew, about 3 o'clock Friday morning, the host jumped or fell overboard and was drowned. A man named Mitchell, a member of the orchestra which was playing, jumped after Anson and was also drowned. Count Benckendorff, son of the Russian ambassador to London, went overboard in a vain search for the two men.

The facts, according to the best evidence thus far obtainable, appear to be that Sir Denys, a high-spirited youth, full of pranks, wanted to dive into the river from the deck of the boat and was prevented by the captain. Chaffed by some of the women of the party, Anson went to another part of the boat and before the engineer, who noticed his action, could prevent him, dived into the water. He swam a few strokes and suddenly seemed in difficulties. The bandsman, Mitchell, who was a good swimmer, went to the rescue but apparently the current was running too strong for him.
