LINKING UP VANCOUVER WITH MAIN LINE OF G.T.P.

Splendid progress is being made on the construction of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, which will link up the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Prince George with the city of Vancouver.

The Pacific Great Eastern is at the present time operating a suburban train service between North Vancouver Ferry landing at Lonsdale Avenue and Dundarave, West Vancouver, a distance of five miles.

The track on this latter section is now being extended northerly. Grading between the end of track and Lillooet, where the line crosses the Fraser River, one hundred miles north of Vancouver, is practically finished.

The entire balance of the line between Lillooet and Prince George is under contract, and it is expected that a force of 6,000 men will be employed to insure the earliest possible completion of the work.
