PULPITS SHOULD BE OPEN TO WOMEN

Manitoba Methodists Pass Recommendation for General Conference

Winnipeg, Man., July 15.—The Methodist Conference recommended to the general conference the advisability of opening the pulpits of the Methodist Church, this being supported by Prof. Frank Allen, who stated that the Methodist Church might well follow the Roman Catholic Church and the Salvation Army in this respect.

The conference decided to petition Premier Borden to grant half sections of land to aged ministers who have served since 1885 continuously, these half sections to come from crown lands in recognition of the services ministers have rendered as pioneers in the West.

A resolution was passed condemning "the prostitution of politics," and recommending the amendment of the controverted elections act to provide for prosecution in all cases of protest.

The report of the temperance and moral reform committee was adopted. It endorsed direct legislation, the initiative and referendum, compulsory education, the bill brought in by Andrew Broder, M.P., for the suppression of the sale of cigarettes throughout the Dominion, and urged investigation into prison reform. It condemned bilingual schools as a menace to the nation, the permission of gambling on race tracks, commercialized sport, the segregation of vice and announced its belief in one standard of morality. It approved of sex hygiene and purity work among boys done by W. L. Clarke and among girls by Miss Beatrice Briden.

THE "RAINBOW" NEEDED

Many honest citizens have been unable to see the value of the little cruiser, the "Rainbow," which was stationed at Esquimalt under Laurier, and dismantled under Borden. Yet during the past fortnight, the "Rainbow" would have been very valuable to the Canadian Government had it been in commission and well manned.

There are three hundred Hindus on a Japanese ship in Vancouver harbor, whom the Government will not allow to land. The captain of the vessel would like to sail away, but his passengers will not let him. There is no police force which can intervene and restore order, because the "Rainbow" is out of commission, and there is no British cruiser in sight. Hence Canada is in the humiliating position of not being able to preserve law and order within that portion of her territory which lies between the shore-line and the three-mile limit.

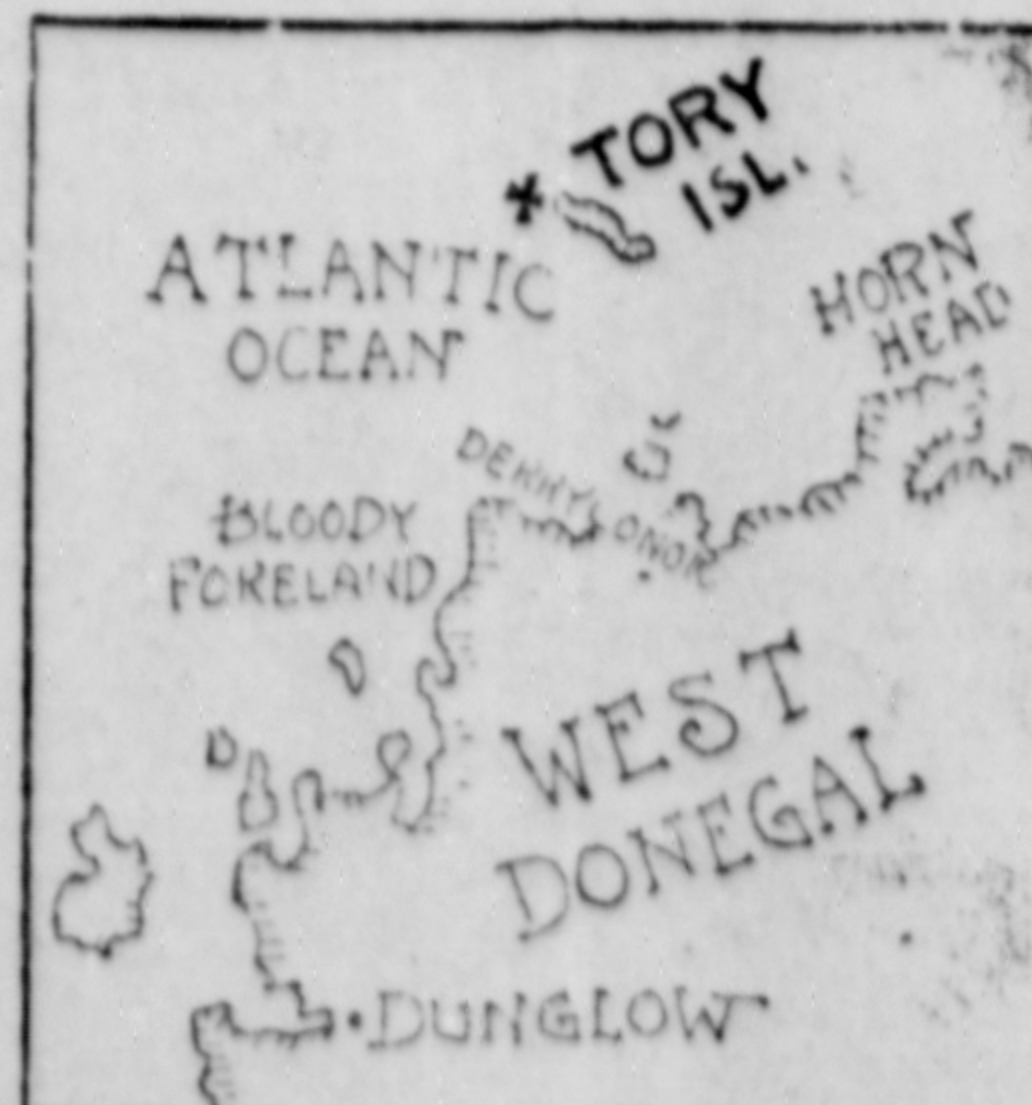
Two Japanese cruisers have arrived. Is Canada to be in the humiliating position of asking the Japanese navy to restore order within Canadian territory?

The situation is one which does small credit to the Canadian parliament and the Canadian people. In their ignorance they could not see the value of cruisers doing police duty along our coasts.

Let us hope that this incident will teach the statesmen at Ottawa to lay aside their petty partisanship and commence to govern Canada on the patriotic basis adopted by the statesmen of other countries.

MANY CANNERIES TO OPERATE THIS YEAR

Eighteen Plants Preparing for the Season on Fraser River

New Westminster, July 15.—Eighteen canneries will operate on the Fraser River this year, although only fifteen cannery licences have been taken out to date. The Glenrose and the St. Mungo are already canning every other day.

The B.C. Cannery will not be opened this year, but a camp will be established for the collection of fish to be delivered to the other canneries controlled by the owners of this concern.

Although the sockeye season officially opened July 1st, very little of the king salmon is expected in the river until about July 20th.

Eighteen hundred Dominion fishing licences have been issued already, although this is an off year. As far as can be ascertained this is a record for a small year, and is only 700 less than issued last year, when the big run in the four-year cycle was due.
