WOMEN ENTANGLE GOVT.

Their Gifts to Suffragette Movement Prevent Prosecution of Offenders

London, July 14.—It is made known that the Government's chief difficulty in proceeding against the militant movement is the police disclosure that the principal subscribers include two peeresses whose husbands are leading supporters of the Government and large subscribers to the party funds. These peeresses subscribed heavily last year when militancy was already in full swing. Another lady, daughter of a foremost British soldier, subscribed \$5,000.

The greatest indignation is expressed at the violent, vulgar abuse of the King at last night's suffragette meeting at Caxton Hall, especially by a well-known London Journalist, H. W. Nevillson. There is no serious suggestion that the King acted otherwise towards the suffragist movement than as a strictly constitutional sovereign.
