



REVENUE STAMPS

To Be Issued for Pre-payment of Duty on Certain Articles

Ottawa, July 25. - Revenue stamps, as a means of paying ! duty in advance on certain articles in the custom tariff, are shortly to be adopted by the customs department. At the last session of parliament, in connection with the budget, the necessary authority was given, and the regulations with respect to their use are now being prepared by the department. The stamps will be available for the payment of duty on periodicals, catalogues and other articles enumerated in item 178 of the tariff.
