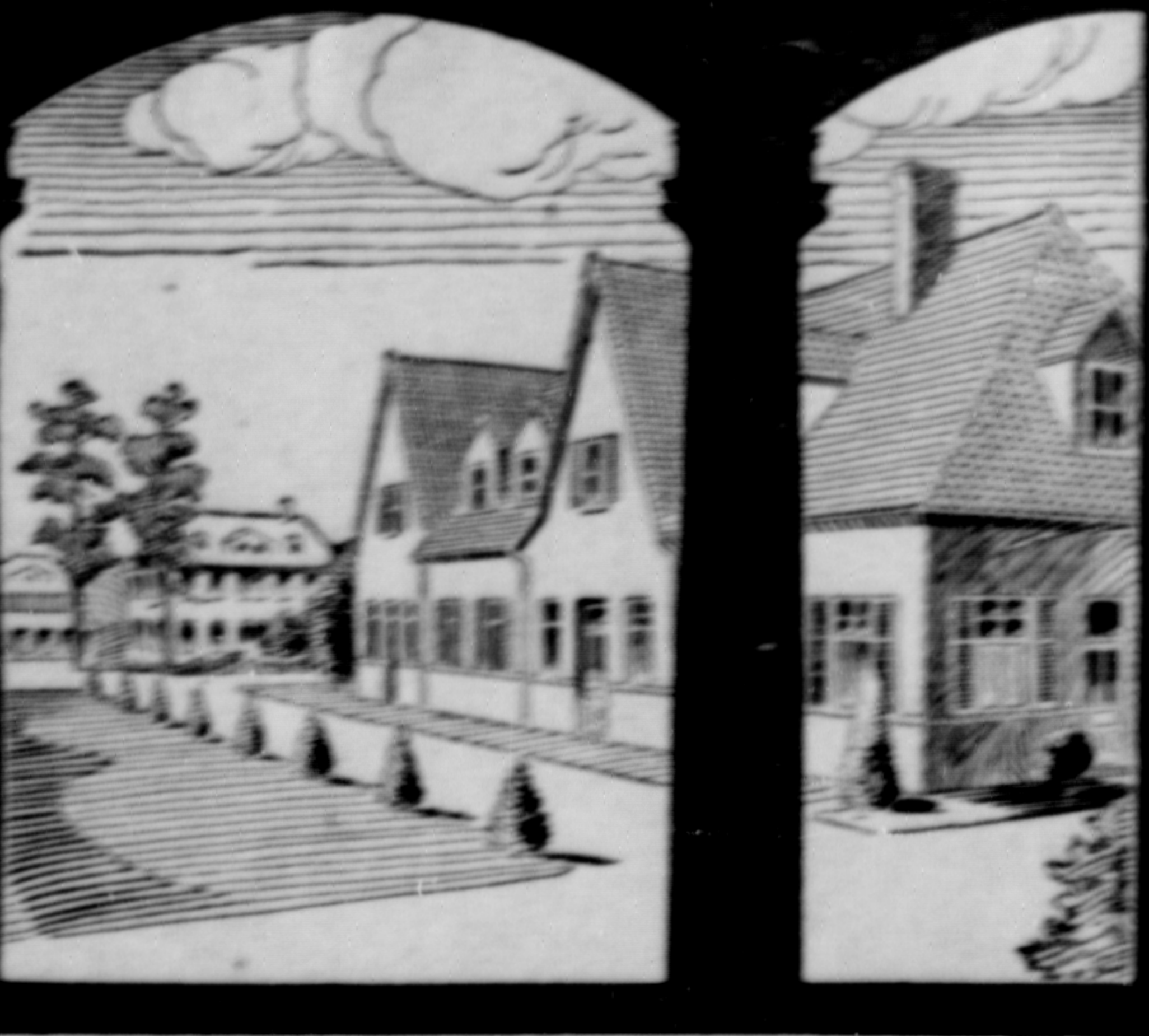

NAVAL DEPARTMENT GOVERNS FISHERIES

In the Future Marine Department Will Only Have Jurisdiction Over Operation of Light-house Service

Vancouver, B.C., July 27.—In future the department having jurisdiction over the establishment and maintenance of light-houses and aids to navigation on the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts of Canada will be known as the Department of Marine, and as the Department of Marine and Fisheries, as heretofore. Information to this effect was received yesterday by Captain George Robertson, agent of the Department of Marine, at Victoria. This means that the fisheries service will now be governed entirely by the Naval Department, and that all the fishery cruisers operating on the Pacific will make their base at Esquimalt and Prince Rupert, under the direction of the naval authorities. As previously reported, the transfer of the fisheries service to the Naval Department was brought about simultaneously with the recent visit of Vice-Admiral Kingsmill to this Coast, on which occasion the head of the naval service made a trip of inspection aboard the cruiser Macaspina to the fishery and lifesaving stations on the British Columbia Coast.

With the transfer of the fisheries service to the Naval Department, the Marine Department will be able to devote its attention solely to the operation of the coastal aids to navigation which in recent years have become very numerous on both the Pacific and the Atlantic.
