If it is necessary to repeat what The News has already said, the following from The Vancouver Daily Province strikes the nail right on the head:—

It will be noticed with great regret that at one or two Conservative ward meetings certain speakers have taken advantage of the European catastrophe to make party capital out of a world's misfortune. This tendency is to be most strongly deprecated. It does absolutely no good to argue now who was right and who was wrong. Our own views on the subject are well known, but it would be stupid to reiterate them at such a time. We Canadians, Liberals and Conservatives, all stand together shoulder to shoulder in this business. If one party has been wrong and the other right this is no time to say so. Moreover the problem could still be argued with perfect justification from both sides of the fence. But at such a time as the present there is only one party in Canada and that is the Dominion party. Liberals and Conservatives may have their domestic differences, and it is an excellent thing for the country that they have such differences. No one desires utter stagnation of political thought. We are quite prepared when occasion offers to pick up the fencing sticks where we dropped them, and will endeavor to make points for whichever side we choose. But now there are no sides, and it

is a great pity that men who speak at meetings, even if they are Conservative ward meetings, cannot refrain from a dig at their opponents. It does the party no good, and does not redound to the credit of the speakers themselves.

The great thing at a time like this is to take a broad view that all party politics have their faults, and all parties make errors. To accuse one party of disloyalty and claim for another that it is the only loyal party is absurd. The tremendous fact is that the whole aspect of Canadian politics have been changed forever by the German challenge. Quebec today is heart and soul with the rest of Canada and for ever will remember that the English-descended peoples of Canada sprung to arms on behalf of a French speaking country. As long as Canada is a nation that great fact will never be forgotten. What it means to us all in the future it is impossible to say. But it is obvious that East and West have been united through this war in a way that nothing else could have accomplished. For that we should all be extremely thankful. It is worth a great sacrifice, and while we may be called upon to make that great sacrifice we should do so as one man and not as half a dozen petty politicians quarrelling as to whether one was right or the other wrong. We sincerely trust there will be no need to call attention to such a thing again.

DECIDE TO HOLD FAIR BUT REDUCE EXPENSES

Prize List Will Be Cut Down, Donations Cut Out, But Fair Will Go On

The Directors of the N. B. C. A. & I. Association met on Saturday to decide whether it would be possible to hold the Exhibition in view of the present financial stringency and the European situation.

Very careful estimates had been prepared which showed a necessary expenditure of \$14,483 in order to carry out the complete programme. Some of the large donations had been cut down to one quarter of what they were last year. The representatives of the farming districts had made strong recommendations that the Exhibition should not be cancelled for this year.

The only alternative was to cut out sufficient classes to bring about the necessary saving.

After very careful consideration the directors decided to cut out the following classes: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 15, 22, 23. Sections 3, 4, 5 in Class 25, 28, 33, 34, 35, except sections 28 to 38, and Class 36.

The school prizes will be cut in half.

The decoration will be reduced to a minimum.

All other expenses will be reduced as far as possible.

CAN. GENERAL ELECTRIC TO RAISE AND EQUIP CORPS

The Board of Directors of the Canadian General Electric Company, after full consideration, and having regard to the present serious situation, have resolved to submit to the Dominion Government an offer to raise, equip and pay the salaries of a company of twenty-five skilled electrical and mechanical operatives, who would be available for service in any part of the Dominion, under control of the Minister of Militia as part of the Canadian Forces. Their services may be utilized in the erection, repair and maintenance of wireless telegraph stations, cable stations, bridges, transport vehicles, artillery, etc.

GOOD COMEDY PICTURES AT THE WESTHOLME

BELLA COOLA NOTES

L. Calnan, who has been resident in the town for the last year left for his home in Essex, England, on Sunday last. Mr. Calnan always took a prominent part in public matters at this place and will be missed by his friends.

Having regard to the seriousness of the situation in Europe at the present time, the local Liberal party decided to postpone the political meetings which were advertised to take place during the past week. Mr. T. L. Pattullo, of Prince Rupert, has kindly promised to visit us at some more appropriate time in the future.

A. C. Christensen and J. Oien returned from the interior on Monday evening, bringing with them a bunch of young cattle and a number of horses which they intend taking to their ranch at Takush Harbor. Arrangements have been made for the shipping of the stock by the S.S. Camosun on Sunday next.

Mr. Frank Hagan is in charge of extensive improvements to the Mackenzie School and grounds, which will shortly present a very altered appearance.

Constable Broughton left town early in the week for Kimsquit to investigate an affair in which it is alleged a white man fired a shot at a Jap fisherman, the bullet passing through the sou-wester worn by the Jap at the time. From information to hand it would appear that the white man had become incensed at the Jap whom he claimed was repeatedly throwing out his net so as to completely blanket his (the white man's) net, thus taking an unfair advantage. The Jap when fired upon, having no rifle in his boat, made no effort to retaliate.

Capt. Thorson is busily engaged on the construction of a large scow which is to be used by a local cattle-ranching syndicate to transport cattle to a new ranch which is to be operated at the head of South Bentinck Arm.

T. Sleigh arrived down from Salmon River on Monday and will leave for the south on the next steamer.

A large party including Messrs. W. Gross, H. S. Sinclair, Capt. Stephenson and W. Whitehead left town last Sunday for the hot springs on Dean Channel.

Both canneries at Kimsquit are still engaged on sockeye pack. The Kimsquit cannery has to date a pack of 7,500 cases of sockeye and the Manitou some 5,500 cases.

The remains of the leg encased in a cruiser's high-boot found by a fisherman on the beach close to the mouth of the Salmon River at Kimsquit, has been identified as belonging to the late E. S. Bennett, who met his death by drowning in the Salmon River on 4th of July, 1913.

a small gang repairing some bridges on the trail in the Upper Valley.

Orville Robinson returned from Vancouver by the last Camosun, bringing with him a fine work-horse. He expects to move up to his ranch at Nootsatum in the near future.
