The regular meeting and First

recommendation was adopted by
the Council.

pleaded guilty and will be sen-
tenced today. The four witnesses
were allowed to return north on
the May.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

The number of pupils enrolled
on the High School register for
the opening term is twenty-two.
The students are divided into
three grades, intermediate, junior
advanced and preliminary junior.
Eight new pupils were enrolled
for the first time, six being from
the local public school, one from
private study, and one from an
outside district.

The High School will continue
at the town hall until the new
school premises are ready for the
reception of pupils which will
probably be in a few weeks. Of
the twenty-two pupils enrolled,
nine are boys and thirteen are
girls. Mr. J. C. Brady is princi-
pal.

Alderman-Retail-Merchant
Opposed It To the
End

When the city engineer re-
ported recommending to the City
Council that the best site for the
market building was at the foot
of the midway stairs on Fifth St.,
Ald. Morrissey objected to the ex-
penditure of \$1,200 on the build-
ing. He urged economy and hint-
ed that the city would probably
fall down on selling some of their
local improvement debentures,
and be generally short of cash be-
fore the end of the year.

The rest of the aldermen, how-
ever, want the market, and in ad-
dition to approving the site they
ordered the city engineer to pro-
ceed with the erection of the
building.

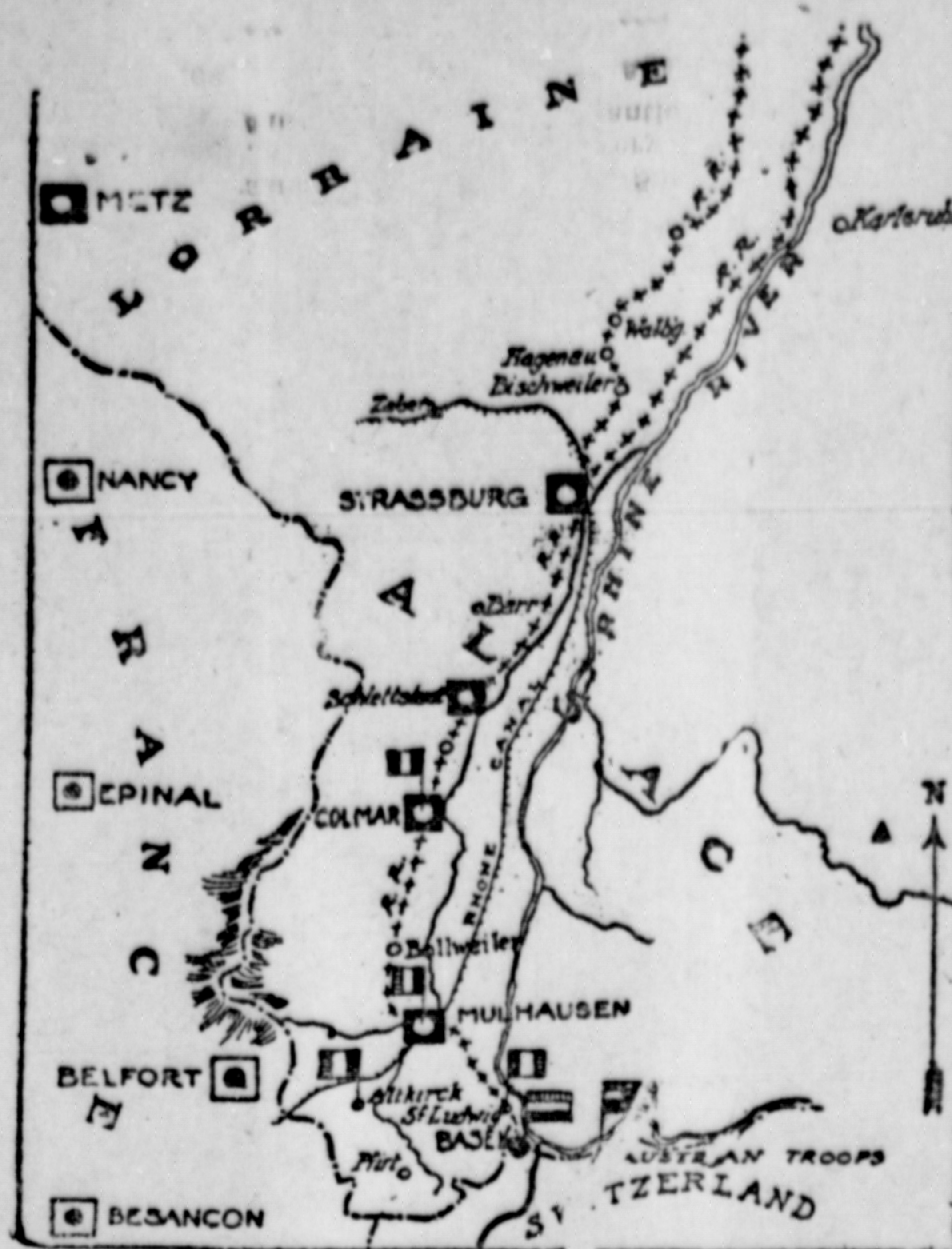
RIDLEY HOME TRUSTEES

This map shows how the Russians are invading Austrian Galicia from Rovno, and the Austrians are invading Russian Poland from Gracow. There is reason to think that a German army is already in Warsaw and that Russian Poland is for the present almost completely in the hands of the invaders. Many Ruthenians and other foreign immigrants have come to Canada from Austrian Galicia.

\$4,000 FOR FEES
WARK CHANNEL POWER

The Wark Channel water pow-
er came up before the City Coun-
cil in a new form last evening.

The Mayor presented a bill for
something over \$4,000 from the
Provincial Government; \$2,000 is
for staking fees, and \$2,000 for
annual rental. The latter is ap-
plicable on the price per horse
power charged by the Govern-
ment when the power is actually
put into use.

The Mayor said the water
power had been re-staked and
urged the fees be paid.

The Council passed a motion to
pay the fees.

There is no appropriation for
this amount in the estimates. It
will be taken out of the surplus.
