RUSSIANS ATTACK BRESLAU--GERMAN LINE IS CUT

END OF THE WAR HAS TURNED TIME TO DRIVE INVADERS BACK

KITCHENER NOW HAS OVER 60,000 EAST INDIAN TROOPS IN THE BATTLE LINE--FRENCH GOVERNMENT WILL SOON RETURN TO PARIS.

KING GEORGE REJOICES COLONIES WITH HIM IN FIGHT

London, Sept. 9.—King George has sent a message to the British colonies rejoicing that every part of the Empire is with him in the decision to confront and overthrow the unparalleled assault in continuity of civilization and the peace of mankind. The conflict was not of his seeking and his voice is for peace but he could not sacrifice his honor when Belgian soil was violated and the French national life threatened with extinction.

MAUBEUGE FORTS STILL HOLDING OUT SAYS WAR OFFICE

Paris, Sept. 10.—A supplementary statement issued in Bordeaux by Minister of War Milleran, telegraphed here, read as follows: "Another big battle is in progress, stretching from the outskirts of Paris to the eastern frontier. The German attack on our right weakened for the first time. The French left is advancing. The troops defending Paris engaged with the Germans near the River Oureq and were victorious. The defence of Maubeuge continues heroically against heavy siege guns."

CZAR PROMISES TO TAKE BERLIN

Petrograd, Sept. 9.—The Czar declared today he would go to Berlin if it took his last journey. He informed the Japanese ambassador that he would do his best to have the Japanese and Russians fighting side by side.

FRENCH GENERAL WOUNDED BY SHELL

Bordeaux, Sept. 9.—General Exelmans, the famous French cavalry leader, was seriously wounded while fighting west of Paris. He was leading a division charge upon the German artillery, when a shell burst near him, a fragment striking him in the back. He was also shot in the leg.

GERMAN SQUADRON UP IN THE BALTIC

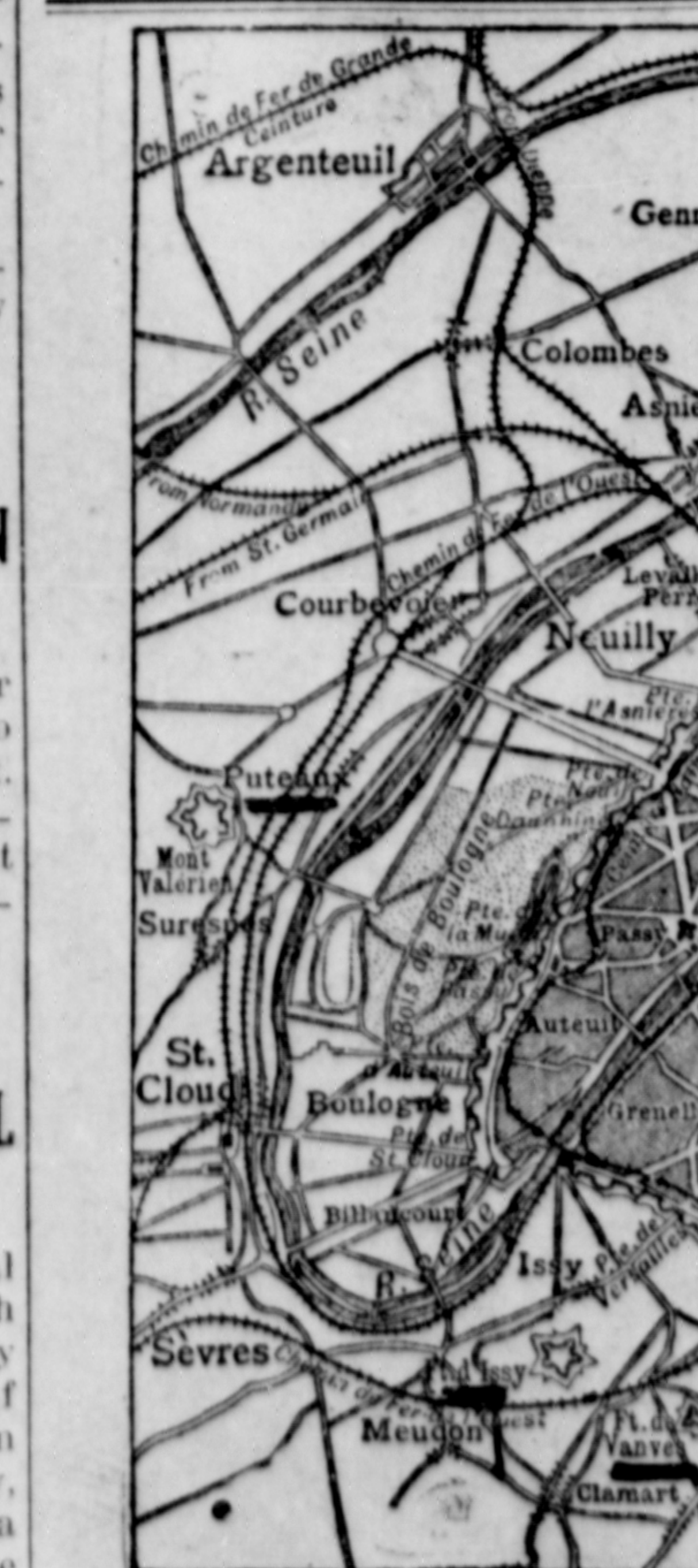

London, Sept. 10.—A German squadron of 31 ships, including battleships, cruisers and destroyers, has been observed along the Gulf of Bothnia steaming east. They may purpose bombarding some seaports in Finland.

FRENCH REPORT MAKING PROGRESS

Washington, D. C., Sept. 10.—The French embassy states that the German right wing has been withdrawn north of Petit Morin and has been sharply checked on the right bank of the River Oureq. Our troops are making progress at Sezanne. The situation is favorable in Vosges and at Nancy. Harp fighting has been going on in the center with alternative progress and recession.

ALLIES WINNING ALL ALONG LINE BOTH EAST AND WEST

Bordeaux, Sept. 10.—Official reports state that the British army has crossed the Marne. The Germans have fallen back 25 miles. The efforts of the Germans to break the French lines at Oureq are likewise officially reported to have failed. The Germans are short of ammunition at the front, and are having difficulties in provisioning. The French Department of War announced that the Germans appear to be beginning a movement of retreat. The Russian-Austrian armies continue to oppose each other in a long drawn out engagement in the Lublin district. An official statement issued at Petrograd declares that both Austrian and German troops were dislodged from their fortified positions and retired towards the south.



THE FORTIFICATIONS OF THE FRENCH CAPITAL.
Paris is very strongly fortified and a shell could not be fired by an army beyond the outer fortifications to the city proper. It is believed that the city could hold out for at least six months. Not all the forts are shown on the map. Around the outer ones, particularly Fort Mont Valerien, buildings and trees are now being leveled in preparation for a siege.

NO PEACE MADE TILL GERMANY IS DECISIVELY BEATEN

Washington, D. C., Sept. 10.—Ambassador Page, at London, informs President Wilson that Great Britain is determined not to make peace until she has decisively defeated Germany. Great Britain and France and Spain and China have agreed to sign peace commission treaties with the United States to prevent the latter suddenly being drawn into the conflict. Germany, Russia and Japan have accepted the principles of the treaties and Greece and Turkey are about to sign.

ASQUITH ASKS FOR HALF MILLION MEN

London, Sept. 10.—Premier Asquith today asked Parliament to add another half million men of all ranks to the regular army.

JAPAN SIGNS ALLIES' AGREEMENT

Petrograd, Sept. 10.—Tokio dispatches state that Japan has signed the agreement of the Allies not to conclude peace without the consent of the Allies. Japan will not make a peace with Germany until the war in Europe is over.

GENERAL FRENCH SENDS IN REPORT

London, Sept. 10.—General French has sent in a lengthy report of the British operations since the troops went to France. Lord Kitchener has made it public.

EAST INDIANS POTENTATES ARE FIGHTING FOR EMPIRE

London, Sept. 10.—It was announced in the House of Commons last night that the rulers of the native states in India, numbering nearly seven hundred in all, are with one accord rallied to the defence of the Empire. They offered their personal services and the resources of their states for the war. From among those who volunteered for active service the Viceroy selected the chiefs of Jodhpur, Bikaner, Kisanghar, Rutlam, Sachin, Patiala, Sir Pertab Singh, regent of Jodhpur, their apparent of Bhopal, the brother of the Maharajah of Cochin, together with other Cadeb notable families. The veteran Sir Pertab was not denied the right to fight for the King and Emperor despite his 70 years. His nephew, the Maharajah, is but 16, and goes with him. Large numbers of troops and gifts of money were made.

BRITISH DRIVE GERMANS BACK TWENTY-FIVE MILES

HAVE ENEMY IN FULL RETREAT — GERMANY RUSHING REINFORCEMENTS FROM BELGIUM.

London, Sept. 10.—German reinforcements, including reservists and 40,000 sailors, are now being rushed through Belgium to the support of the Kaiser's right wing, which the British have pushed back some 25 miles. This right wing is now in full retreat.

RUSSIANS NOW ON TO BERLIN CAPTURE BRESLAU IMMINENT

ARCHDUKE FREDERICK LOST ONE-QUARTER OF HIS AUSTRIAN ARMY — RUSSIANS WINNING STEADILY.

London, Sept. 10.—Dispatches from Vienna state that the advance guard of the Russian center is now marching toward Berlin. The Russian troops have invaded Silesia and the capture of Breslau is imminent. According to the Galician advices, the Austrians have made several attempts to resume the offensive against the Russians, with disastrous effects. There were further great Austrian losses. A message from Vienna officially admits that Archduke Ferdinand lost 120,000 men in the recent Galician battle. This was one-fourth of his whole command. The German forces are marching south towards Poland to aid the Austrians but the Russians are prepared to check them at the Vistula River.

BRITISH CRUISER MAKES GOOD CAPTURE

London, Sept. 10.—The Holland-American liner Noordam, bound for Rotterdam from New York with German reservists and a general cargo destined for Germany, was captured in the Atlantic and brought to Queens-towns by a British cruiser.

OFFENSIVE TACTICS OF ALLIES FORCING GERMANS BACK

London, Sept. 10.—The last reports from the French government indicate that the offensive tactics undertaken during the last day of two by the allied armies have had the effect of forcing the Germans back at various points on the battle line, which extends from a few miles east of Paris to Verdun, a distance of 200 miles.

AUSTRIANS ARE READY TO SUE FOR PEACE TO SAVE EMPIRE

BELIEVED IN DIPLOMATIC CIRCLES THAT AUSTRIA MUST DO SOMETHING WITHIN FIFTEEN DAYS.

Bordeaux, Sept. 10.—A well informed opinion believes that Austria is in a desperate plight, viewing matters from a military, political and financial point of view. A telegram from Petrograd says that at both Russian and foreign diplomatic quarters it is believed the Vienna government have to sue for peace within fifteen days. This is the only means Austrians have left of keeping from a complete breaking up of the Empire.

AUSTRIA READY TO SUE FOR PEACE
