DAY GROWS BRIGHER FOR BRITISH LABOR

Number of Persons Seeking Employment at Labor Bureaus Actually Has Fallen Off.

London, Sept. 17.—A return issued by the Board of Trade shows that the growth of unemployment has virtually stopped. In the trades were insurance against unemployment is enforced the percentage of unemployment is 6.24—almost exactly the same as last week, and compares with 3.34 last year.

The number of persons seeking employment at labor bureaus actually has fallen off, but is still about double what it was a year ago. Recruiting, which is proceeding at an amazing rate, accounts somewhat for this, particularly in the north and in the mining districts. Recruits are applying in such numbers that at some places it has been decided to close the recruiting offices for a week.

Prices of food show little change, and this is due more to increased freight and insurance rates than to a shortage of supplies. Meat and fish are arriving in almost normal quantities.

The saloons of London are closed hours earlier than usual. At Hull, Chatham and other places, where many sailors are congregated, they have been closed entirely, while in other provincial towns the hours for remaining open have been reduced.

FORCED ENGINEERS TO BRING HER TO PORT

German Vessel Seized in Orient Has Reached Port After Difficulties.

Shanghai, Sept. 17.—Hongkong reports the arrival there of a number of prizes, including the American steamers Hanamet, and the German steamers Paklat, Frisia and Rajaburi.

The prize court of the Paklat held the German engineers at work for three days at the point of revolvers and frustrated an attempt to disable the engines. The American steamer Hanamet is 2,703 tons burden, and is owned by W. K. Atz, of Shanghai. The Paklat and the Rajaburi are owned by the North German Lloyd, the former being of 1,227 tons burden, and the Rajaburi 1,189 tons. The Frisia is a ship of 3,150 tons.

Both the Hanamet and the Frisia have previously been reported as having been seized. The Hanamet is suspected of carrying contraband. Her owner has appealed to the American consul at Shanghai for indemnification.

ATTACKING AERSCHOT.

Germans Bring Up Reinforcements to Recapture Town.

London, Sept. 16.—The capture of Aerschot by Belgians, says an Antwerp dispatch to the Daily Mail, seems to have enraged the Germans, who are hurrying up reinforcements to recapture it and are burning everything on their way.

Aerschot has been evacuated again by the Belgians, who have taken the residents of the town with them, as well as the residents of the surrounding villages. An engagement is still in progress on a line fronting along Aerschot, Louvain and Vilvorde.

C. P. R.'S FINE FLEET IS NOW ALL GONE

Admiralty Has Taken Over the India and Montague, the Last on Run.

Vancouver, Sept. 17.—"C. P. R. 100," an old coal hulk here, is all that remains to represent the C. P. R.'s fine transpacific service. Local offices of the company have been informed that the British Admiralty has now taken over the Empress of India and the Montague for naval purposes. The coal hulk Melanhope has also been taken over by the Admiralty and is now at Esquimalt. Some time ago the naval authorities took the fine Empress boats, the Russia and Asia, and also obtained the Empress of Japan for Admiralty service.

Of the five ships making up the company's transpacific fleet not a single one is left to maintain the schedule between the Orient and Vancouver with the result that unless the C. P. R. can charter steamships it must practically drop its service for the present time. There is a possibility that boats could be chartered. Officials of the company here stated, however, that they could give no definite information on that point as they had only been notified that they were to lose the Montague and the Empress of India. Both boats are now on the Chinese coast.

C. N. R. GETS ONE-TENTH OF THE DAMAGES ASKED

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—The decision of the Exchequer Court in the C. N. R. land damage case in St. Boniface has been announced. The Exchequer Court finds for the government on all the points of law at issue, and the damages accorded are only one-tenth of those claimed.

The case arose over the entrance of the transcontinental road into Winnipeg. The line selected and constructed passed through the Canadian Northern property in St. Boniface. Owing to the elevation of the C. N. R. tracks enormous damages were claimed, amounting to nearly \$6,000,000. These were tried in the Exchequer Court. The court awards the Canadian Northern about \$600,000 instead of the \$6,000,000 claimed.
