**VANCOUVER HAS DISLOYALTY CASE**

Several Telegrams on Subject Received by the Vancouver Board of Trade.

Vancouver, Sept. 17.—A meeting of the council of the Board of Trade was held here to investigate the charges of using seditious and unpatriotic remarks preferred against Mr. T. A. Fee, a member of the Board of Trade, by Mr. F. W. Rounsefell, another member. In this connection Mr. A. M. Verchere, president of the Mission City Board of Trade, has wired to Secretary Blair, of the Vancouver board, as follows: "This board strongly resents the expression of disloyalty to the British Empire by Mr. T. A. Fee in the Vancouver press and trusts that the Vancouver Board of Trade will take drastic and decisive action against him in the matter."

Mr. C. C. Delbridge, of Vancouver, who is now in the prairie provinces on business, sent the following wire from Marquette, Man.: "T. A. Fee, when requested by me to donate a horse to the government, in the presence of John McPhail, said: 'I am with the Germans. They are good citizens. I would not consider giving my horse for such a cause'."
