ITALIAN SOCIALISTS
DISCUSS NEUTRALITY

Do Not Wish Italy's Stand to
Bring Profit to Dual
Alliance.

Paris, Sept. 18.—A Havas dis-
patch from Rome says:
"The Union of Socialists of
Rome today ended its discussion
of the international situation and
the intervention of Italy by the
adoption of a resolution which
states in the beginning that re-
ciprocally action by Socialists of
all countries against imperialism
and armed peace had failed, and
that, through the fault of the
powerful German and Austrian
Socialist parties in not sufficient-
ly opposing armaments, the Bel-
gian and French Socialists had
been compelled to fight in de-
fence of their countries."
"A victory of the military and
the aristocracy in the two cen-
tral empires, the resolution con-
tinues, 'would subject Europe to
a most reactionary and military
supremacy.'
"The neutrality of Italy de-
sired by the proletariat,' it says fur-
ther, 'means an ardent desire to
see the strife engendered in the
two empires turned against its
authors and the wish of the pro-
letariat to profit from the presnt
situation to affirm an alliance of
free people.'
"The union invites the work-
ing people to see to it that Italy's
neutrality is not allowed to bring
profit to the two empires."

WELSH VERSUS RITCHIE
ON THANKSGIVING DAY

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—Fred-
die Welsh, lightweight champion,
may meet Willie Ritchie here in
a 20-round contest on Thanks-
giving Day, November 30. Jim
Goffroth is trying to close the
match, and is now in communica-
tion with the Britisher. Ritchie
has already signified his willing-
ness to accept the match, which is
taken to mean that Goffroth's
terms are satisfactory. Welsh is
in the East and according to pre-
sent plans has accepted an extend-
ed engagement in vaudeville.
George Chip has gone to Los
Angeles for a ten-days' visit and
upon his return will immediat-
ly start training for his 20-round
contest with Billy Murray, which
has been set for the night of Sep-
tember 30 at Goffroth's Arena.

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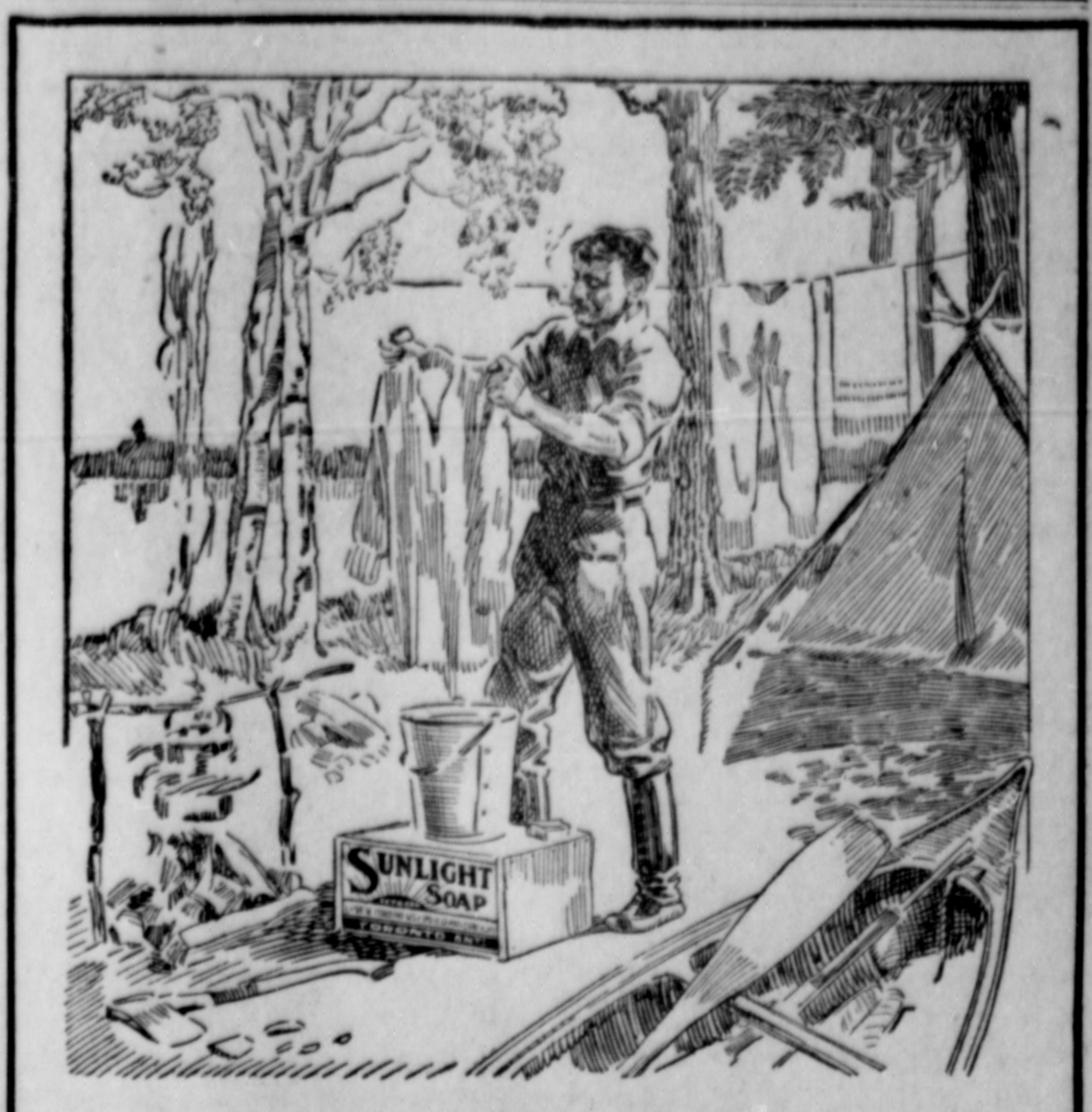

NEW PRIVATE SECRETARY.

Position in Premier's Office Is
Filled by Appointment of Mr.
R. E. Gosnell.

Sir Richard McBride has au-
thorized the announcement that
the position of private secretary
in the premier's office had been
filled by the appointment of Mr.
R. E. Gosnell. Those who have
volunteered their willingness to
serve in this capacity, and others
who may be disposed to do so,
are asked to regard this as an
intimation that their services will
not be required.
That Mr. Gosnell is eminently
well qualified for the position to
which he has just been appointed
is, of course, well known. He was
the premier's first secretary, tak-
ing that office in 1903, previously
having occupied the same post
under five premiers. For many
years he has been the trusted ser-
vant of the government in many
important departmental matters.
Than Mr. Gosnell no one in the
province has a greater knowl-
edge of conditions in British Co-
lumbia and the problems bearing
upon its development. Mr. Gos-
nell has already entered upon his
duties.
First Grain Rush of Season.
Duluth, Minn., Sept. 18.—Grain
men here estimate that 2,500,000
bushels of grain will have clear-
ed local elevators in the past 48
hours. This is the first real rush
of the season. These figures
