CANADIAN VOLUNTEERS MUST EXPECT HARDER TASKS THAN PARADES

Col. Sam Hughes Says That Contingent at Valcartier Is Now Through With Reviews.

Valcartier, Sept. 21.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, last week, for the second time, reviewed the troops at Valcartier. Twenty thousand men passed by in half battalions, marching with the step of veterans. "I am more than proud of them," said Colonel Hughes, after the review, "but they have had enough of this work," he added. "They are not going across to march only. They must now put in all their time shooting and learning field movements for the active service which they must face." One feature of the review was that it was witnessed by General Crozier, of the United States army. His visit was an official one and it was taken to indicate a sympathetic feeling of the government of the United States toward the Allies.

During the parade, Lieut.-Col. E. G. Shannon, of Prince Albert, Sask., a member of the 105 Winnipeg Light Infantry, was thrown from his horse and sustained a fractured arm. He was removed to a military hospital at Quebec. Excitement was caused early in the evening by a fire which destroyed the moving picture show on the grounds. The owner, it is stated, had been overcharging the men, and has not changed his program since opening and it is thought that the fire was of incendiary origin.

IMPORTANCE PROVINCE TAKEN BY RUSSIA

Galicia, which the Russian army has invaded and overrun, is the largest province of Austria, bounded on the north and east by Russia and separated from Hungary on the south by the Carpathian mountains; on the west it is bounded by the province of Moravia, and on the southeast by the province of Bukovina. Long winters, with an abundant snowfall, short and wet springs, hot summers and long and steady autumns, give it the severest climate in Austria. Its principal agricultural products are barley, oats, rye, wheat, maize and leguminous plants, and its minerals are salt, coal, petroleum, zinc and sulphur. In 1910 the province had a population of 8,022,156. On the first partition of Poland, in 1772, Galicia came to Austria; in 1795 West Galicia was added to the district, and the further addition of Cracow was made in 1864.
