FRONTAL ATTACK MUST RESULT IN A DEADLOCK

THIS IS THE OPINION OF MILITARY EXPERTS IN FRANCE AND BRITAIN—BELIEF THAT EXTENSIVE FLANKING MOVEMENT ON THE AISNE WILL BE NECESSARY.

London, Sept. 24.—The great battle of the Aisne still hangs in the balance. Never before has the world known a struggle so fierce, so prolonged, so hideous. Even Mukden sinks into insignificance compared with it. Since Monday week, when Von Kluck flung his army into a prepared position behind the River Aisne with the Oise to his right, the fight has continued without intermission. An official photograph issued by the government shows the amazing natural strength of the German front. Gradually sloping hills rising from the river bank, quarries and woods present an ideal defensive terrain, making outflanking difficult, and rendering a frontal attack hideously costly. The Germans in the beginning had an advantage of the superior range of their heavy artillery, which did terrible execution. This has now been nearly counterbalanced, the French having brought their heavy guns forward. The British and French aeronauts are now successfully disputing with the Taubes the mastery of the air, and both sides are entrenching like ants on an earth heap. Attack and counter attacks are made with absolute regardlessness of life. We dare scarcely imagine the extent of the losses, which excel anything known before in the history of the world. The fighting goes on in a continuous rain, and often the trenches are knee-deep in water. The last ounce of manhood on either side is being tested, and both are pouring up reinforcements and employing all possible forces. The Journal des Debats in a

significant review of the situation, suggests that the progress of the Allies must largely depend upon menacing the enemy's communications. This is the general view here, experts believing that frontal attacks by either side, such as are now proceeding along the main line, must almost necessarily mean, with approximately equal forces, a final deadlock. A wider flanking move on either side may early revolutionize the situation.

"Within six months Sir John French will have half a million men under his command, and within a year a million. If he wants more he shall have them," says The Daily News. The views of former British pacifists on the German peace suggestions are shown by the statement of Mr. H. W. Massington, who led the opposition at the commencement of the war.

"The most tremendous machinery of war ever fashioned by man's hand," he says, "has torn its way through two thickly populated countries, leaving behind a trail of fire, ruin and indiscriminate pillage. It has violated the entire spirit and much of the letter of The Hague Convention, mixing soldiers and civilians in its vengeance, and tearing up some of the oldest and most beautiful landmarks of the earlier life of man. As Mr. David Lloyd George said in his wonderful speech, it has left an ineffaceable mark of harshness and coldly cruel purpose, pivoting on a deliberate plan of terror, on the state of life in Europe. Human nature is not equal to making peace with so alert and so formidable a foe."

President E. J. Chamberlin, accompanied by J. E. Dalrymple, W. P. Hinton and A. E. Rosvear, are reported to have reached Fort George last night en route to the Coast. They will likely arrive here tonight or tomorrow forenoon.

It is reported that Mr. W. P. Hinton, assistant passenger and traffic manager for the G. T. P. at Winnipeg, will shortly be promoted to a similar position in Montreal.

Mr. A. E. Rosvear, who is accompanying President Chamberlin to the Coast, is in supreme command of the freight rates of

the company and all negotiations along that line will have to be conducted with him. Mr. Rosvear receives his appointment direct from the board of directors so that he is independent even of the president.

From all reports it would appear that there will be a goodly number of visitors to the fair from the Interior along the G. T. P. Visitors to the Telkwa fair say that everybody is speaking along that line. Special efforts should therefore be made to give them a good time.

Mr. A. J. Prudhomme has just returned from a trip to the Telkwa fair. He reports that the exhibition given this year was very favorable indeed. The chief lines were live stock, agricultural products and minerals. With the exception of the live stock, the same exhibits will be shown at the Prince Rupert fair.

SHACKELTON EXPEDITION STARTS SOUTH

Gallant Explorers Propose to Cross Antarctic Continent From Shore to Shore.

London, Sept. 24.—Sir Ernest Shackleton and members of his trans-Antarctic expedition left London Saturday in two sections for the South Polar region. One party, headed by Sir Ernest Shackleton, departed for South America; the other half of the expedition left for Ross Sea, on the New Zealand side of the Antarctic by way of Tasmania.

Sir Ernest hopes to meet the Ross Sea contingent in April of next year, or, failing in that, by March of 1916.

The Shackleton section will have seventy dogs and also motor sledges. The other party will have twenty-six dogs. One great difficulty that confronted the expedition was the lack of scientific instruments. These had been ordered in Germany, but had not been delivered because of the war, and it was necessary to replace them in England.

The Ross Sea party will board the exploration ship Aurora at Hobartstown, Tasmania. Sir Ernest hopes to leave Buenos Ayres October 18 by the ship Endurance, which is now en route to South America.

CANADA WILL MAINTAIN ARMY OF FORTY THOUSAND

Next Complement for Europe Will Consist of Cavalry and Three Infantry Brigades.

Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The Canadian army division is being equipped for two years' service, the view taken by the authorities here being that the campaign will be a lengthy one.

As the expectation of the war office is that Canada will keep 40,000 men in the field, and the Canadian government will act in accordance with the view of the Imperial authorities, it is probable that the proposal to send a second army division to the front will be reconsidered. There is in war, 60 per cent loss through casualties, illness, etc., and so, in order to maintain the force at its strength of 40,000 men, more will have to be sent from time to time.

It will be January before the next troops leave for the front, and, as Valcartier is impossible as a winter camp, they will be mobilized at various points. The next troops will be composed of a cavalry brigade of 1,700 and three infantry brigades of 12,000, which, with army service corps, etc., will total 15,000 and bring the strength of the Canadian force up to 40,000. It is certain that in future enlistment greater attention will be paid to mounted infantry.

Major Garnet B. Hughes, son of Hon. Colonel Sam Hughes, has been gazetted lieutenant-colonel in the Canadian militia. He is going with the Canadian expeditionary force as commander of a company.
