NEWS NOTES ABOUT THE FAIR

Hon. Dr. Young, Provincial Secretary, will open the Exhibition at 1 o'clock sharp on Wednesday, September 30.

Children will be allowed in the Exhibition free on Thursday, October 1. Other days children will be charged 10 cents.

Excellent tea rooms are being arranged on the balcony under the auspices of the Red Cross Society. Mrs. Besner has made arrangements to accommodate a large number of people for teas and light luncheons.

There will be a smoking room and writing room reserved for members of the association at the end of the building on the ground floor. There will also be an enclosure and writing room reserved for lady members on the balcony.

There will be an information bureau and cloak room on the ground floor. Parcels, coats and umbrellas can be left, free of charge, if checked by the official in charge.

Mr. Clayton, of the cold storage has very kindly consented to lend his two little bears for the days of the Exhibition. Arrangements are being made for their accommodation in the main building.

There will be a free telephone for the use of visitors. This will be found at the Information Bureau.

There will be a letter box provided outside the member's enclosure for the convenience of visitors. This will be cleared from time to time for all outgoing mails.

Members of the Cadet Corps, under Commander Jack Dowling, will be posted in various places and are anxious to be of service to the public. Those who are on special duty will be willing to hear messages and make themselves generally useful.

The poultry and fishery tent are on the northwest side of the main building, and form an annex to it.

The price of admission is 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children. Season tickets can be bought for \$1 at the side door.

The judging of exhibits will commence at 9 a. m. Wednesday. The public will not be admitted until the formal opening. The main doors will be locked at 8:30 a. m. Wednesday morning and all goods intended either for exhibition or private booths and stalls must be in the building before that time.

INDUSTRIAL SITES WILL BE GRANTED

Third Avenue will be extended in that direction and the sites will have trackage on the front side. They will also be very close to the waterfront, which will be a great convenience. Work will start on the clearing of this immediately.
