### NORTHERN B. C. FAIR OPENED BY MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE

FAIR IS BEING HELD IN NEW EXHIBITION BUILDING ON ACROPOLIS HILL—IN SPITE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS THE DISPLAY IS VERY CREDITABLE ONE.

The annual fair of the Northern B. C. Agricultural and Industrial Association will be formally opened this afternoon at 2 o'clock by Hon. H. E. Young, Minister of Agriculture for the province. The fair is being held in the new Exhibition Building, just completed, and which is a credit to the city. Situated as it is on the highest point in the city, the acropolis hill—it adds the advantage of scenery to that of the display within.

A publicity and war news department is located adjoining the cloak and information bureau at the north end of the building. Here will be posted bulletins of the war, the service being supplied by The News.

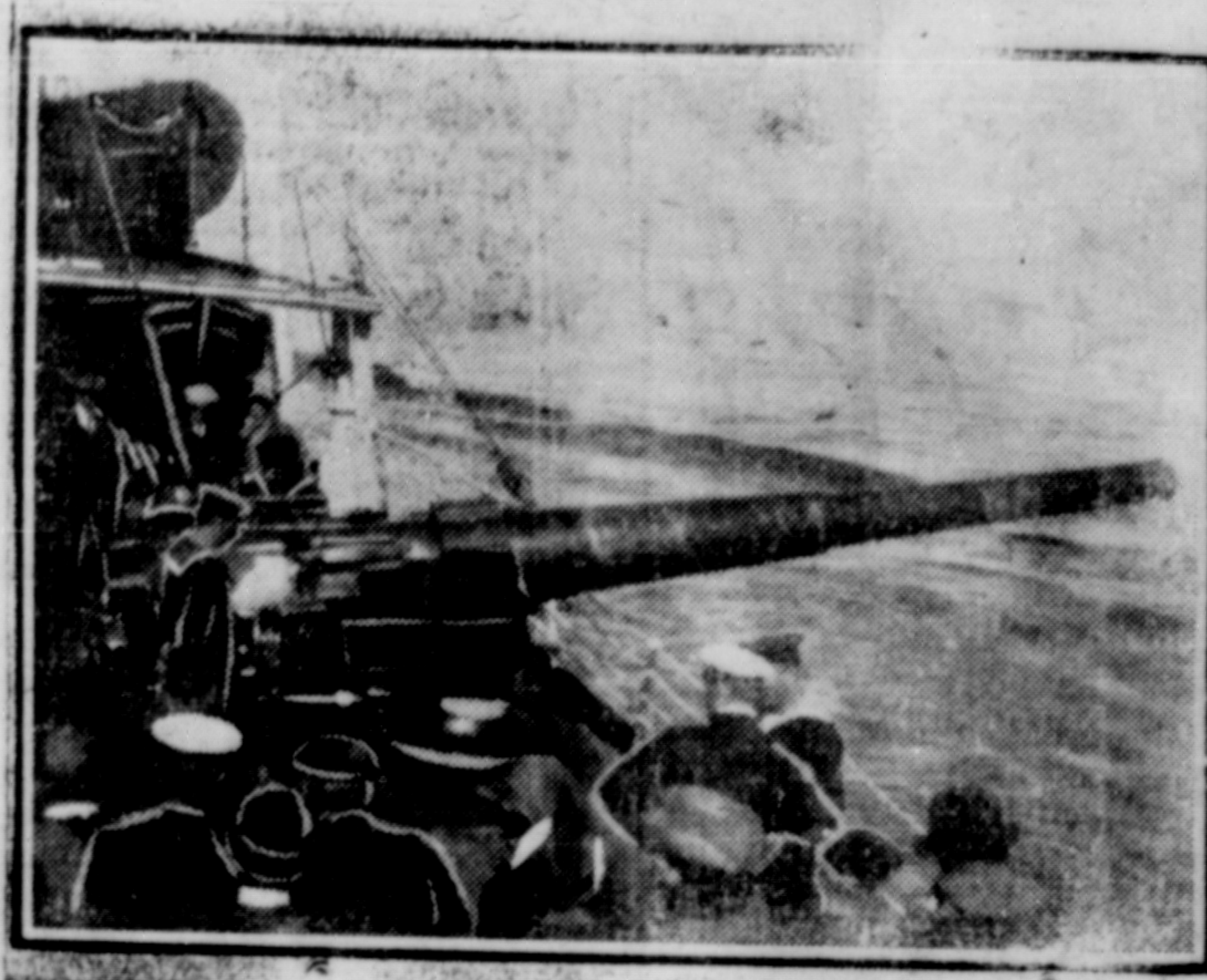

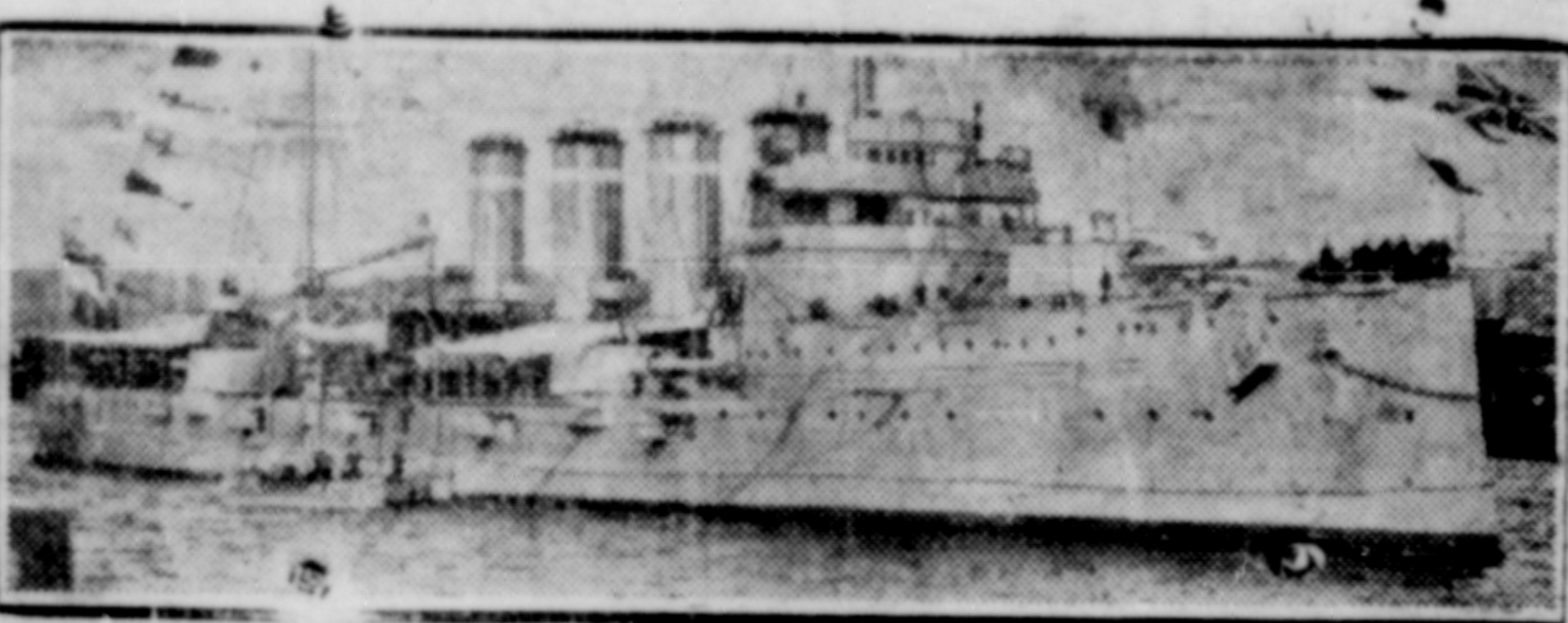
F. Bohler and R. Braun, pioneer farmers of the Kitsumkalum, are down with large exhibits of agricultural produce.

### MORE DETAILS ABOUT SHOOTING ACCIDENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Haysport, B. C., Sept. 30.—A painter named L. J. Hoyt, from Prince Rupert, accidentally shot himself while hunting with two companions from Prince Rupert at Mile 21, three miles from the railway track, on Sunday about 1:30 p. m.

Hoyt and one of his companions had just finished their lunch in the woods and separated. A few minutes afterwards the companion heard a muffled report and rushed over in the direction of the sound and found Hoyt expiring, a bullet from a .45-90 having entered his side. His companions came in and notified the Port Eslington police, who are searching the woods for the body, which will likely be brought out today.

A party was in the woods all day yesterday was was not able to locate the body.

### FIRST CAR OF FRESH FISH SHIPPED FROM RUPERT TODAY

THREE REFRIGERATOR CARS CONTAINING 20,000 POUNDS OF HALIBUT EACH WENT EAST, TWO FOR CHICAGO AND ONE FOR TORONTO—CONSIGNEE BY CANADIAN FISH AND COLD STORAGE COMPANY.

The first car of real fresh fish went out of Prince Rupert this morning by the G. T. P. The car of fish taken out recently was mild-cured salmon. Today's train had three refrigerator cars, which came in last evening, and the loading took place throughout the night. Each car consisted of 100 boxes of halibut packed in ice. The boxes contained 200 pounds of fish, so that each car carried 20,000 pounds.

On the sides of the cars were

large painted signs bearing the following words: "To F. T. James & Co., Toronto, from Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company. Shipped from Prince Rupert, B. C., over the G. T. P. Railway, September 30, 1914."

Two more cars were consigned to Chicago.

This is just the beginning of a big trade for Prince Rupert to which there is no limit. The placards will be a good advertisement for the city.

### REVEALED 300 MINES TO SAVE HIS LIFE

Captive From German Mine-Laying Trawler Saved British Much Trouble.

London, Sept. 29.—A story is going the rounds here that when one of the British mine-hunting craft captured a mine-laying trawler manned by Germans in the North Sea, the British captain lined up his captives and picked out the weakest looking of the lot. Ordering him to step forward, he said:

"I want you to tell me where those mines are that you laid."

"I'll die first," said the sailor, as he straightened up.

"Very well," replied the captain. "You are going to die first, anyway, if any of us do. You helped lay those mines. You know just where they are. We are going to hunt for them and your position is going to be right in the bow of this ship so that if we hit one of them you surely will be the first man to die."

He ordered the prisoner placed directly in the bow and then the ship steamed ahead and over the waters known to be mined. The end of the story is that this vessel picked up nearly 300 mines while the captured sailor was kept in his position of danger.

### AUSTRIANS HAVE CHOLERA.

Venice, Sept. 29.—Nine cases of Asiatic cholera have been discovered among wounded soldiers in Hungary, according to an official announcement by the Hungarian Minister of the Interior. The announcement has excited great apprehension throughout the dual monarchy. It is also learned here that the first suspected case of cholera in Hungary was that of a wounded soldier who was brought on September 15 to Bescaba from the Galician battlefield.
