THE ARGONNE.

The Argonne is a rocky, forest-
clad plateau extending along the
borders of Lorraine, Germany,
and Champagne, France. It has
a length of about sixty-three
miles, an average breadth of nine-
teen miles and an average height
of 1,150 feet. There are few good
roads in this district and it is
hard territory through which to
carry on military operations of
large proportions. It lies between
the valley of the Aisne on the
west and the valley of the Meuse
on the east, and is one of the
natural bulwarks between Ger-
many and France. There are num-
erous forests clothing both the
east and the west slopes of the
plateau, the chief of them being
that of Argonne, extending for
twenty-five miles between the
Aire and the Aisne.

FIELD SERVICE KIT OF THE BRITISH INFANTRYMAN.

The marching weight of the kit amounts to about fifty
pounds including rifle and 150 rounds of ammunition, his
light entrenching tool, pick or shovel for rapidly digging a
shelter trench in action. The explanatory outline shows
various components of the equipment and how all the items
are carried for convenience. The Canadian soldier's equip-
ment is the same except that he carries a Ross rifle instead
of the Lee-Netford in the diagram.

GERMANS REPORTED
TO BE PLACING NEW
GUNS ON WARSHIPS

Copenhagen, Oct. 5.—Travelers
arriving here from the Kiel Canal
say that the Germans are busy
placing new ordnance, which the
Krupp works has been experi-
menting with for the last two
years, on the armored cruisers
and dreadnoughts.

The canal is described as be-
ing crowded with warships, in-
cluding the largest battleships.
The arsenals are busy day and
night, and long trains arrive con-
tinuously with immense guns for
the ships. The Germans are re-
ported as declaring that the
whole fleet will soon be ready to
fight.

MORE RECRUITS
THAN REQUIRED

Force in Vancouver, Which Came
Long Distance to Enlist,
Disbanded.

One hundred and twenty hardy
campaigners and would-be cam-
paigners, former privates in the
72nd Highlanders, enlisted to see
service in the European war and
then quickly demobilized, held a
mass meeting at the Arena Mon-
day, says a Vancouver exchange,
but were able to do little in view
of the non-receipt of replies to
messages they had sent Lord
Kitchener and Sir Richard Mc-
Bride concerning their disap-
pointment. Another meeting will
be held when these replies are
received.

Through their spokesman, Mr.
W. G. Sutherland, the men stated
their willingness to travel in cat-
tle cars, on flatcars or any old
way at all to Montreal and there
take any old kind of sea-going
tub to the scene of the war.

A deputation waited on Mr. H.
H. Stevens, M. P., but the mem-
ber could tell them only that his
message concerning their condi-
tion had been sent to the Minis-
ter of Militia and not answered
as yet, because the minister was
away from his offices.

Mr. Sutherland says that the
men cannot very well walk to the
front, but that transportation is
the only thing which they need.
The Highlanders were demobil-
ized last week and most of the
men are now out of work. Many
of them are English Public School
men and they came to Vancouver
from as far away as Mexico and
Alaska in the hope that they
would be given a chance with bay-
onets at the Kaiser's men.

Colonel Duff Stuart states that
skeleton corps will be maintained
in the province, but that until
word comes from Ottawa no at-
tempt to recruit a second con-
tingent can be made. The final
movement in the demobilization
order is thought to be the demo-
bilization of a detachment of the
11th Irish Fusiliers on their re-
turn from Prince Rupert.

C. P. R. PROPERTY
IS CONFISCATED

Austrian Government Takes Pos-
session of Railway's Securities
and Money Deposited in
Vienna.

Venice, Oct. 4.—The Austrian
government has confiscated the
Canadian Pacific Railway Com-
pany's securities and money de-
posited in Vienna, it is reported,
as well as the company's observa-
tion cars running on Austrian
railroads. This has been done,
it is said, as a consequence of the
refusal of the company to pay the
dividends of Austrian sharehold-
ers.

Italians newspapers at Tren-
tin, Austria, have been forced to
suspend publication. Italian resi-
dents are being kept under the
closest surveillance.

Montreal, Aug. 4.—When Sir
Thomas Shaughnessy, president
of the C. P. R., was asked about
the dispatch from Venice with
reference to the report that the
Austrian government had confis-
cated the C. P. R.'s securities and
money in Vienna, as well as the
company's observation cars on
Austrian railroads, because of the
company's refusal to pay the di-
vidends of Austrian shareholders,
he said:
"We do not know we will not
pay the dividends; they may con-
fiscate what they like; I do not
know what they are going to do
over there, but we will do our
duty."


Sir Thomas declined to say any-
thing more on the matter except
that he had not heard anything
about it until shown the dispatch.
