GOVERNMENT TAKES WIDER AUTHORITY

May Control Telegraph and Telephone Lines—Another Stringent Order.

Ottawa, Oct. 5.—An order-in-council has just been passed, under the War Measures Act of the recent session, empowering the government, if deemed necessary, to take over and operate any telephone or telegraph lines in Canada, and providing authority for a strict censorship of all telegraphic or telephonic communications. The order provides that any cabinet minister, delegated for the purpose, may assume control of any telegraph or telephone company, and use its lines for His Majesty's service. It is further provided that the minister may direct that all messages be submitted to censorship, and that any messages, whether by telegraph or telephone, going out of Canada shall go through certain named offices only.

Any director or officer of a company contravening the instructions of the minister is liable to a penalty of \$5,000 or five years' imprisonment.

Another order-in-council provides similar penalties for furnishing to the enemy information, plans, photographs, etc., likely to be of military use, or for furnishing intoxicating liquor to anyone on military duty.

STRONG SUPPORT FOR GENERAL BOTHA IN WAR OPERATIONS

Pretoria, Oct. 4.—The decision of General Botha, Premier of the Union of South Africa, to take the field personally in command against the forces of Germany has aroused much enthusiasm here.

The government, in its announcement, says it is aware that many citizens are anxious to serve with the British forces on the continent, but the Imperial government considers that priority should be given to the South African military requirements.

Natal and the Orange Free State will contribute their quotas to General Botha's army.

LORD ROBERT'S ADVICE TO THE BRITISH PEOPLE

Expects Germans to Make Gigantic Struggle on Own Soil—Advises Against Abusing Enemy.

London, Oct. 5.—Lord Roberts, in an article in the Hibbert Journal, urges the Empire not to underestimate the power of Germany, with its 66,000,000 people. "I cannot help thinking," he writes, "that the great task of subduing that nation will begin when we, with our French, Russian and Belgian allies, have driven the Germans into the heart of their own territory."

"May I give a word of caution to my fellow countrymen against the unstatesmanlike practice of abusing one's enemies. Let us avoid what Kipling, during the Boer war, describes as 'killing Kruger with our mouths.' Let us rather devote all our energy to defeating our foe by the superior fighting of adequate numbers of British soldiers in the open field."

"When we read the charges against the German troops, let us remember that gross charges, absolutely untrue, were brought against us when fighting in South Africa; but whether the charges are true or not, let us keep our own hands clean and let us fight against the Germans in such a way as to earn their liking as well as their respect."

CAUGHT COALING CRUISER.

U. S. and Norwegian Merchantmen Caught by British Cruiser Coaling German Warship.

New York, Oct. 5.—Sir Courtenay Bennett, the British consul-general here, announced that the steamer Lorenzo, registered as a United States merchantman, and the Norwegian steamer Thor, had been captured by British cruisers in the act of coaling the German cruiser Karlsruhe at sea and had been taken to St. Lucia to await disposition by a prize court.

Sir Courtenay added that the German cruiser had made its escape. The two steamers were captured off the West Indies, he said.

FRONTIERSMEN TO AMALGAMATE WITH THE V. V. RESERVES

Capt. C. C. Kernahan, adjutant of the Vancouver Volunteer Reserve, last week announced that a parade of the cavalry squadrons of the V. V. would be held Sunday afternoon or evening in the Horse Show Building, and that the men would then march through the city to Hastings Park, where Rev. Mr. King will hold divine service.

It is announced that the Legion of Frontiersmen, sixty-four strong, has definitely decided to amalgamate with the Vancouver Volunteer Reserve. A meeting is to be held by the Frontiersmen to finally settle details.

Col. Duff Stuart, brigade commander, has returned from Victoria, and said that reports were being circulated in Victoria that four German cruisers were about to begin a bombardment of the Capital. Colonel Stuart saw no German warships there and he was somewhat amused over the rumor.

A detachment of 83 officers and men of the Sixth D. C. O. R. left on Tuesday to relieve the soldiers on guard in the mountains and on the C. P. R. bridges.

GERMAN SOLDIERS WRITE OF THE WAR

"My Dear Parents.—Our corps has the task of holding the heights south of Cerny in all circumstances, until the Fourteenth Corps on our left flank can grip the enemy's flank. On our right are other corps. We are fighting with the English Guards, Highlanders and Zouaves. The losses on both sides have been enormous. For the most part, this is due to the too brilliant French artillery."

"The British are trained in the making use of ground. One never sees them, and one is constantly under fire. The French aimmen perform wonderful feats. We cannot get rid of them. As soon as an airman has flown over us, ten minutes later we get their shrapnel fire in our position. We have little artillery in our corps; without we cannot go forward."

"With the British troops we have great difficulties. They have a queer way of causing losses to the enemy. They make good trenches, in which they wait patiently; they carefully measure the range for their rifle fire, and they open a truly hellish fire on the unsuspecting cavalry. This is the reason we have had such heavy losses."

"During the first two days of the battle I had only one piece of bread and no meat. I spent the night in the rain without my great coat. The rest of my kit was on the horses, which have been left miles behind with the baggage, and which cannot come up into the battle because as soon as you put your nose up from behind cover the bullets whistle."

"War is terrible. We are all hoping that a decisive battle will end the war. If we beat the British the French resistance will be very quickly dealt with; of this there is no doubt."

GERMAN BUYERS PAY BILLS WITH WAR LOAN BONDS

Businessmen of Fatherland Discover New Way to Settle Old Debts—Ingenious Moldup.

Bordeaux, Oct. 5.—A newspaper published at Chaux de Fonds, Switzerland, copies of which have been received here, declares that manufacturers of the city of Chaux de Fonds region have received letter from their German clients, informing them that they are unable to settle their bills, it being contrary to the interests of Germany to send money out of the country.

Being convinced, however, that the Swiss manufacturers desire to see Germany triumph, the debtors had, with the amount due their Swiss creditors, purchased in their names stock in the German 5 per cent war loan. The writers say further that they have decided to do business, after the war, only with such firms as accept this arrangement.
