The Canadian courts have been called upon to decide whether a man belonging to a country now at war with the Empire can become a British subject. However it will be decided it is certainly in bad taste for such an one to make the attempt. It does not appear a genuine transaction on his part. British citizenship is too honorable a thing to be given away lightly. Only the men who appreciate its value and are ready to defend it should be admitted. No doubt there are many in the hostile camp that prefer British laws, but this is a poor time to change. Let them show their loyalty first and they may be admitted later. It will not do to join the British just to prevent suspicion. It will be much better to wait till the war is over.

It is a strange fact that while the British authorities are persistent in their call for men there is a surplus in Canada which cannot get a chance to go to the front. Quite an agitation has been created in Vancouver, where the local force intended for the front has been disbanded. There are a number of men there who came from the extremes of the continent to offer their services in the war and instead of being sent to the front they are disbanded. No doubt it taxed the military authorities to equip

the first contingent, but if there is such a call for men in the Old Land why not ship these Canadians over and let the British find their equipment? Canada could easily send a hundred thousand men and they are sure to be needed. Perhaps this country couldn't equip a force like that, but why not send the men anyway? The British war office will do the rest.

Canada may well feel proud of the honor which has been done the ex-minister of labor, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King. The Carnegie Foundation has invited him to conduct an inquiry into the means of improving the relations between capital and labor throughout the world, which he has accepted. Mr. MacKenzie King is well fitted for this work. During his university course he specialized in economics and sociology and during his term in the Laurier government he has had an opportunity to try out his theories. After the defeat of the Laurier government Mr. MacKenzie King decided to continue his sociological studies, and he is today one of the best posted men throughout the world, as is seen by his recent appointment. Mr. MacKenzie King is a grandson of that Canadian patriot W. L. MacKenzie, who played a big part in the earlier life of Canada.

PASSING EVENTS

Shipping at the Halifax terminals is as brisk as at any time during the winter port season.

The Minister of Public Works, Manitoba, announced at a special war session of the Legislature last week that the provincial treasury is about exhausted. The surplus of five million dollars has been spent on public buildings, chiefly the new Parliament buildings now under construction.

Hon. Dr. Beland, M. P., who was in Belgium when the war broke out, and has been serving as a physician in one of the hospitals in Antwerp where the wounded are brought, has written the minister of Militia asking that he be allowed to join the Canadian Army Medical Corps when the first contingent arrives on the other side.

Sir William C. Van Horne says that industrially and commercially Canada has nothing to fear from the war. We produce food, and food will be required by the combatants in Europe, who are neglecting their grain fields to go to the battle fields. Canada prays for an early cessation of hostilities, not because she is afraid of business conditions, but because she does not want to see the world's blood spilled needlessly.

A large area of Newbury, Eng., racecourse is being prepared for German prisoners of war, and soldiers are surrounding it with tons of barbed wire.

A scheme has been inaugurated, with the approval of the War Office, for providing cinematograph entertainments for convalescent soldiers and sailors.

Switzerland has been almost financially ruined by the war, having to keep her army mobilized at an expense of \$230,000 a day in order to prevent the violation of her neutrality. She has been compelled to retire the army.

One of the British officers killed in the battle of Mons was Capt. E. R. Jones, brother of A. U. Jones, Montreal agent for the Albion Motor Car Company. Captain Jones was a native of St. John, N. B., and his father was at one time mayor of that city.

The name of Mother Adrienne, head of the Dames du Sacre Coeur, who formerly was Adrinne Bubet, appears in a long list of names of those killed on the battlefield. She was struck by a bullet from a German machine gun as she was raising the head of a wounded soldier.

The senate of Cambridge University has invited the Catholic University of Louvain, Belgium, to move to Cambridge, there to continue its own separate studies, grant degrees and generally to pursue its activities as at its own foundation. Cambridge University would supply the technical facilities for carrying out this work.

John R. Mott, told President Wilson last week that United States battleships were needed in Turkish waters to relieve the fears of missionaries and school teachers in that country. He said his advices from Turkey show Americans there fear serious trouble. The President has taken the question under advisement.

An exchange says: "A precedent will be broken when Premier Asquith and John Redmond, the Irish leader, address recruiting meetings in Ireland; and still another when the Irish Legion, which the Nationalists are forming, light under the British flag. There have been many Irish Legions. Some of them have fought on French soil, but with one exception, never under the flag of Britain."

Vice-Admiral Koichi Fujii, who was accused of bribery in connection with the naval corruption case of last year, has been sentenced to imprisonment for a term of four years and six months. Fujii was at one time Japanese naval attaché at Berlin. He was ordered before a court-martial in February of this year. It was alleged that he received illicit commissions for influencing the allotment of Admiralty contracts in favor of a German firm.

Russia is said to be making her prisoners of war earn their living. It was reported last week that the Russians held 200,000 prisoners, who are being given labor of one kind or another, thousands being used on the railways and others helping with the harvest and helping with the plowing, while still others are lumbering and roadmaking. Many of them have been sent to Turkestan for work on the drainage system. Efforts are being made so that this influx of labor will not interfere with regular wage earners.

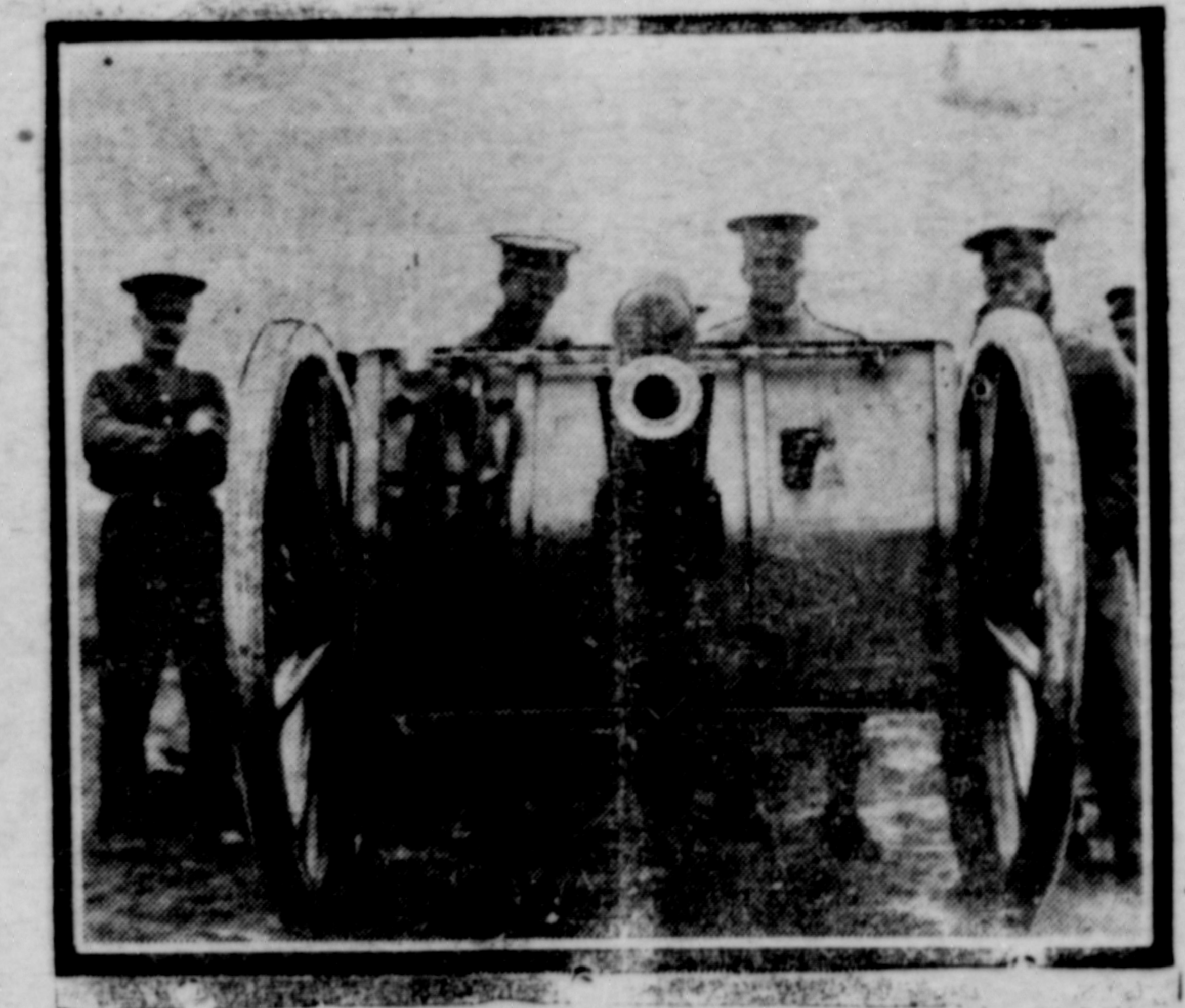
