REDMOND APPEALS FOR IRISH PEACE BY WAY OF WAR

Dublin, Oct. 5.—John E. Redmond, the Irish leader, in making recruiting speeches at Wexford on Sunday eloquently appealed for a reconciliation on the home rule question. He said:

"I will meet Andrew Bonar Law by gentleness and by reason. I pray with all my heart and soul that out of this terrible war one blessed result comes for Ireland, and that is that as Irishmen go on fighting side by side, Catholics and Protestants and north of Ireland Irish by south of Ireland Irish, it may prove a sign of future unity of our Irish nation."

"German domination would mean the loss of all the liberties we have won. I will put it quite plainly, as General Botha did in his speech. Are you for Britain and her colonies, or are you on the side of Germany?"

"I believe we cannot remain aloof. The war has come upon us and we must take our choice. The only choice of honor, of safety and of statesmanship is to defend the empire's liberties against their declared enemies."

The number of new recruits for the British army obtained in Ireland amounts to about 26,000. More than 8,000 of these are from the Dublin district, 4,000 from the Cork district and the remainder from Belfast. Not all the Belfast recruits are Unionists nor all the southern recruits Nationalists.

WILL THERE BE NATIONAL BANKS FOR CANADA?

(From the Toronto World.)

The banking and currency question grows in interest for the general public. Our banking magnates should attend a meeting like that in West Toronto or the one at Runnymede, in the same district, both within the past ten days. The people appeared much concerned as to the scarcity of money, lack of work because of the refusal by the banks of credit to employers, and the granting by parliament of a moratorium to banks—suspension of gold payments for bank notes—while no one had yet come forward with a reasonable plan for the deferment of payments in the case of mortgages on poor people's homes, where the owners were not able to meet them because of lack of work or in cases where payment in full was called for, the time limit of the mortgage having expired and renewals were not to be had.

They were also highly interested in the celerity of action of Lloyd George as national head of the finances of Great Britain in helping to carry on business in that country in time of war: how he aided the banks with the guarantee of the government and then forced the banks to finance business generally. It was surprising to see the grasp the ordinary citizen has of the first principles of banking and currency, especially if it is put to him in plain terms by those who know the question. It soon loses the mystery that is supposed to enshroud it.
