During the burning of the beautiful city of Louvain a body of women and children was marched in front of a number of German soldiers to a place outside the town, where they were kept for some time, eventually being allowed to return.

CAN GERMANY BE STARVED OR MUST SHE BE DEFEATED

HOW ECONOMIC PRESSURE WOULD ACT—FRENCH AND GER-
MANS HAVE ALREADY LOST FLOWER OF ARMIES—
RESULT LIES WITH BRITAIN AND RUSSIA.

The confident prediction of the one in which the Allies will overwhelm the Germanic powers by military strength. France is at her maximum efficiency now in resisting the German invasion. She has done wonderfully well. Very few military experts would have ventured the opinion three months ago that with the aid of a relatively small British army France could have held her northern territory as she has done. By the time the Germans retire from French soil, however, the French army will have sustained losses that will have greatly lessened its value in offensive warfare. We know that the British army has already lost in killed, wounded and missing two-fifths of the 3,000 officers who landed in France, and that the total casualties are not far short of 40,000 rank and file killed, wounded and missing. If the French and German field armies have suffered in the same ratio, and there is no reason to suppose that they have not, a third of the well trained soldiers of the first line in both France and Germany will have been removed from the ranks of the combatants before the campaign in France ends.

The issue clearly rests in the possession by Russia and Britain of vast numbers of men not yet drawn upon. These men, like our own Canadians, are in most cases insufficiently trained or not trained at all, but they are good fighting material, just as good as the German Landwehr and Landsturm whom they have to face, and far more numerous. Unless a revolution breaks out in Germany, the only way to end the war will be by wearing down the German defence by constant attack in superior numbers. That is the task lying before the Allies, and especially Russia and Britain, which are still exerting but a small part of their ultimate fighting strength.

Economic pressure thus applied would be a very slow process. The interruption of the foreign trade of the United Kingdom, and especially of the importation of food, would bring Britain to her knees in less than six months. It would probably take two or three years to secure the same result in the case of Germany and Austria. The war, therefore, in its final phase must

Hundred Injured Horses Sold at
Valcartier at Bargain Prices.

Quebec, Oct. 7.—Of the 8,000 horses that were in Valcartier camp before the contingent moved out, about 200 remain. These 200 are the sick and injured of the animals that were brought here to be shipped to the front. Many of them are in a shocking condition, and as a result of a stampede a few days ago nearly 100 were so badly injured that they have been sold for \$1 each.
