HELP EMPIRE FIRST.

Britain Giving Preference to Egyptian Cotton.

Washington, Oct. 14.—Acting Secretary of State Lansing and Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador, yesterday discussed the possibility of increasing the shipments of American cotton to Europe. The ambassador threw some light upon the subject by pointing out that the war had greatly reduced the demand for cotton goods, so that the great Lancashire factories were closing up or running on a reduced scale. But the principal obstacle in the way of normal importations of American cotton, he said, lay in the obligation upon Great Britain to consume as far as possible the Egyptian cotton crop in order to prevent just such a depression in Egypt, as now exists in the southern American states. All of the great German and Austrian and even French mills are practically close due to the Egyptian product by the war, he said.

PRINCE RUPERT HALIBUT SUPPLIES EASTERN MARKETS

FIRST SHIPMENT FROM RUPERT TO TORONTO GIVES THIS GOOD ADVERTISING—COMMEND USE OF HALIBUT TO THE PEOPLE.

The following from the Toronto Globe will be read with interest: "The announcement that the first ear of halibut from Prince Rupert over the Grand Trunk Pacific has reached Toronto recalls one of the most remarkable developments of the fishing industry on this continent. Halibut has long been one of Boston's favorite foods. In the poems of Longfellow, the essays of Emerson, the Breakfast Table philosophy of Oliver Wendell Holmes, and the romances of Hawthorne—were we able to analyze them and resolve them into their original chemical contents—we should doubtless find much of the halibut that constitutes so important an item of the diet of Athenians of America. It was with difficulty the supply of halibut was maintained in winter, for on the banks of Newfoundland wild storms rage for long periods.

"To lessen the toll of life which has to be paid for Boston's winter supply of fresh fish the New England Fish Company looked around for a winter fishing ground less open to storms than the Atlantic. The search led away up the North Pacific to the vicinity of the Queen Charlotte Islands. There what is probably the finest halibut fishery in the world has been developed. For many years, not only in winter but at others seasons, the Eastern States and Eastern Canada have been drawing from these waters a large part of their supply of halibut. Hitherto the C. P. R. has had a monopoly of the business, the fishing tugs making their headquarters in Vancouver and steaming to and from the fishing grounds through the interior channels between Vancouver Island and the mainland. Now the G. T. P., with its more northerly terminus, begins to compete for the halibut trade.

"The great Pacific fisheries of the Dominion should be used to the utmost to supply the people on the plains with cheap and wholesome fish food. Cities like Edmonton, Calgary, Regina and Winnipeg should be encouraged by cheap and regular supplies to acquire the halibut habit. Some day, if a fish diet becomes as popular on the plains as it is in New England, our Longfellows and Emersons and Hawthornes may come out of the West. The wise men of the East were all very well in their way, but may we not hope for great things from a combination of No. 1 hard and Queen Charlotte Island halibut?"

VANOUVER BUSINESS MAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

After Returning From Hunting Trip Gun Was Discharged in Putting It Away.

Vancouver and indeed a large part of British Columbia was shocked by the tragic death of W. R. Arnold, managing director of the Dominion Trust Co., through the accidental shooting of his own gun.

The death of Mr. Arnold occurred Monday morning at 10:15 o'clock at his garage at the corner of Cartier Avenue and King Edward Avenue. Mr. Arnold lived in Kerrisdale. Late last week he had been on a shooting expedition with Mr. Gibson, a friend, and Monday morning announced his intention of bringing the guns, tent and other apparatus to his garage, which is nearly two miles nearer the city than his residence. He wished to place the guns out of the way of his children at home, he said.

Arriving at the garage he left his car in the charge of the chauffeur, Henry Vanderbel, standing on the pavement. He himself carried the gun and tent into the garage. A moment later A. Brayley, a gardener, heard a dull report and from a distance of a few feet hurried to the garage. Mr. Arnold was lying on the cement floor, quite dead, the contents of one barrel having pierced his heart. How the gun had become discharged was not apparent. An investigation was made by Chief Simpson and Sergeant Walker, of the Point Grey police.

Mr. Arnold leaves a wife and two young sons. He was highly respected and quite wealthy and as the head of the Dominion Trust Company has made an enviable business record. He has lived in Vancouver for more than a dozen years. He has a brother, Mr. C. S. Arnold, a barrister. Two other brothers and mother also live in Vancouver. The deceased was about 35 years old.
