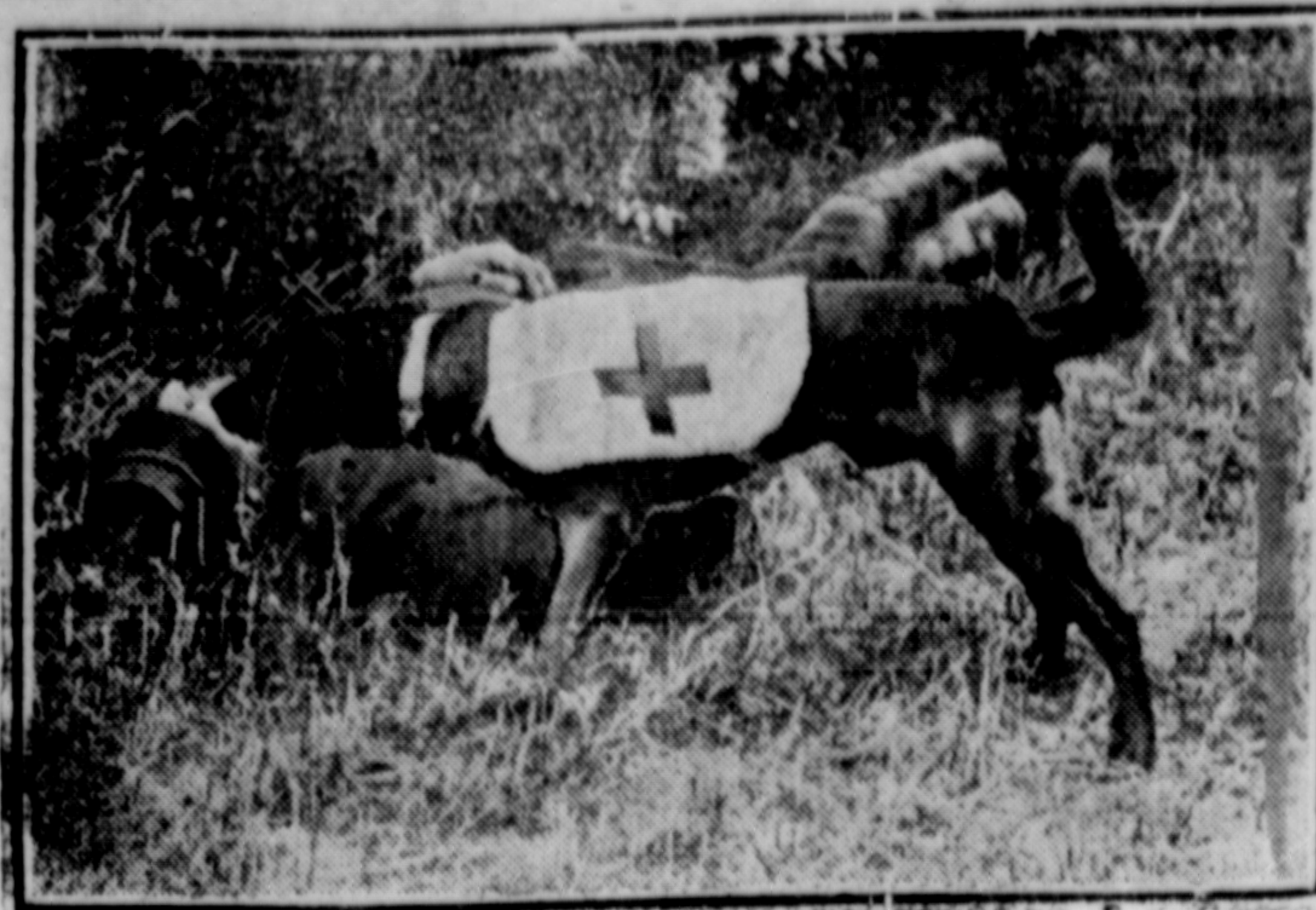

IT'S BRITAIN'S TASK TO CRUSH THE ENEMY

France is Doing Well, but Canada's Troops Will All Be Required.

London, Oct. 15.—"Will our men get a chance?" This insistent question is asked whenever Canadians foregather in London. The answer which the Daily Telegraph makes to a similar question of Kitchener's new army also applies to Canadians.

It says: "The French are fighting nobly in defence of their soil, but the power of their armies to assume a more serious offensive movement grows less day by day. It must be the British who lead the Allies into German soil to reap the utmost fruits of victory. Men who are training miles away from the fighting line are certain to find themselves in the van next year. No man need fear his six months' work in barrack square or rifle range will be spent in vain. All will be required and all will get their chance."

"When the Germans are driven back from the Belgian frontier we will only be beginning the struggle. As Kitchener said from the first, we must be prepared for a long war."
