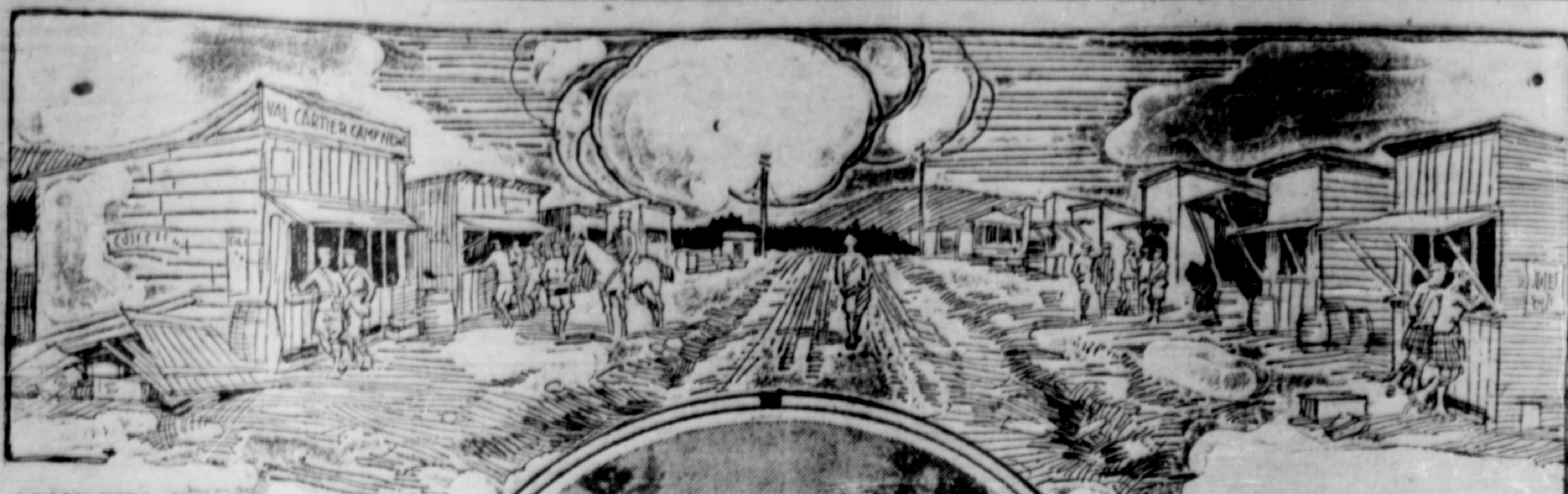

EXEMPTIONS ARE REVOKED BY GERMANS

Petrograd, Oct. 17.—The Ger-
man losses have forced the Ger-
man government to revoke all ex-
emptions to military service, says
a statement given out by the of-
ficial press agency.

"The German army being short
of equipment an order has been
issued to bury the dead soldiers
without uniforms and shoes.

"The Novoe Vremy's corre-
spondent at Fukuohima, Japan,
says that Japan will prove to Rus-
sia the sincerity of her policies.

"Agents of the committee of
union and progress continue to
excite public opinion in Constan-
tinople by giving out news of the
war at patriotic meetings."

COUNTRY DEVASTATED BY WAR WAS A LOVELY COUNTRYSIDE

SHORT HISTORY OF DISTRICT SHOWS MANY FACTS OF IN-
TEREST—SCENE OF MANY OF THE WORLD'S
LEADING EVENTS.

It is one of the most beautiful
countrysides in the world. From
Brussels, the spacious built
capital of Belgium, now occupied
by the German hosts, to Namur,
picturesquely situated on the
Meuse, the route is, say The Daily
Telegraph, practically one long
avenue of lime trees, which give
place as one proceeds to noble
oaks and elms, and to forests of
firs as the traveler penetrates the
Ardennes.

Namur itself, which may at any
moment become the scene of he-
roism as that shown at Liege, has
always been a point of strategic
importance, and it was fortified
at an early period. It is a strong
link in the chain of fortifications
along the Meuse, and is sur-
rounded by a circle of nine de-
tached forts, two and a half to
four and a half miles distant,
which were constructed by Gen-
eral Brailmont, the same soldier-
engineer who made Antwerp one
of the strongest fortresses in Eu-
rope. The numerous sieges which
Namur has undergone (Louis
XIX in 1692, William III in 1695
and again in 1746, 1792, 1794)
have left few of the old sixteenth
century buildings standing, but
those that remain are as pictur-
esque as any of the period in Eu-
rope. A beautiful cathedral in the
Renaissance style occupies a
place in the center of the town.
Near by is the former Jesuit
church of St. Loup, with an im-
posing facade in the baroque
style, the interior of which con-
tains twelve Doric pillars of red
marble.

The old citadel on the Montagne
de Champeau stands on the
site of a Roman fort and of the
castle of the Counts of Namur.
Of the latter only two towers re-
main. In 1891 the municipal au-
thorities laid out a park with a
spacious recreation ground, an
open-air theatre and a museum
of forestry.

Marble Quarries.

The valley of the Meuse above
Namur offers commanding views
of wooded hills and great cliffs,
beneath which repose dainty
white cottages and old chateaux.
Continuing to Dinant, we pass the
ancestral home of one of Bel-
gium's old nobility, the Duke of

Fernan-Nunez, near which rises
the vast and precipitous Rocher
de Neveau. The way lies below
the cliffs at Taiffer and the rocks
of Frene, the caverns of which,
according to tradition, are in-
habited by gnomes. Marble quar-
ries and precipitous tree-clad
cliffs, among which more splen-
did dwellings are perched, are to
be seen on either hand, until, via
Anhee and Houx, we reach Bau-
vignez, one of the oldest towns
in the district, where, it is told,
when the French besieged the
town in 1554, three beautiful
women, who were the sole sur-
vivors of the ill-fated garrison,
threw themselves from the sum-
mit of the tower of Creve-Coeur,
and were dashed to pieces on the
rocks below.

Dinant, which gives its name to
the "dinanderie," or chased cop-
per and brasswares, which were
in high repute when the town was
at the height of its prosperity in
the thirteenth, fourteenth and
fifteenth centuries, has been three
times the scene of battle. In
1466, Philippe le Bon, Duke of
Burgundy, besieged and took Din-
ant, and is said to have caused
800 of the townspeople to be
thrown into the Meuse. In 1554
the town was taken by storm and
plundered by the French under
the Duc de Nevers. In 1675 it
was again taken by the French.
Dinant has now dwindled to a
mere village.

Still beautiful and mountain-
ous is the route to Arlon, which
is a prosperous town on the fron-
tier, with a population of about
14,000 souls. It was destroyed
by the Duke of Guise in 1558, and
in the seventeenth century re-
ceived new fortifications, which
were razed in 1844.

Immortal Liege.

Liege, the center of the recent
splendid Belgian defence, lies in
a strikingly picturesque situa-
tion. The great and ancient city
rises on the high bank of the
Meuse, which flows through the
city and forms an island, which
is connected with the right bank
by five bridges and with the left
by six bridges and a small pas-
serelle. The principal part of the
town, with the large public build-
ings and the churches, lies on

the left bank. The twelve detach-
ed forts, erected by General Bri-
almont since 1886, surround the
city at a distance of three and a
half to five and a half miles. Coal
mining forms the basis of the in-
dustrial prosperity of Liege, but
almost as important is the manu-
facture of weapons of all kinds,
which have enjoyed a world-wide
reputation since the end of the
eighteenth century. The work-
men, some 40,000 in number,
work at their own risk, for it is
said that a piece containing the
slightest flaw is at once rejected.

Returning to Brussels, we pass
through old and dull Louvain, the
ramparts surrounding the walls
of which have been partially con-
verted into promenades, and so
to Neerwinden and Tirlemont.
Neerwinden is well known on ac-
count of the two great battles
fought near it. In 1693 the French
under Marshal Luxembourg, de-
feated the Allies under William
III of England. In 1793 the
French, under Louis Philippe
(then "General Egalitie," after-
wards King of France), were de-
feated by the Austrians, under
the Prince of Coburg, and driven out
of Belgium.

Of Tirlemont it need not be
mentioned that the six miles' cir-
cumference of the town encloses
quite a large extent of arable
land.
