EDITORIALS

The fighting in France has assumed a new phase. The Battle of the Aisne may be said to have been a draw with what advantage there was on the side of the Allies. The taking of Antwerp and the new flanking movement of the Germans along the coast indicates a distinct change in the plan of campaign. There is no doubt but that the objective of the Germans is a blow at the heart of Britain. If it is true that the Krupps are turning out a new twenty-five-mile-range gun the Germans perhaps hope to land their transports in England under the protection of this huge artillery, since the straits of Dover is only twenty-one miles wide.

Before the Germans can do this, however, there are two things that demand their attention. They must furnish enough troops to hold the Allies in France in a death grip and raise a new army for the invasion of England. Besides this, they must be prepared to convoy their transports across the Channel. The big guns might well sweep the Channel of warships but they cannot hope to keep off the fleet of submarines which the British have at their disposal. They thus certainly have a few difficult nuts to crack in that attempt and considering the fact the Allies seem to have a little the better of them in North-

west France there is hardly much likelihood of them ever making this attempt.

One thing is becoming clearer every day and that is that we are in for a protracted war. While the Germans have not the numbers of men at their disposal they appear to have equipment for a much larger number than the Allies. It is therefore natural that they should make their best showing at the first. On the other hand, the Allies seem to have resources and Father Time on their side. They can continue pouring men and equipment into the fight for an almost unlimited period. It is therefore likely to resolve itself finally into a financial contest and, as Lloyd George put it, "the last hundred million will win."

MAY RECEIVE BELGIANS.

People of Eastern Townships Contemplate Providing Homes for Some During Winter.

Sherbrooke, Que., Oct. 19.—A meeting of the executive of the Eastern Townships Immigration Society was held here. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss means for providing in the Eastern Townships for a certain number of Belgians.

It was felt that a thousand people or more of the agricultural classes could find homes during the war, or permanently, in the Eastern Townships, and it was thought that many farmers, particularly in the rural parts, would

be glad to receive one or more Belgians and provide them a home for the winter, receiving in turn such service as they would be able to give.

The details of this scheme would have to be carefully worked out, but it was felt that it was practical. The executive of the society will seek an interview in a few days with the Quebec government to discuss the matter further.

AN ALLIANCE OF PEACE
THROUGHOUT AMERICA

Representatives of Nations of Both Countries to Meet to Form Defensive League.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—That a conference is likely to be called of representatives of all the nation of North and South and Central America to form a league for peace, is the opinion of John A. Stewart, of New York, chairman of the executive committee of the United States peace committee of the United States Peace Centenary Association, who is in Ottawa conferring with the Canadian representatives. The purpose of the league, he declared, would be to bring about the respect of each nation for the territorial integrity of the others and to unite all against territorial aggrandizement by an outside nation.

"Apart from our neutrality," says Mr. Stewart, "and without particular regard to any given outcome of the war, the war itself has served to urge on the people of the United States the acceptance of a duty in the direction of safeguarding the interest collectively of the nations of the western hemisphere. I am advocating the calling of an international conference at Washington for the purpose of organizing under agreement a league of peace. The alliances among the two groups of European nations have shown us one phase of international association—that of defensive and offensive contractual obligations. The result of such contracts would seem clearly to impel us as people of the western hemisphere to organize, not a league for purposes of war, but a league for purposes of peace and for peaceful commercial, political and social life."

The nations of the western hemisphere, Mr. Stewart believes, might well bind themselves in an alliance, the underlying motive of which should be the extension of the fundamental principle of the Rush-Bagot agreement to all the nations of the western hemisphere. This would obligate each nation to respect the territorial integrity of every other nation and would be an alliance for defence only in the degree to which some nation outside the western hemisphere might make an attempt at territorial aggrandizement in that hemisphere.

Canada, says Mr. Stewart, should by all means be included in such an understanding. He stated that the celebration of the peace centenary would be carried out in its entirety, as planned, except that the date might be changed in some cases. The religious celebration will be on Sunday, February 14.

OVER 200,000 GERMANS
ARE IMMOBILIZED

One of the Fruits of Sea Power Shown by Keeping 200,000 Men Hors de Combat.

The Spanish steamer Montserrat, from Mexico, has but recently arrived in Barcelona. She had on board 200 Frenchmen from Mexico, who embarked there after the declaration of war to help in the defence of their native land; 160 Germans also embarked in the Montserrat at Vera Cruz, but were detained by British cruisers.

It is estimated that over 200,000 Germans living abroad have already been detained in this way, thanks to the vigilance of the British fleet. Even the Germans living in Spain have not yet been able to return to their own country, as they can neither cross France nor get to any Continental port by boat.

Two hundred thousand men hors de combat! This is as good as a great victory in the field. It is even better than a great military success, since the victory in this case has been gained without any loss, by the mere expression of will—"No thoroughfare!"

GERMAN GUNBOAT
MAY BE INTERNED

Seattle, Oct. 20.—It is reported from Honolulu that the Geier, the German gunboat from Tsingtau, will not be ready to go to sea for weeks, as her engines are in bad repair. Washington advices, however, indicate that the vessel must go to sea if seaworthy with no delay, and if the Geier refuses to do this, she will be interned. An explanation has been demanded by the United States government of the Marconi Wireless Company of Honolulu as to its sending a wireless message indicating the arrival of the Geier.
