**SHOOTS HIS FRIEND HUNTING PHEASANTS**  
Physician Peppared With Shot by Former Mayor of New Westminster.

New Westminster, Oct. 20.—While hunting pheasants on Crescent Island, ex-Mayor B. W. Shiles shot Dr. A. J. Holmes, fifty or sixty pellets lodging in the doctor's back. One lung was perforated. The injured man is in St. Mary's Hospital, and his recovery is expected. Mr. Shiles is a pioneer of this city. He is a veteran of the American Civil War. He and Dr. Holmes have been close friends for years. Nine or ten years ago Dr. Holmes narrowly escaped injury when a gun carried by Mr. Shiles was accidentally discharged.

**SIDELIGHTS ON THE WAR**  
Prince William of Wied is reported to have joined the German army.  
President Poincare has been nominated as the next lord rector of Glasgow University.  
Vienna is enforcing drastic regulations against high prices for food.  
At Willesden, ten miles northwest of the heart of London, the largest railway junction in the United Kingdom, the police arrested twenty-two Germans living in a strongly fortified house, with cement floor and roof and heavy walls. The premises were used as a factory by C. C. Rober, a German music publisher.  
The British ambassador has made formal complaint of the coaling of German cruisers by ships from Manila.  
It is estimated that upwards of 35,000 refugees from Belgium have arrived on the Straits of Dover since last Wednesday.  
The French Society of Authors and Dramatists have expelled its German members, including Humperdinck, Suderman, Hauptmann and Wagner.

The London press is agitating against the employment of Germans in the hotels of the city. Three of the largest hotels have dismissed all of their German employees. Several important hotels, however, are managed by Germans and want no English help.  
Berlin has issued facsimiles of letter alleged to have been written by Colonel Gordon and Lieutenant-Colonel Neish, of the Gordon Highlanders, German prisoners, acknowledging the use of dum-dum bullets.  
A German spy, wearing the uniform of a Belgian soldier, was arrested on his arrival at Dover among the Belgian refugees.  
Rome reports that all Italians, or Austrians of Italian nationality, have been discharged from the Trieste dockyards.  
Vanni Marcoux, a member of the Boston Opera Company, is reported killed while fighting in the French army.

Polish girls are said to be aiding the Russians in the digging of trenches on the banks of the Vistula.  
At a meeting of the commandants of the Orange Free State a resolution was passed declaring the rebellion of Colonel Moritz a blot on the fame of the Boers.  
Queen Elizabeth, of the Belgians, is with her husband at the front.  
Edward Joseph Wolfsohn, an American citizen, was condemned in London to a fine of \$405, or two months' imprisonment in default.

**RUSSIAN WINTER ADDS NEW HORRORS TO WAR**  
The rapid approach of winter has added new horrors to the fighting in the forces of Russia. The correspondent of the Novoe Vremya, who was with Rennenkampf's army during the fighting in the Suwalki district, reports that Red Cross rescue parties searching the dense undergrowth of Augustow forests for wounded, found a number of bodies partly eaten by wolves. In this region are vast tracts never trodden by man before the battle that resulted in the retreat of the Germans occurred. At one point searchers found a Uhlan who had been trod by a pack of wolves. He stood them off until his ammunition was exhausted and then managed to climb a tree, though wounded. He said a helpless comrade had been devoured by the ravenous beasts.

**NORWEGIANS COMPLAIN.**  
British Seizures of Vessels Alleged to Be Carrying Contraband a Hardship.  
Christiania, Oct. 20.—Considerable comment is being made in the Norwegian press upon British seizures of Norwegian vessels, an almost daily occurrence. The Trade and Shipping Gazette says: "The restrictions placed upon neutral trade by the regulations concerning contraband may be troublesome, but they are bearable provided shippers are correctly informed as to what is contraband and what are the regulations affecting it. Difficulty, however, arises when shippers are ignorant of these regulations, or having been informed of them find that they are not being carried out."  
"Neutral countries are loyally deferring to the wishes of the nations now at war provided their legitimate interests are not sacrificed."
