"THE LAST DAYS OF POMPEII."

MARVEL IN MOTION PICTURES.

"The Last Days of Pompeii" at The Westholme Tonight.

There are so many ideally beautiful scenes in George Kleine's photo-drama production, "The Last Days of Pompeii," that it is difficult to find any to praise more than the others. Among the unusual episodes, however, that are particularly pleasing to the discriminatingly artistic spectators are those showing Glaucus and Ione floating down the Bay of Naples in their beautiful barge, attended only by their slaves and slowly developing that glorious, steadfast love that sustained them later in the terrible ordeals that befel them—and the scene showing Ione at her bath, receiving the message from Arbaces to come to the temple. This is one of the most beautiful pictures of the group and gives an excellent idea of the luxurious manner in which the wealthy ancients performed these functions. "The Last Days of Pompeii" is a photo-dramatization of Lord Bulwer-Lytton's widely read romantic novel and is announced for tonight and tomorrow night at The Westholme opera house, with a matinee on Thursday afternoon at 4 p. m.
