Washington, Oct. 27.—The German ambassador, Count Bernstorff, said today that early in the European war he had assured the United States government that whatever the outcome of the conflict, Germany would respect the Monroe Doctrine. * * *

SIDELIGHTS ON THE WAR.

The American hospital ship Red Cross has returned from Europe, arriving off Sandy Hook on Friday night. * * *

French customs officers have seized on the Spanish border a quantity of blankets consigned from Spain to Switzerland, but believed to be destined for the German army. * * *

Field Marshal von der Goltz, military governor of Belgium, declares that the summoning of the Belgian army of three military classes is invalid, and that he will hold responsible the relatives of those who obey the call. * * *

The death of Prince Maximilian of Hesse, a nephew of the Kaiser, on a battlefield in France, has been confirmed. * * *

In the British casualty list of October 18, ten officers are listed, including Sir R. G. V. Duff, of the Second Life Guards, and twenty-nine wounded. * * *

Lord John Cavendish, nephew of the Duke of Devonshire, has been killed in action. * * *

Some of the refugees returning to Antwerp have again left that city, declaring conditions unsafe. * * *

London newspapers, continuing their campaign against Germans in England, demand the suppression of German first-class clubs. * * *

Germany declares that the calling out of the landsturm is unnecessary, as enormous numbers of the Landwehr are still available. * * *

The French parliament will assemble for the winter session at Paris and not at Bordeaux. * * *

German aeroplanes coming near Paris on Friday were chased away by French aviators. * * *

The Austrian government has canceled its contract with the Cunard Company for the transportation of emigrants. * * *

The American tanker Sun, of Philadelphia, bound for Amsterdam, has gone to Fairmouth. * * *

The Rockefeller tankers Brindilla and Platuria, detained by the British at Halifax and Stornoway, Scotland, will be released if it can be shown that their transfer from the German to the American flag was bona fide, and if they have not been guilty of any overt breach of neutrality. * * *

MANAGER STALLINGS TO APPEAR ON STAGE

New York, Oct. 26.—George T. Stallings, manager of the world's champion Boston Braves, finally has succumbed to the siren call of Dives. The "Big Chief" has signed a contract to appear in vaudeville and will make his debut at the Palace Theatre this week. Stallings is preparing for himself a monologue dealing with the comedies, tragedies and melodramas of the diamond. The salary which caused Stallings to fall is the largest ever given a diamond celebrity for stage work. * * *

AIRCRAFT ARE USED BY ENEMY IN MARCH ON CITY OF WARSAW

London, Oct. 26.—"During their unsuccessful march on Warsaw, the Germans sent aeroplanes daily to throw bombs into that city for the purpose of terrifying the populace. Very little material damage was done, but a number of persons were killed or wounded. On October 19, no fewer than fourteen bombs were thrown, killing nine persons and wounding fifty-six others, including women and children." * * *

SENDS \$1,000 TO FRANCE.

At a meeting of the Seattle Franco-American Relief Association this week the treasurer reported that 5,000 francs (\$1,000) had been forwarded to the president of the Central Relief Committee in Paris, Gabriel Hanotaux, ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs. 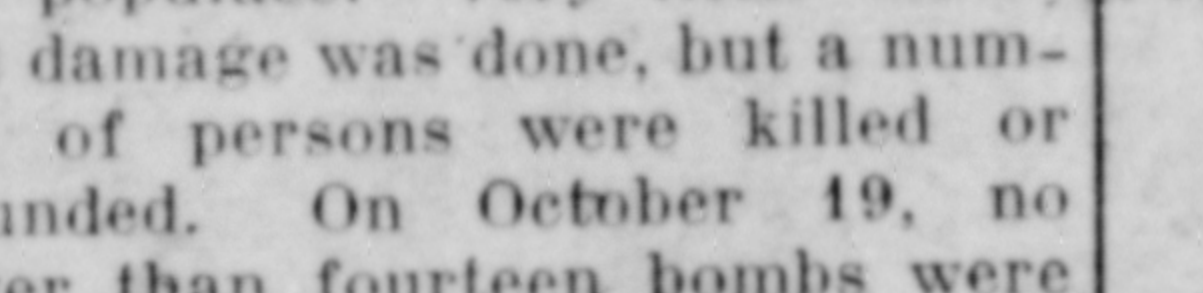

VANCOUVER BROKER COMMITS SUICIDE

Leander Shaw of Ross & Shaw Dead at His Home in Talton Place. * * *

Mr. Leander Shaw, partner in the firm of Ross and Shaw, insurance brokers, Vancouver, shot himself with a revolver in his home, 4946 Fifteenth Avenue West, Saturday morning. * * *

The police say Mr. Shaw committed suicide by placing a revolver in his mouth and pulling the trigger. He was 56 years of age and had been a resident of Vancouver for twelve years. He was born in Nova Scotia. He leaves a son and two daughters and a brother, his wife having predeceased him. * * *

Mr. H. G. Ross, Mr. Shaw's partner, stated that he knew no reason why his partner should end his life. He was with Mr. Shaw until 9 o'clock the evening previous, and nothing at that time seemed further from his thoughts. Mr. Ross did not even know that his partner possessed a revolver. * * *
