Even the Germans know the tune of "Tipperary," according to a sergeant-major of the Goldstream Guards. "Our advanced outposts heard one day singing from the German lines and soon made out 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary.' Our men joined in."—Old Country Ex.

**MONTHLY MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE**

The Board of trade last night confirmed the appointment of Mr. F. S. Wright as publicity commissioner to continue the work of Mr. P. F. Godenrath until the end of the year. Mr. Wright is in close touch with the newspaper world in London and will be able to obtain for Prince Rupert a good deal of notice in Old Country papers. In addition he has a very intimate personal knowledge of land and mining conditions in this district.

A committee was received from Port Arthur requesting the co-operation of the board in urging upon the Dominion government the necessity of state aid to farmers. The board did not feel called upon to endorse the exact form suggested by Port Arthur but decided to draw up a more general resolution and forward it to the proper authorities.

It was decided to defer the appointment of a delegate to wait on the Minister of Marine and Fisheries until the House is in session.

Rev. M. O. Waldal, the superintendent for the Dominion of Canada of the Norwegian Lutheran Church, who has been in the city for a few days with a view to establishing a regular congregation here, left for the East on the train this morning. **TACOMA FOOTBALLERS TO HELP BELGIAN FUND**

Tacoma, Nov. 14.—Plans for holding a football game here to raise from \$50,000 to \$75,000 for the sufferers in Belgium are being prepared by the Tacoma Commercial Club and Chamber of commerce. The Tacoma Stadium will seat 40,000 persons. It is planned, if possible, to have the University of Washington play one of its inter-collegiate games here for the benefit or import another team and play an inter-sectional championship contest, the proceeds of which will be contributed toward the purchase of supplies for the starving Belgians.

**In the Letter Box**

To the Editor of The News.

Dear Sir,—I would like to bring home to the inhabitants of this city and district the necessity of keeping before them the practical certainty, that more men will be required to go from here to fight for the Empire's existence. It is only natural that after the excitement and enthusiasm of sending forth our first overseas contingent that there should be a slight apathy and reaction, and some may even think that Prince Rupert has done her share.

The following is taken from a speech by the Prime Minister at the Guildhall on September 4, 1914:

"It would be a criminal mistake to underestimate either the magnitude, the fighting quality, or the staying power of the forces which are arrayed against us; but it would be equally foolish, and equally indefensible to belittle our own resources whether for resistance or for attack."

The men of Prince Rupert have come gallantly forward so far, and I hope that those remaining will see the urgency of the cause, and will therefore prepare themselves for future calls by getting and keeping themselves physically fit.

I would also express the hope that the militia authorities will again start the drills, which have been discontinued since the departure of our first overseas company.
