ILLUMINATIONS PLANNED FOR PEAKS AT BANFF

searchlights May Be Installed on Mountain Tops at Mountain Resort.

Calgary, Alta., Nov. 18.—If suitable arrangements can be made in regard to the power the tops of the mountains in the vicinity of Banff will be illuminated by electric lights, searchlights will be installed at different places and Banff in the evening hours will be a veritable fairy kingdom of scintillating lights. The idea is to utilize the power which the government intends to exploit in the vicinity of the mountain resorts, generate electricity and establish a large electric lighting plant.

Commissioner Clarke has received authority from the government to make extensive improvements and it seems to be the intention of the authorities to convert Banff into one of the beauty spots of the world.

MOOSE JAW EDITOR GRANTED A PATENT

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—E. J. McMillan, of the Moose Jaw News, has been granted a patent for a look-out mask for locomotives and mail cars. The object of the invention is protection for engineers and mail clerks in rough weather, and still afford them an open port of vision. It has been tested and adopted by the controller of railway mail service, and has successfully stood the severest test of the engineers of the board of railway commissioners.

THE BRITISH SINK GERMAN SUBMARINES

London, Nov. 18.—"By the novel means of dredging the channel bottom with chains, to which were attached powerful explosives, it is believed that the German submarine which had been attempting daring raids in the vicinity of Dover has been blown up," says the Daily Telegraph.

"A heavy explosion under water and the appearance of oil on the surface, seems to bear this out. Naval men believe that the raider was hoarding her power by remaining on the channel bottom for lengthy periods.

"Another German submarine which has been particularly troublesome to the ships of the flotilla engaged in the bombardment of the Belgian coast also is reported to have been sunk.

"There is no confirmation of the above."

MORE THAN TWENTY THOUSAND TROOPS

Will Leave Canada When the Second Contingent Sails in January.

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—The second Canadian division will include 15,272 officers and men, 4,775 horses, 58 field and heavy guns and 16 machine guns. It has been expected that a certain amount of reinforcements would be sent along with the second contingent, but the request for two months' reinforcements for all infantry to go with the main body will mean that an extra six battalions, or 6,000 men, will be required besides the 15,272 officers and men. This will make a force of 21,000 to sail in January.

The two brigades of infantry will have 3,654 men. The nine field batteries of artillery and one heavy battery, with ammunition columns, etc., will have 3,379 men, 3,117 horses and 58 guns. Two field companies of engineers will have 474 men and 160 horses, while there will be 200 men in the cyclist unit and 171 men with 80 horses in the signal corps. The divisional train of four companies of the Army Service Corps will have 451 men and 378 horses. The medical service will include three field ambulances with 726 men and 178 horses.

The above sections are now being mobilized at the different divisional centers. In addition, four regiments of mounted infantry are mobilizing though they do not form part of the second army division. Mobilization has not yet begun of certain parts of the second contingent, including the line of communication, which will require 464 men for the divisional ammunition parks; 289 men and 358 horses for reserve, 92 men for field bakery, 265 for supply columns, 20 men for field butchery, 61 for railway supply detachments and 26 for depot units of supply.
