THE REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY *

Severe Criticism of the Sanitary Condition Prevailing at Central School and Objection to Fire Escapes at Borden School.

At the sitting of the Supreme Court this morning the Grand Jury brought in the following report:

"Hon. Mr. Justice Clement.

"Your Lordship,-The Grand Jury visited a number of public buildings, and desire to make the following report and recommendations:

"The fire-escapes at the new schoolhouse on Borden Street appear to be unsubstantially built. are not wide enough and should extend to the ground. At the present time there is a drop of eight or ten feet.

"At the Central School, in Section Six, the toilets were found in a most disgraceful state. It is surprising that such a condition could exist. It is a menace to the health and welfare of the many children who attend this school. In addition to being put into a sanitary condition, the various apartments should be enclosed.

"At the schoolhouse at Seal Cove, it is thought that a door should be made at each end of the basement of the building. As the playrooms are in the basement, these doors are essential for exit in case of fire.
