## MEMBERS OF COMMONS WILL FOREGO SALARIES

Resolution to Be Introduced in London Expresses Generous Sentiment.

London, Dec. 5.—J. F. P. Rawlinson, Unionist member of Parliament from Cambridge University, has given notice of his intention to move in the House Commons a resolution providing that the salaries of members of Parliament be discontinued, while the salaries of ministers are to be reduced to the basis of those given in 1906. The resolution recites that this action is taken in view of the drain on the finances of the country.

Members of Parliament get a salary of \$2,000. Such payment was provided for in August, 1911, when a resolution to that effect, introduced by David Lloyd George, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, was adopted. Previously members had served without pay.

The salaries of members of the Cabinet range from 2,000 to 10,000 pounds. The latter sum is paid to the Lord Chancellor. The Premier and the Lord of the Privy Seal serve without pay.

## GEORGE T. KANE VS. BROUGHTON-M'NEILL

Suit Was for \$5,000 Damages and the Court Gave Him One Hundred Dollars.

The little dispute which has been stirring the metropolis of Aldermere to its depths for the last six months was compromised in court yesterday.

The principal bones of contention seem to have been found on a garbage pile which during Mr. Kane's absentee-landlordship accumulated on his property; suspiciously close to the hotel and stables of the defendants.

Mr. Kane, in August, 1904, filed his scrip under the South African War Land Act on the quarter section immediately south of Aldermere.

The land was Crown granted in 1905 and from that time until June this year was left to look after itself.

Six months ago Mr. Kane took a trip to have a look at his ranch and being something of a surveyor decided to explore the property and draw a map of it. As a preliminary he dropped into Mr. Thorp's real estate office at Aldermere to find the lay of the land.

Mr. Thorp pointed out the southern boundary of the townsite, and working from this Mr. Kane discovered survey posts on his own northern boundary and slashed the line.

He was surprised to find quite a number of buildings on his property and on making inquiries found that they belonged to Messrs. Broughton & McNeill, the proprietors of Aldermere Hotel. McNeill had taken advantage of the natural conditions and installed a pumping plant on Kane's land to supply the town with wa-

ter. The other buildings he had purchased from time to time to house his help.

When Kane took the matter up with McNeill the latter was inclined to pooh-pooh his rights and finally told the plaintiff to do what he liked—he didn't own the land and couldn't make him move his buildings.

The plaintiff retaliated by taking out an injunction restraining the defendants from trespassing on his land, and locked up the pump house.

McNeill came to Prince Rupert and had the injunction withdrawn with respect to the pumping plant.

In addition to the buildings, Mr. Kane found a tremendous garbage pile near the back of the hotel—all sorts of rubbish, from broken bottles and sardine tins to old clothes and baling wire. This, he claimed, practically ruined four acres. The broken glass would always be a menace to cattle.

A number of witnesses were called to prove the facts and various estimates of the value of the land were given—ranging from \$25 to \$100 an acre.

After listening to the evidence for two days, His Lordship finally made up his mind that the trouble was nothing but a neighborly quarrel. He interrupted Mr. Manson in his examination of his first witness, Mr. McNeill, with: "I don't see what you people have to fight about. Why don't you take your machinery and give Kane his land and \$100 to clean up the garbage pile, and let the witnesses get home on the train tomorrow?"

Mr. Manson said that was just what he wanted.

Mr. Patmore, for the plaintiff, said they were willing to give up the machinery but didn't want the defendants trespassing further on
