## NOTED SOCIALIST RESENTS FALSE CHARGES OF GERMANS

REFUTES CHARGE THAT BRITAIN CAUSED THE WAR—GERMANY ONLY POWER WHICH REFUSED TO REFER TO CONFERENCE OF NATIONS.

Mr. Blatchford, who contributed to the Weekly Dispatch an earnest argument for quicker and more extensive recruiting of our young men between 19 and 30, and urged that the government should promise one pound a week pension for widows and disabled men and one pound a week separation allowance for wives and other dependents, dealt also with our position in the war by means of a scathing "Open Letter" addressed to Privy Councillor Witting, president of the National Bank of Germany.

Herr Witting stated to an American newspaper correspondent that England brought on this war, and exclaimed in an outburst of malevolence, "God! how we hate England and the English!"

### What England Has Not Done.

Mr. Blatchford's reply is as follows:

"You say, Herr Witting, that 'England, and England alone, brought on this criminal war, out of greed and out of envy, to crush Germany.' If you are not too excited to listen, I will beg leave to point out to you that it was not an Englishman who murdered the Austrian Archduke. It was not the British who dictated the Austrian note to Serbia. When Russia, Austria and Serbia seemed to be at a deadlock and Sir Edward Grey proposed a conference of the powers, it was not Britain which held back; it was Germany which refused.

"Then, again, the British did not ask Germany to declare war with Russia nor with France. At the time when Austria had declared war upon Russia and was mobilizing to attack France, the British government was still urging peace upon all the powers. These are facts, Herr Witting, and although, to be frank, we would rather have your hatred than your friendship, preferring the genuine to the spurious article, still these facts do not justify the hatred which you have expressed with so much rhetoric and so little dignity.

"Again it was Germany and not Britain which violated the neutrality of Belgium. You do not explain, Herr Witting, why the Germans invaded Belgium, nor why, having forced a passage and secured their advance, they turned to destroy the Belgian villages and cities and to exterminate the Belgian people.

"Britain did not wish for this war and tried to prevent it. I know my countrymen very well (I have reason) and I know that they did not want war with Germany, and were very hard to convince that the German intentions were not equally pacific.

"The British people were content to jog along in their own easy way. They were what you call 'decadent.' They had no love for the howitzer or for the goose-step, and no desire to domineer over anyone; just a decadent people, hating swank and bloodshed and loving best their football and their music-halls and their races and their creature comforts. Envy? The country was full of Germans. There were German merchants and German manufacturers and German clerks and managers and artisans and waiters all over the place, and though most of these Germans were the meanest kind of spies, our people never suspected and, in fact, would not believe it. Talk of greed! We allowed all your goods to come into Britain duty free, although you put up tariffs against ours.

### Colonies By The Sword

"We did not envy you or covet your possessions. We have great Colonies, dependencies, a great Empire. We only ask to be let alone. You had no colonies and no Empire worth mentioning. Why should we envy you? Is it

not more reasonable to suppose that you envied us? You assured the world that you needed room for expansion. You said you must have colonies and that the only means for obtaining colonies was the sword. And then you thought it was mean of us to form alliances. You said we wanted to strangle you. And yet you had a Triple Alliance before we had our Triple Entente. Do you hate us for defending ourselves, you who speak so passionately of your determination to defend your own country?

"You told the American gentleman that you only felt pity for France. You must have a low estimate of American intelligence. Do you think the world has forgotten your rush for Paris and your desire to seize the French colonies and your often avowed intention so to 'crush France that she should never again cross your path'?

"Do you suppose the French have forgotten how you bullied and insulted them since 1870, how you shelled their cities and burned their villages, and looted their houses, and outraged their women and murdered their priests?

"You call the British hypocrites. You imply that we did not go to war in defence of Belgium, but in defence of our own interests. Suppose that it is true, what right have you to complain? You say that colonies must be won by the sword and held by the sword. You are out to capture what you may, but when we defend what we have won you call us criminals and hypocrites, and say you hate us.

"You make a point of our going to the 'help of the French. But did not Germany go to the help of the Austrians? What is an alliance worth if one may not help one's allies?

### Spoiled the German Game

"On the whole I submit to you, Herr Witting, that the reasons you give for hating us are inadequate, and I suggest that there is another reason. We have spoiled your game. We have spoiled your deep-laid plan for defeating Europe in detail. You meant to conquer and dismember France and then you meant to punish us and plunder our Empire.

"We know that in order to glut your rage you will shrink from no baseness or savagery in your rabid haste to do us harm. But we do not hate you as you hate us. It is not in our nature to nurse so black and venomous a malice. We do not hate you, but we do not trust you, and we cannot respect you. You have earned the scorn and condemnation of all decent people. Centuries of atonement will not wash clean the name of Germany.

"Still, I offer you sound advice. Do not talk so much; you will need your wind when it comes to the in-fighting. Curb your vile temper, consider your liver, Herr Witting; these emotional blizzards, besides being rather contemptible, are bound to shorten your valuable life. What a loss would that be to civilization, to Christianity, to culture."

## PITIFUL STORIES FROM THE BATTLEFIELD

A pathetic story of scenes after the battle is told by a private of the Royal Army Medical Corps, now at home wounded.

"Ours is terribly sad work. You see sights that would melt the hardest heart imaginable. Passing over the battlefield at Soissons I came on two men who had died of their wounds before we could reach them.

"One was a British artilleryman and the other a Saxon rifleman. They lay side by side, and each wore a peaceful expression

that suggested lifelong friendship.

"In the throes of death the hands of the two foemen had become entwined, and no one would have dreamt that just a few hours before they had met in deadly hate.

"In the shade of an oak tree I found a man of the Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. He had been dead for hours. Around him all was still as the tombs.

"In his hands were tightly clenched three photos, one of a woman of about 30, and the others of a little girl about three and a baby of a few months. Beside him lay a tress of bright golden hair, and down his grimy cheeks tear tracks were to be seen.

### Wounded German Refuses Aid.

"I came next to a badly wounded German cavalryman. He was almost delirious, and was calling for water. I stooped down and held a bottle to his lips.

"He made to drink, but before doing so looked up with a kindly expression in his eyes. In a flash he recognized me, and the gentle look gave way to one of intense hatred.

"'Englishe,' he hissed, 'Nein, nein,' and turned away from me, clutching the damp grass convulsively in his agony. I tried to soothe him, but it was no good. And I had to leave him, in the hope that some of his own men would pick him up."

What it feels like to meet a man in mortal combat was described by a lance-corporal of the Suffolk regiment which is now in the hospital at Brighton.

"In the excitement of firing at regular distances you never think much of what you are doing, but at close quarters with the bayonet, when a man is at your mercy, it's another story.

"Then you have the horror of killing brought home to you, and it takes some doing. My first experience of that was at Landre-ecies.

"I had been fighting with a big German whose bayonet was no more use to him than a toasting fork, and all the while I was debating with myself whether I should run him through or only disarm him.

### "I Became an Avenging Fury."

"Like a flash there came to my mind the picture of a blackened cottage in Belgium, with an old man, a woman, and a little girl weeping bitterly. All thought of mercy was swept from my mind, and I was transformed into an avenging fury charged with the mission of exacting payment for the woes of these poor peasants.

"That's one for the little girl," I shouted madly as I ran him through the chest. 'There's one for the woman, and that's another for the old man,' I cried, as I gave him two thrusts in rapid succession. Then I gave him a fourth by way of interest."
