ports say that Emperor William
is suffering from pneumonia
combined with nervous depres-
sion due to over-exertion. The
doctors have advised him not to
return to the front.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

The case of Philpott vs. Beatty
was settled out of court. Phil-
pott was applying for an order to
set aside a judgment by consent
for \$5,333, given by the Prince
Rupert Fish & Cold Storage Com-
pany, Limited, to Mr. Beatty
shortly before the company went
into liquidation. This judgment
is now set aside by consent of
Mr. Beatty. There was also a
counter claim of Mr. Beatty that
Mr. Philpott's judgment, \$2,500,
be also set aside. This was dis-
missed. Mr. Philpott securing
his judgment. The liquidators
of the company, the Continental
Trust Company, are also secured
for \$50 damages caused by the
sheriff in levying on Beatty's
judgment. It is understood that
in view of settlement out of court
Mr. Philpott and the defend-
ant company rebated a portion of the
cost by way of compromise. F.
Peters, K. C., acted for Mr. Phil-
pott; A. M. Manson for the liqui-
dator of the Prince Rupert Fish &
Cold Storage Company, and W.
O. Fulton for Mr. Beatty. Mr.
Beatty is a prominent financier
of Toronto.

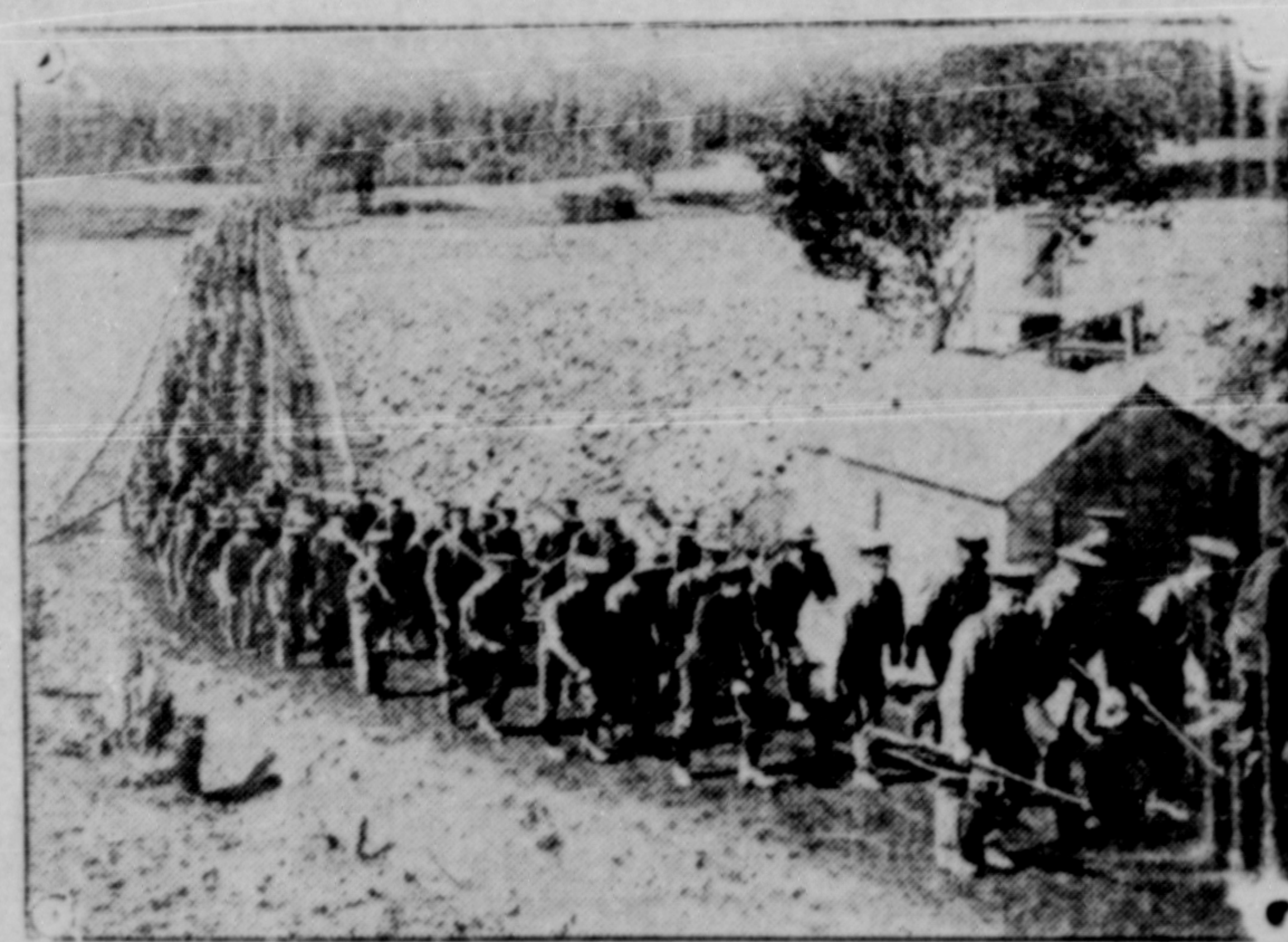

of the Empire. Color Sergeant J.
E. Hammond on counting the
number of gifts found that it
would be impossible to supply
every man in the ranks—there be-
ing some twenty-two short—so
the boys drew for the presents.
Needless to say every man among
those who were lucky to draw a
gift was highly appreciative of
the kind thought that prompted
those whose nimble hands had
fashioned his present, and before
leaving there is no doubt that ev-
ery one will be a recipient of some
token from the ladies of Prince
Rupert.

There have been many visitors
from the north out at the camp
since my last letter, including
Major J. H. McMullin, Lieuten-
ant Pettigrew and Lieutenant
Bullock-Webster, of the Prince
Rupert Light Infantry; A. W.
Edge, who sent up a box of ap-
ples for every section; George
Kerr and several others. Among
the wives of the men in Victoria
just now are Mrs. George Gibson,
Mrs. Reitel, Mrs. Percy Goden-
rath, and Mrs. Leslie, who will
be down here until the departure
of the 30th. Mrs. Captain C. W.
Peck has been a guest at the Em-
press Hotel since her arrival in
the south.

A further period of two weeks
has been given probationary non-
commissioned officers of B. Com-
pany to qualify and everyone is
keen in attending both company
and non-com. lectures, so that
when the crucial day arrives they
will at least have had an oppor-
tunity of learning much of the
ethics of soldiering, and it will
be up to them to make good to
hold their stripes.

The Willows Camp has now at
least 2,000 troops, as besides the
30th Overseas Battalion there are
nearly 500 B. C. Horse and the
commands of the Fifth (Artill-
ery) Regiment, the 88th Fusiliers
and the 50th Highlanders. These
last two regiments are now taking
on recruits, that will pass later
on into the Third Canadian Con-
tingent for active service, and
with the Fifth Regiment also sup-
ply the men to man the defences
at Esquimalt and other points on
Vancouver Island. Every exhibi-
tion building is occupied to its
capacity and scores of tents were
erected this morning to take care
of the 350 troopers of the B. C.
Horse who are due in camp this
afternoon.

S. HAZELTON MURDER CRIME RECONSTRUCTED

ed trousers and washed them in
the river. He found only one pad-
dle in the boat and, leaving bot-
tle and blood-stained coat and
cuff, started off to the ferry to get
another. He found the ferryboat
unlocked and in his dazed condi-
tion forgot the evidence he left
behind and went straight home.
He threw away the blood-stained
shirt on the trail and arrived at
his cabin about 12:40 a. m. in his
underclothes.

Mr. Adair Carss ably summed
up the case for the defence. He
pointed out that no witness had
been produced who knew both
men and saw them together on
the evening of the 28th. He em-
phasized the difficulty of identifi-
cation on so dark a night. Circ-
umstantial evidence is proverbially
dangerous and in this case
each link is very incomplete. The
jury must consider a man inno-
cent until he is proved guilty be-
yond a reasonable doubt. Every
step in this case was surrounded
with doubt. He asked for ac-
quittal.

His Lordship in charging the
jury said circumstantial evidence
is often stronger than direct evi-
dence. It is not usual for a man
to commit murder in the presence
of eye-witnesses. Where facts
might be easily explained, and the
defence did not do so, the infer-
ence was fairly against the accus-
ed. For instance, why had the
defence not brought evidence to
show where the accused was after
6 p. m. on September 28, if he
was not with the deceased. Drunk-
ness was no excuse for murder
unless the murderer were abso-
lutely incapable of forming an in-
tent. Whether the murderer of
Taylor was in this condition or
not, the jury could judge from
the position of the fatal wounds.

The jury retired at 3:50 p. m.
and returned at 4:50 to ask for
further definitions of "murder"
and "manslaughter." His Lord-
ship gave this information, and
fifteen minutes later the jury
brought in the verdict of guilty.
