**BELLA COOLA NOTES**

F. A. Johnson and J. Hober, of Firvale, visited town on Wednesday. Mr. Johnson brought down a full load of farm produce consigned to Victoria as his contribution to the Belgian relief fund.

Good progress is being made on the extensive repairs to the wharf. Foreman McCloskey is now being favored with fine weather and able to get in full time. Several of the men engaged on the work have taken involuntary duckings in the cold waters of the harbor, but so far with no serious result.

The farmers of the valley are taking full advantage of the fine dry weather and are busily engaged in the hard task of land clearing. The Saloomt sawmill at Hagensborg has a number of men engaged cutting shingle bolts, and no one is idle.

The local Conservative held a meeting at the Mackenzie School on Saturday last, but as no report of the proceedings is to hand we are unable to state the nature of the business transacted. It is said several new members were enrolled, although strange to say, at the last election the Liberals polled the largest vote.

## In the Letter Box

Editor, The Daily News.

Dear Sir,—Would you favor me with a space for the following letter in reply to a letter published in The News on December 11, by a person who goes by the nom de plume of "Merchant." Now, I am not enthusiastic over the mail order business and never have been. I, like many others, cling to the city and do the best I possibly can for it but when "Merchant" says we all get our living in this locality, I doubt it a great deal. Further on he says, "Who pays our taxes, helps the needy, looks after the poor or supplies the unemployed?" Well, the majority of businessmen in this town have no property and only a business license which they vote on, but do they help the poor or help the needy? I do not think so as here in Rupert we have very few poor people compared with other cities in the Dominion, where "thousands" today are starving just where the mail order houses are located. Well, let us come to the last question he asks, "Who supplies our unemployed?" I must admit that some of "our" merchants do so with the absolute necessities of life and charge a most magnificent price for whatever he sells, but in regard to work wherewith a man obtains his dollars to pay for his goods the local merchants do absolutely nothing, as will be seen by the citizens of this town having to parade on the enforced idle list for six months of every year. Only the other day some sixty men landed here from Vancouver to work on the drydock and already we have twenty citizens, at the least, who follow the same line of work idle in town here waiting anxiously for that very work—yet the stranger gets first chance. Now they are still waiting. And this kind of thing is going on at regular intervals. What are these strangers doing for the town? They get the work, get the money, and get through with the work and leave town, taking the money out of town with them. Those who have been here two or three years have to stand by for the newcomers all the time. Now if this "Merchant" is a member of the Board of Trade let him start some plan whereby his townspeople are going to benefit and if there is any work going on let the stranger within our gates come after the citizens for charity starts at home and thus show the citizen who requires work how to support the town and home merchants. We all know this to be a strenuous time and when the prices of foodstuffs come down in comparison to the standard of wages paid in this locality and the merchants start some co-operative plan—if this mail order business is still as bad then let the merchants "holler and growl."

Mr. George Morrow stated at a banquet the other week that fresh meat is still as high priced as it was in the earliest days of this city. Why? Because the butchers know the people cannot possibly get fresh meat from the mail order house. I think a little common sense on the part of the local merchants will alleviate a great deal of this trouble and keep this city out of the state that other cities in the Dominion of Canada have got into. Hoping some person more able than myself will give some ideas to start a co-operative system, I am, yours truly,
