HOW GERMANS SHOULD BE USED

The Order-in-Council passed by the Borden government soon after the war broke out, has been quoted, and the question has been raised as to how far it applies to the employment of Germans or Austrians in Canada. We quote: "All persons in Canada of German or Austro-Hungarian nationality, so long as they quietly pursue their ordinary avocations, shall be allowed to continue to enjoy the protection of the law, and be accorded the respect and consideration due to peaceful and law-abiding citizens, and that they be not arrested, detained, or interfered with unless there is reasonable ground to believe that they are engaged in espionage, or engaging or attempting to engage in acts of a hostile nature, or are giving or attempting to give information to the enemy, or unless they otherwise contravene the law."

We are concerned not so much with the strict legal effect of this order, as with its spirit. Broadly speaking, it is a declaration of the policy of Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues, and we have no hesitation in saying that the policy is wise and just. The duty of the government is to act, as far as possible, so that the allies may win a victory over Germany. It is not a public duty to try to add to the discomforts and troubles of Germans who happen to reside in Canada. It is a public duty to remove from such persons all opportunity and temptation to interfere with our policy of helping Great Britain and our allies.

The spirit and meaning of the Order-in-Council is that our Canadian watchword is to be duty, not hatred. Nothing great was ever achieved by hatred. Hatred does not build up our powers, but wastes them and burns them out. But there is no limit to the achievements of duty and goodwill. The patriotism that will make Canada a great nation is constructive, not destructive. Our war against Germany is against what is destructive, not against what is constructive in Germany. We are fighting German guns and armies and battleships. How many times has it been said in England and in this country since the beginning of the war that we are fighting, not the German people, but the German system of government?

The Dominion Order-in-Council, apart from its strict legal effect, is a guide to patriotic duty. It means that Canadians must be always thinking, not of means of gratifying passion, but of means of helping Great Britain and her allies; and also of means of maintaining the loftiest standards of British justice.—Globe.

BELGIANS ALL RETURN TO WAR, SAYS NURSE

Miss Mitchell, Toronto Graduate, Writes From Canadian Hospital at Folkestone.

"In all our cases so far we have just had three Englishmen and all the rest are Belgians," writes Miss G. Mitchell, a Toronto nurse who is at present in the Canadian hospital at Folkestone in Kent. "The Belgians are wonderful. They are so patient and gentle, and say 'Merci, beaucoup,' for everything we do for them. They brought a boy of seventeen in last week, and as they carried him in with his eyes closed he looked just like a baby. He was such a dear little fellow. We got the bullet out, and now he is getting better and wants to go back to fight again."

"The only time the Belgians grow bitter is when they talk of the Germans and the terrible things they have done to their women and children. Then their faces grow savage. Some of the true stories they tell us are fearful, and something will happen when they meet those fiends again. I should like to be there. None of the Belgians speak English, so the nurses are polishing up their French."

"The work is tremendous. We often have as many as forty emergency cases all at once, and I spent all yesterday in the operating room. We are so tired at night that we just lie down with our clothes on. The officers and men brought in are so dazed that they say they hear the noise of the shells in their ears for several days after leaving the battlefield. They are all suffering from nervous shock. On a clear, quiet day here we can hear the boom of the guns, and it is quite an easy thing to see France across the Channel."

"The Duchess of Albany visited us yesterday, and the Queen has sent her lady-in-waiting down. She is so pleased with the work the Canadian girls are doing that she is preparing little medals for them to wear to commemorate her visit. It is possible that we will be sent to the front soon, but nothing definite has been heard. You will have been told, of course, that the wounds of the men are terrible."

FRENCH PARLIAMENT IS ORDERED TO ASSEMBLE

National Debt Record of Nation Brought Back in Ten Railroad Cars.

Paris, Dec. 15. — President Poincare presided over a meeting of the French cabinet this morning at the palace of the Elysee. All the ministers were present with the exception of the minister of war, Alexandre Millerand, who is at Bordeaux. A decree was signed setting December 22 as the date of the opening of both houses of parliament.

The minister of finance, Alexandre Ribot, explained the bill referring to provisional monthly credits, after which the cabinet decided to request parliament to vote six provisional monthly credits in order to avoid the national defence having to exist from hand to mouth, and so that the armed forces may be able to continue the war with necessary energy.

The ledger of the national debt, containing the names of the holders of bonds which are inscribed as distinguished from those payable to bearer was brought to Paris again from Bordeaux. It required ten cars to transport the ledger.

One of the details of the German plan was to seize this vast book and use it to exact indemnity as, if sequestered, the government and also private finance would be thrown into confusion.

All the government offices in Paris are bustling with the newly arrived officials and clerks. Thousands of tons of state papers have arrived daily and nightly from Bordeaux since December 1.
