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MASK FOR GERMAN
NAVAL INACTIVITY

Enemy Manufactures Strange
Yarn About Losses to
British Fleet

London, Dec. 20.—A Louvain
despatch to the Daily News states
that on Tuesday afternoon six
trains of troops passed through
there toward Flanders. They
were all lads between eighteen
and twenty years of age. Late the
same afternoon three trains of
German wounded arrived, to-
gether with a train of prisoners,
with three machine guns and a
quantity of war material. A fur-
ther force of about 7,000 infantry
from the lines in northern France
also arrived and proceeded im-
mediately to Flanders with a view
to covering the inactivity of the
German fleet.

A Strange Fabrication

The following statement ema-
nating from Antwerp is being
officially circulated in Germany:
"It can no longer be doubted that
the German guns have caused
very severe losses to the British
fleet in the English Channel. This
is proved by the innumerable
corpses of British marines which
are being thrown up on the Bel-
gian and Dutch coasts. Up to
now, in Belgium alone, over 100
of these corpses have been found
and buried. One must come to
only one conclusion: that the
German ships have wrought
havoc amongst the British war-
ships and greatly damaged many
of them."

NEW BIG HOWITZER
FOR BRITISH ARMY

Tommy Atkins calls the huge
new British howitzer designed to
outclass the German "Black Ma-
rias," Mother.

The London Morning Post
publishes an interesting letter
from an officer in the Royal Gar-
rison Artillery at the front, giv-
ing a most interesting account of
the manner in which the British
have succeeded in countering the
formidable attacks of the Ger-
man "Black Marias." This no
doubt helps to explain a good
deal that has happened lately in
Belgium. The letter is dated so
recently as November 20, and is
as follows:

"I have just come from a five-
mile ride, and as a foot of snow
covers the ground and a north-
east wind is blowing I need not
apologize for my handwriting.
Things are going well with us
still, and the optimistic outlook
still flourishes amongst us. The
Germans have raised four new
army corps of sorts, but their
attacks have in each case been
repulsed with considerable, or
rather enormous, losses. Round
Ypres the fighting still continues
in its severity, and out of a divi-
sion of the Germans, consisting
chiefly of the Prussian Guard, a
mere handful remains. We have
this on unimpeachable authority.
A German full-strength division
consists of something like 18,-
000 men, and now not 1,000 re-
main.

"The infantry immediately in
front of us have not fought any
German regulars for the past
twelve days. The prisoners we
are taking vary greatly in age,
the limits being about eighteen
to sixty, and even thirty-five.
Most of them seem absolutely
fed up with the fighting, and evi-
dently news is beginning to leak
through of German reverses in
the eastern theatre of war.
One German who was captured
evinced the utmost chagrin when
he was told that our fleet had
not, up to the present, been de-
stroyed by the German fleet, and
that to the best of our knowledge
London was not in the hands of
his countrymen. It was almost
pathetic to see his change of
front when he was finally con-
vinced of the truth of our state-
ments.

"Our artillery is being gradu-
ally reinforced, and we are able
now to reply to the German heavy
howitzers with shell that is even
weightier than their much-
vaunted Black Marias. The how-
itzer I refer to is 'Mother.' She
has been so christened by the
Tommies, and the name is not
inappropriate. She is of matronly
dimensions, but comely withal,
and has done excellent work
whilst she has been with us, and
more than one of her family of
field batteries scattered round the
front owes its existence to the at-
tention Mother has devoted to
the German eight-inch heavy
howitzers. Mother's shell weighs
300 pounds. She ranges most ac-
curately, and, indeed, she has
had four direct hits on German
guns in the past fortnight. A di-
rect hit is only recorded by the
airman when the shell actually
strikes the enemy's gun. Mother
is usually accompanied by
'Archibald,' which is one of the

new anti-aeroplane guns. Archie
is mounted on a motor-lorry and
yesterday brought down a Taube
aeroplane, much to our delight.
He fires a 13-pound shrapnel
shell and is daily becoming more
expert in his attentions to hostile
aircraft. Our five-inch battery is
still doing its good work, and is
constantly keeping hostile batter-
ies quiet.

"After a hostile battery had
been shelled a short time ago our
airman reported next day that
only four of the six German guns
had been moved to a new posi-
tion, so that it appeared that the
other two which had been left
behind were of no further use."

PRINCESS CHARLOTTE
FOR ALASKA ROUTE

Vancouver, Dec. 16.—Upon her
arrival from Vancouver on
Thursday afternoon at 4:30
o'clock, the C.P.R. steamer Prin-
cess Charlotte, Capt. Griffin, was
tied up for the winter. This an-
nouncement was made this
morning by Capt. J. W. Troup,
manager of the B. C. Coast Ser-
vice. The big coaster will be off
the triangular route for several
months, during which time she
will be altered and overhauled
preparatory to starting out in
the Alaska tourist travel early
next spring.

During the time the Princess
Charlotte is out of service the
C.P.R. will have additional oil
tanks built in the ship. At pres-
ent she cannot carry sufficient
fuel to make a round trip to
Skagway, and the company in-
tends to put new tanks in her.
Considerable other work will
have to be carried out on the
ship before she is ready to handle
the new trade. The C.P.R. ex-
pects a large number of tourists
to make the trip to Alaska next
year, and is placing in the ser-
vice one of the finest ships on the
coast.

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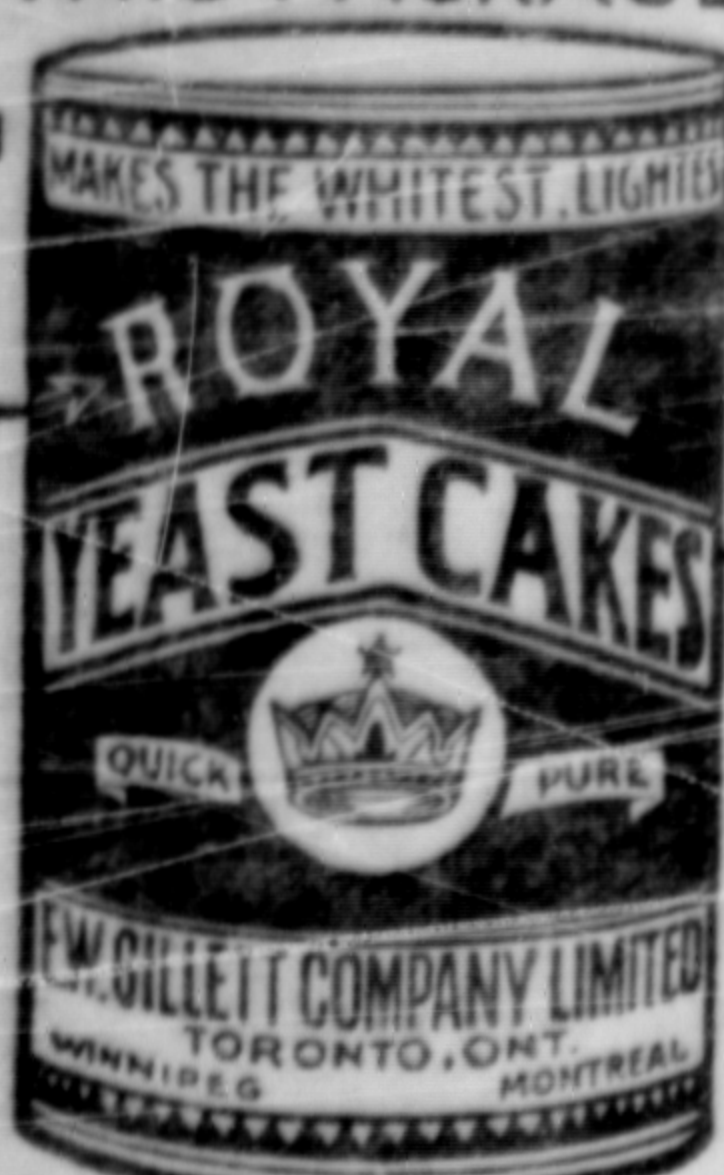
