### HARTLEPOOL CLAIMS DAMAGE TO WARSHIPS BY COAST BATTERIES

One German Light Cruiser Reported to Have Been Afire as Fleet Steamed Away to the North.

London, Dec. 22.—The Daily Telegraph's correspondent in the three bombarded towns gives the following details of the action of the German ships in their localities:

"Hartlepool—The enemy's ships were damaged by the coast batteries, which did considerable harm. One German light cruiser was afire as the fleet steamed away to the north.

"One of the killed at East Hartlepool was Adjutant Wm. Avery, of the Salvation Army, which has headquarters near the sea front.

"Whitby—The vessels steamed close in to Whitby. Their first shot lodged in the side of the east cliff, doing no damage. The range finding of the ships was faulty, and most of the shots fell short, although some of them fell as at Ruswarp, a mile inland, and much damage was done to private houses in Fishburn Park, half a mile inland.

"The damage at Meadowfield, a suburb, was chiefly to Curry's school, where the boys had just commenced their morning lessons. They fled from the school-house and took refuge in nearby places of safety.

**Made for Sea.**  
 "Scarborough—The first bombardment last twenty minutes and then stopped for three minutes while the warships turned on their course. Then it began again and lasted ten minutes, when the invaders made straight for sea at top speed.

"All the damage done here was to buildings which were without the slightest military value. There are plentiful signs of the German visitation, such as unroofed houses, shot-pierced steeples and holes in walls. Several of the central thoroughfares are littered with wreckage. There is hardly a house in the central part of the town that escaped a few broken windows."

### ITALY TO BE READY IN SPRING WITH AN ARMY OF A MILLION

WHOLE NATION DESIRES TO ASSIST IN "THE DESTRUCTION OF THE BARBARIANS," SAYS ITALIAN IN LONDON—EXPLAINS ATTITUDE OF NATION

London, Dec. 18.—Why Italy has remained neutral so long is a question which has often been asked here and discussed from various points of view. That she cannot refrain from taking part very much longer, now that Turkey has come in, is a widely expressed opinion. But Italy seems to be in no hurry. She is biding her time, and when the time comes to strike she means to strike hard.

Here is the opinion of an Italian now in London, who is cognizant of the inner workings of the Italian diplomatic mind. Italy, he believes, will take her place beside the Allies in the spring.

"The strength of Germany is truly appalling," he says. "Nevertheless she has made a grave miscalculation. In reckoning on the lightning rapidity of her action she expected to wipe out France in a month, and to subdue Russia in two months. Today the situation is much changed, and for the worse as regards Germany."

#### Expects No Russian Victory.

While the Germans have been checked and driven back in France and Belgium, he is not so sure about the permanence of Russia's check in the eastern field of warfare, nor does he look in that direction for "great and decisive victories." But even if Germany were to advance into Russia, "the greater," he believes, "will be the disaster in the wake of Germany. And all this time the army is diminishing, sickness is rife; it is becoming exhausted, while both soldiers and civilians must eat. Corn is becoming consumed and victuals will become scarce, and how is Germany going to replenish? She must conquer quickly, very quickly—in fact, immediately. A protracted campaign spells her prostration, effacement, starvation.

"In the spring the German army will have lost half its force—if not more. It will, however, still be a terrible force. All the more reason why this sinister Power, which is the curse of the whole world, must be destroyed once and for all, never to rise again in coming centuries. If Germany emerges victorious, woe to the other nations. We must overcome, humble, and wipe out Germany now and for all time. And this task is reserved for the Allies now fighting, and in particular England, and Italy, Roumania and the Balkan States; and possibly, too, for Spain.

#### All Italy Wants War.

"And once and for all regard this as certain. All parties in Italy, all men, laymen and priests, pray for, loudly invoke, desire war on Austria and Germany. You will find that when the Chamber reassembles this month every deputy will clamor for war—in the spring. No government can stand against the nation that is desirous of assisting in the destruction of the barbarians. Perhaps for the moment it is as well that Italy holds aloof; the Germans

are still terribly powerful; by springtime they will be much weaker, and then will be the time for the addition of a million fresh, well trained troops, because rest assured that Italy is now arming slowly but surely.

"England is preparing for the spring at least a million men. Italy will by then have for certain another million ready. A third million can be expected from Spain, the Balkan States and the colonies. That will mean the beginning of the end. The most terrible battles will be fought on the plains of Westphalia, in the environs of Berlin. It will be the moment for England to assume her position as the head of the world. This war is for her a question of life or death."

#### LEFT \$50,000 TO SERVANT.

Mrs. Buchard's Only Daughter Joined a Church Order in 1885.

New York, Dec. 17.—To her servant, Tillie Anderson, Mrs. Catherine A. Buchard, who died last August at 489 Herkimer St., Brooklyn, left an estate valued at \$50,000. A clause in the will, which was made on January 9, 1896, and was filed for probate yesterday, said the domestic was made the beneficiary because Mrs. Buchard's daughter, Cora Josephine, had left her in 1878 to become a sister in an order of the Protestant Episcopal Church against her mother's wishes.

The daughter was regarded as dead because nothing had been heard from her since her departure. The estate goes to Miss Anderson during her lifetime, and at her death is to revert to Daniel D. Whiting, son of ex-Mayor Whiting of Brooklyn, who was Mrs. Buchard's counsel.

Mrs. Buchard's will was drawn in the office of Almet F. Jenks, now presiding Justice of Appellate Division. Justice Jenks said last night he recalled the will, but he did not remember under which it was prepared and signed. He was unable to say whether the daughter of Mrs. Buchard was still living.
