#### SAYS HE WAS A SPY.

Young German Gives Himself Up to Police at Windsor.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 31.-Conscious-stricken, Anton Gaus, aged 23 years, who gave himself up to the immigration authorities declaring that he intended to enlist with the third Canadian contingent for the purposes of spycertain United States German consuls, with whom he says he entered into compact to carry out certain specific instructions. The youth is held waiting instructions from the military authorities.

Gaus speaks seven languages and says he left Germany four years ago to escape conscription. He resided in Chicago until recently, when, urged by his parents, decided to join, if possible, the Canadian troops.

Last week he tried to enter Canada, but was stopped by the Sar nia officials. He says he then decided to go to Windsor, and make a clean breast of the whole affair.


