## THIRD ADVANCE ON WARSAW DEFEATED

London, Dec. 31.—The third German advance on Warsaw has been definitely checked. The enemy has suffered great loss, failing to break through the Russian lines. The Austrians in the Carpathians are now in full retreat. Official dispatches say that the Austrian army in Galicia is struggling in disorderly retreat through the Carpathian Mountains.

## THREE SCANDINAVIAN MONARCHS HOLD MEETING

The belief is widespread in Europe that the recent meeting of the Kings of Sweden, Denmark, and Norway is of great international significance, and that significance is factitiously enhanced by the fact that ever since the separation of Norway from Sweden nine years ago there have been strained relations between the two countries. The meeting was the outcome of a sense of common danger and a pledge of future co-operation in meeting it. The danger is made manifest by Germany's ideas of contraband and neutrality, but it lies much deeper than these; the fear of the Scandinavian peoples formerly was a dread of Russia, but since the ruthless destruction of Belgium it has become a dread of Germany.

There is no other part of Europe in which British people have a deeper interest than they have in Scandinavia. The Scandinavians—Danes and Norsemen—played an important part in the early history of what we now call the British Islands. The three countries are separately and collectively curiously mixed up with the United Kingdom dynastically. The Queen-Mother of Great Britain is the aunt of the King of Denmark and King George is his cousin; the King of Norway is his brother and the Queen of that country is his cousin. The Crown Prince of Sweden is the son-in-law of the Duke of Connaught, and there are still other relationships.

For centuries, until recently, the histories of the Scandinavian countries have been very much jumbled together. Sweden was part of the Kingdom of Denmark until 1523, and since that date it has been independent, and has during most of the time been the dominant Scandinavian power. From 1317 to 1814 Norway was part of the Kingdom of Denmark, but it became separated as the result of the Napoleonic wars. Denmark had allied herself to Napoleon, and the kingdom suffered partition on his downfall.

Norway was simply transferred to Sweden, but she never frankly accepted the subordinate position, although she was allowed a certain amount of political autonomy. The persistent agitation for separation culminated in a peaceful but not friendly dissolution of the tie between Norway and Sweden, and the Norwegians chose in 1905 as their new King Prince Charles of Denmark, whose name is now Haakon VII. The complete reconciliation between the peoples and rulers of the three kingdoms will gratify all who are interested for any reason in maintaining the individuality of the small States of Europe.

## In the Letter Box

Editor, The Daily News.

Sir—Next Sunday has been appointed by royal proclamation, "A day of humble prayer and intercession to Almighty God on behalf of the cause undertaken by our Empire and our allies, and of those who are offering their lives for it, and for a favorable and speedy peace that shall be founded on understanding and not hatred, to the end that peace shall endure."

In forwarding an official copy of this proclamation the Under Secretary of State writes: "It is the desire of the government that this proclamation should be given due consideration by all church and collegiate and other institutions in Canada and that it should be complied with, so that all Canadian people may unite on the day appointed for the solemn purpose directed by the proclamation."

In England before the day was finally fixed upon the Archbishop of Canterbury communicated with the heads of other churches, both Roman Catholic and Protestant, and received an assurance that their Churches would take part in the observance of such a day of National Intercession.

In Canada the Archbishop of Rupert's Land as Primate of the Church of England has issued a letter to all the bishops under him, and I have endeavored to communicate with all our clergy in this diocese in regard to a proper observance of this day. As the time has been so short to prepare the minds of the people scattered throughout Northern British Columbia for such a solemn day, I ask your permission to publish this reminder.

What could be more appropriate than that on the first Sunday in the New Year all our churches of all denominations should be crowded with devout worshippers anxious not only to get right with God themselves and so make a good start, but also to further through the mighty power of prayer the cause of a righteous and abiding peace.
