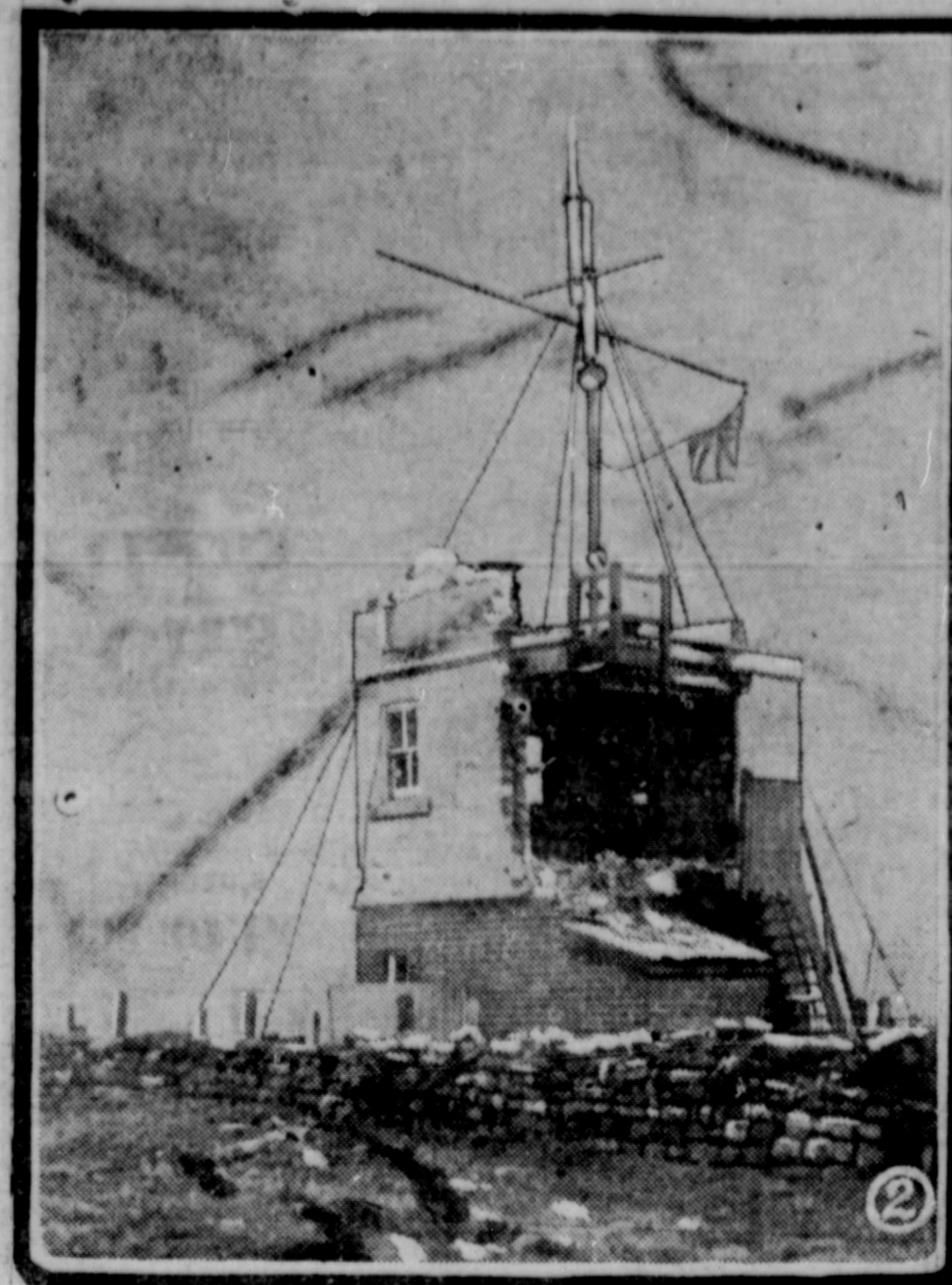

**THINKS KING ALBERT MAY RULE FRENCH**

France Might Establish a Monarchy Says H. M. Martin, of Edmonton, After War.

Edmonton, Alta., Jan. 9.—A striking and somewhat unusual address was given here at the meeting of the North Alberta Patriotic Fund, by H. Milton Martin, who has just returned from a trip to France. Mr. Martin was formerly president of the Edmonton Board of Trade. He said he would not be surprised if, as the outcome of the war, the republican form of government in France were discarded and a monarchy established, with King Albert of Belgium on the throne. While in Paris, he stated, he heard this discussed in cafes, on the street cars, and everywhere he went. The royalists were of the opinion that the elevation of one of their own countrymen would cause too much of a commotion, and that an outsider would therefore better fill the bill.
