A letter from the local agents of the Canadian General Electric Company informed the Council last night that the long-lost generator of the hydro-electric was now in Toronto and was being tried out and would soon be delivered.

Authority was given by the Council to advertise for an official weigher for the city scales, with strict instructions to limit it to one insertion. They didn't say whether they wanted a discount in the price.

The city at present is only using about one-sixth of the electric plant's capacity and the electric superintendent is getting data to determine whether it is not possible to sell power to the citizens for heating purposes. It would cost little extra to run the plant at full capacity.
