INTERESTING NEWS FROM LOCAL CORPS

Willows Camp, Jan. 13.—(Special Correspondence)—The detail of reforming the 30th Battalion from eight companies and a base to four double companies (the latter from the East Kootenay District) will hereafter be known as No. 2 Company, 30th Battalion. There have of course been changes in the personnel of both commissioned and non-commissioned officers. The full strength of the new double company is 227. The officers are Captain C. W. Peck, in command, and Lieutenant D. Moore, second. Mr. Morton, who was in charge of the old base company, is now lieutenant for No. 4 Platoon, Mr. Lee for No. 2 Platoon, Mr. MacKenzie for No. 3 Platoon and Mr. Locke for No. 4 Platoon. The non-commissioned officers of the new double company are: Company Sergeant Major J. E. 


