TO MAKE GOVERNMENT PARTY TO COLLAPSE OF DOMINION TRUST

Discussion on Financial and Land Matters Taking Place in the Provincial House.

Victoria, Jan. 21.—Though it is planned by the government that the present session of the Legislature shall be short, that no new legislation will be enacted save that touching upon the introduction of a partial moratorium, it is likely that before adjournment the eleven years' truce so far as debate is concerned will be broken.

Dominion Trust Company's affairs will be aired during the coming week and it is promised that the government will be openly charged with having been a party to many of the late W. R. Arnold's activities leading up to the collapse of the company.

Depositors Are Busy. The depositors in the Dominion Trust, not as an organization, have a strong lobby at work in Victoria and with the two members from Nanaimo, Messrs. Parker Williams and John Place, are stated to have enlisted the support of at least two members of the government party. Nanaimo depositors to the number of nearly 200 waited upon the representatives from that city and have urged them to proceed with a request for a thorough and impartial enquiry into the affairs of the Dominion Trust and the relations of members of the government thereto.

Mr. Alex. Lucas, member for Yale, will introduce the new agricultural bill some day next week. The chief feature of this is said to be that the farmers will be given cheap money. It is said that a plan has been worked out whereby 4 per cent will be charged bona fide farmers for money for land clearing and building.

Possibly owing to the financial situation the public accounts were not brought down today immediately following the official opening of the session as is customary. It is pointed out that this is the first time that this custom has not been observed since 1899.

Due by Speculator. What to do with the speculator is one of the problems likely to be discussed upon the floor of the house. Holders of large areas of farm lands who have made the first payments thereon have brought pressure to bear upon the government to release them from further liability and allot them clear titles to land to the value of the money paid in, allowing the balance of the land to revert to the Crown.

This matter has been considered by the executive and it is stated that owing to the position of the province, much money having been borrowed on the assumption that the \$13,000,000 or more owing upon Crown lands was liquid asset, it would be impossible for the government to release the speculators.

SAYS WESTERN CANADA CONTAINS OIL FIELDS OF IMMENSE VALUE

Belief Expressed by Cunningham Craig That Petroleum Will Be Discovered and Produced Profitably

London, Jan. 26.—The prospective oil fields of western Canada, formed the subject of an interesting paper read by Cunningham Craig tonight to the members of the Institute of Petroleum Technologists.

Of the various groups of western Canada which had been tested he stated that three, known as the Edmonton series, the Belly River beds and the Dakota-Koolenay had shown distinct signs of oil bearing sands. There was also valuable evidence pointing to the possibility of oil fields being discovered in the eastern foothills of the Rocky Mountains, which might be called the Calgary field.

It might be in the prairie territory, in the Sweet Grass country or in the much-criticized Calgary field, or one of its unexplored northern extensions, but he believes that there is petroleum in these great territories and that it would be discovered and producing profitably at no very distant date.

ADVANCE OF TURKS MET BY BRITISH BOMBS

Cairo, Egypt, Jan. 27.—Skirmishes occurred east of El Qantara, Egypt, with the advance guard of the Egyptians. The losses are one officer and four men slightly wounded. Detachments of Turkish troops were sighted at three points east of the Suez Canal but no fighting resulted except at El Qantara. British seaplanes dropped bombs on the Turkish forces near Biernurhadad inflicting losses.

"CALL US SERBIANS," SAYS SERBIAN LEGATION

Present Spelling is Offensive to the People, Meaning "To Serve."

London, Jan. 27.—The Serbian legation in London has addressed a letter to the press and public, urging the adoption of the spelling "Serbian" and "Serbia," instead of "Servian" and "Servia."

"The latter spelling," says the Legation spokesman, "is highly offensive to our people, mainly because it suggests a false derivation from the Latin root, 'to serve.' It is a source of hidden pain to Serbians to see that some journals persist in using the corrupt forms."

BEER BARRELS USED IN NEW WAR TRICK

Cand Filled, They Make Successful Rolling Barricade for Hungarians.

Budapest, Jan. 27.—For more than four months the Hungarian troops have been fighting in Serbia. They had to face there an exasperated enemy and insurmountable difficulties, rocky mountains and field fortifications blocking the way of advance. At last, however, ingenuity has discovered a means of dislodging the Serbians from their strong positions. Sand filled beer barrels as rolling trenches and mobile protection against the enemy are the latest surprise of the war.

The Japanese in their war against Russia carried with them sandbags which advancing infantrymen pushed before them for protection against the bullets of rifles or machine guns. The barrel answers this purpose much better, as it can be rolled forward with comparative ease and convenience.

The "Baka," that is, the Hungarian infantryman, fills the barrel with sand, gravel, or broken stones used for road making. Barrels thus filled are impenetrable to bullets. The men on the firing line crawl ahead and roll the barrels with their heads.

Once at the position assigned to them they stand the barrels up and fire from behind or between them.

This rolling trench proved a signal success in Serbia. It not only diminished the losses in dead and wounded, but owing to its mobility made quicker progress possible.
