## CANADIAN WOMAN CHARGED WITH HIGH TREASON.

Mrs. Emil Nerlich, prominent Toronto society woman who, with her husband, a wealthy toy dealers, is charged with conspiracy to high treason in connection with giving assistance to a young German officer to leave Canada. Mr. and Mrs. Nerlich are now await- ing trial and are on bail of \$150,000.

## IMENTO DIES, GLAD THAT HIS END HAD ARRIVED

Seattle, Feb. 23.—Richard Im- ento, the crippled section hand who shot and killed Charles O. Dryden and mortally wounded R. E. Patton in the office of the claim agent of the Northern Pacific Monday week, died at the city hos- pital shortly after 2 o'clock yester- day afternoon. Informed by attending physicians shortly be- fore noon yesterday that his end was near, Imento smiled and said that he was glad.

Imento was shot six times by the police officers in a furious battle with the police after he had shot Dryden and Patton and forced Miss Vera Lockhart to jump out of a second-story win- dow into the arms of pedestrians. Despite his serious wounds, Imento remained conscious until the end. Thursday night shrdlu the end.

## COOK PORK TO A BROWN.

American Habit Saves Many Lives, Says Dr. Ransom.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—Trichinosis is more prevalent than is sup- posed, Dr. B. H. Ransom, zoolo- gist of the Bureau of Animal In- dustry at Washington, said last night in addressing a meeting of the United States Live Stock Sanitary Association. He said the American habit of cooking pork to a brown turn saved many lives each year, as this disease came from eating the flesh of hogs without sufficient cooking to kill the parasite.

## DE WET PLANNED AFRICA REPUBLIC

Bloemfontein, S. A., Feb. 24.—The formation of a republic to in- clude all the possessions of Eng- land in South Africa was the ob- ject of the recent Boer uprising led by General Christian De Wet. This information was contained in testimony produced at the trial of De Wet and others who are charged with treason. According to the plans of the leaders, De Wet and his followers were to go to Kimberley to meet Lieutenant Colonel Maritz, then the rebels were to march to Pretoria, where the British flag was to be hauled down and the Boer flag raised. General Hertzog and Premier Botha were to be compelled to resign and a republic proclaimed.

## TREASON CHARGE REDUCED.

Toronto Couple Now Accused of Conspiracy to Commit in- dictable Offence.

Toronto, Feb. 24.—Chief Jus- tice Mulock has reduced the high treason charge against Emil Ner- lich, a prominent wholesale mer- chant in Toronto, and his wife, Ludwig Nerlich, to conspiracy to commit an indictable offence, thus removing the death penalty if found guilty.

The Crown counsel outlined the case to the jury, in which he spoke of Mrs. Nerlich as an en- thusiastic German sympathizer who wrote letters to Germany, one of which was reprinted in a Berlin paper.

In replies received by her en- queries were made as to the num- ber of soldiers Canada had to send to the front.

Overseas Company will parade at the Exhibition Building on February the 24th and 25th at 10:30 a. m. Men absent without permission will be struck off the strength of this company.

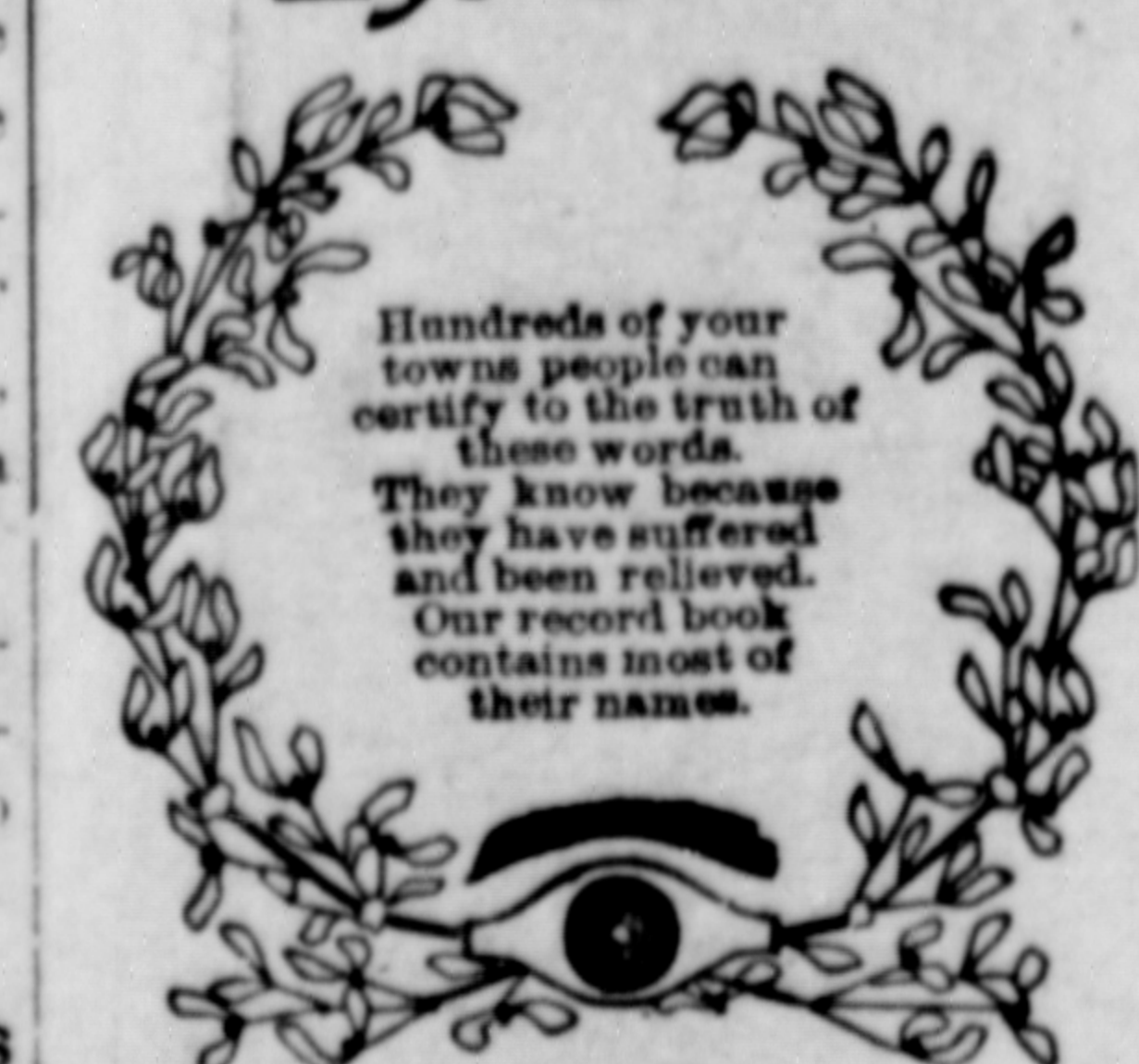
The company will parade on Friday morning, February 26th, at the Exhibition Building at 9 o'clock sharp, for embarkation for Victoria.
