MAYOR AND MORRISSEY MAY BE DISQUALIFIED

he. The incorporation of his company had elapsed some time ago but at that time he had transferred it to his wife. He had never used his office to get business for himself and had let the advertising go to all the papers in the regular way.

Alderman Montgomery, as a member of last year's Finance Committee, said he understood the Mayor's company was incorporated and therefore entitled to city patronage. He was satisfied the Mayor had not used underhand methods in getting business.

Alderman McClymont said that when he entered the Council the city clerk told him he would have to incorporate his business or drop the city insurance he carried. He decided to drop the insurance. Why was it that the Mayor was not so informed? He took no responsibility in the matter as he thought all along the Mayor's company was incorporated.

Alderman Morrissey told how his partner made a small sale to the city jail of \$30 without his knowledge. He had never sought city business, nor induced any city employee to give him his trade. One of the city cheques to his firm was endorsed by him, but his partner frequently got city cheques through an interest he has in a boat which the city hires. His partner had told him the cheque in question was one of these.

All the aldermen appeared to be opposed to criticising the matter; and although they would likely have to comply with the law in the matter, they were inclined to be charitable as far as possible. It was decided to have the city solicitor report on the matter at the next meeting.

It appears that there is a heavy penalty attached to a mayor or alderman doing business with a city while he holds office, and, besides this, becomes thereby disqualified if the charge is found true.

Alderman McClymont asked that the city solicitor also probe certain rumors afloat to the effect that certain aldermen were using their influence to secure business for merchants interested.

Alderman Morrissey seconded this, as he said otherwise the charge might reflect on him. He courted the fullest investigation.

Pierre Loti, the well known French author, has asked permission to rejoin the French navy and serve in the Dardanelles.

LIST OF EXPENSE FOR MONTREAL TRIP

The Mayor has apparently tried to mislead the public in the matter of the cost of his trip. The following statement, presented last night, amounts to only \$743.20; but that is only the Mayor's share, and, as the whole trip cost about \$2,000, it must be that it was Dan who bought the wine.

The Mayor is certainly no ascetic—at least, away from home. His living expenses amounted to \$8.50 per day, and an additional \$4 per day for his room.
