W. J. BOWSER CANNOT BE ELECTED IN VANCOUVER

DUTCH STEAMER CAUGHT SUPPLYING SUBMARINES

London, April 1.—The source of supplies of the German submarines is believed to have been discovered by the capture today of the Dutch steamer Lodewijk Van Brecht off Brighton. Destroyers intercepted the vessel, which tried to escape and had to twice be threatened with being fired upon. She carried a cargo of fuel oil and carried papers. Most of her crew were Germans.

BOYS FEAR ATTACK FROM BULGARIANS

AMIR DEFEATS SOLDIERS.

Three other men are in a hospital at Mena, suffering from injuries as the result of falls from the big pyramid. One has so injured his back that he will have to be carried back to Austria on a water bed and remain on his back for the rest of his life.

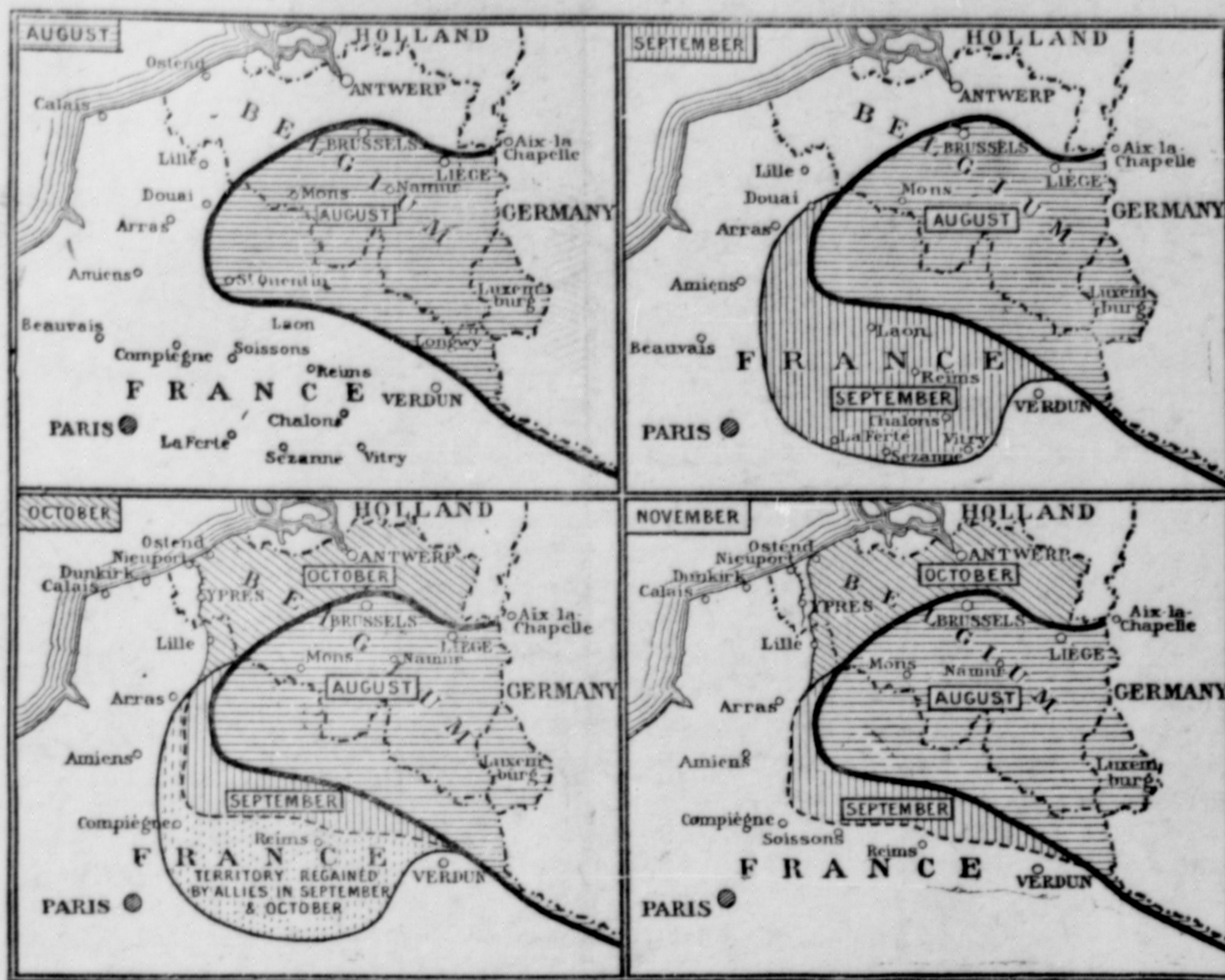

BOWSER WAS AGAIN HOWLED DOWN-- REFUSED HEARING AT HIS OWN MEETING

Meeting Was Called in Labor Temple to Discuss Workmen's
Compensation Act and Disorder Kept up for
Two Hours--McVeity is Called
"Traitor" and "Skunk"

Vancouver, April 1.—W. J. Bowser was howled down again last night in a Vancouver meeting. He had called the meeting to discuss his Workmen's Compensation Act. It was called to meet in the Labor Temple and all the workmen in the city were invited to be present.

Long Uproar.
After the meeting was called to order it was evident that Mr. Bowser could not get a hearing. A terrific uproar was conducted by those present and although he continued the attempt for two hours the disorder prevented him being heard.

J. H. McVeity, one of the labor candidates, who attempted to speak, also met a similar fate to Mr. Bowser, being called a "skunk" and "traitor" from the audience.

Can't Elect Bowser.
This recent event makes it more certain than ever that Bowser cannot be elected in Vancouver. This is the second time that he has been howled down and refused a hearing. He received the unanimous nomination at the convention because it was "packed" by his friends, evidently believing that it might restore public confidence, but last night's meeting, and a Conservative meeting at that, shows that all the decent Conservatives in Vancouver are opposed to his boss rule.

PREMIER M'BRIDE IN TROUBLE-- NO HELP COMES FROM OTTAWA

LEFT OTTAWA FOR NEW YORK ACCOMPANIED BY J. W. STEWART IN INTEREST OF HIS C. N. R. RAILWAY DEAL.

Ottawa, April 1.—Premier Mc-Bride, after a brief conference here with Sir Robert Borden, left for Montreal and New York, in company with Railway Contractor Stewart. It is understood Sir Richard could get little satisfaction from Premier Borden as to Federal help in getting him out of his financial and railway troubles in British Columbia. He has gone to New York to see what arrangements can be made there for a loan for railway projects.

On his return here later this week the political trouble in British Columbia will be taken up more fully with Sir Robert. Rogers and Burrell are here and a proposition has been made to let McBride succeed Roche in the cabinet, the latter becoming a third civil service commissioner and Burrell going to the Senate with Bennett coming into the Cabinet to take his place. These changes are, however, meeting with considerable objection from various quarters. Premier Borden does not seem very anxious to have McBride come into the Federal arena until the cloud has been lifted from him in British Columbia. (Continued on Page Four.)

EXCELLENT FUTURE BEFORE GRANBY CO.

E. A. Hagen, editor of the Mining and Engineering Record, writing in the Vancouver Province, has the following to say about the Granby company at Anyox:

"This company is about to mark another important step in the development of its operations on the Coast by the addition of another furnace to its Anyox smelter. This will make a total of four furnaces. At present the plant has a capacity of 2,000 tons a day, but only two furnaces have been maintained in blast. The new furnace will increase the capacity to between 2,500 and 3,000 tons a day. Such a plant, on the ore reserves developed at Hidden Creek mine, should produce at least 30,000,000 pounds of copper a year. Six furnaces are running at the company's Grand Forks smelter, and it is not intended to blow in more at present, so that two furnaces at that plant remain idle. With the new furnace at Anyox, the production of the two plants will amount to about 50,000,000 pounds of copper per annum.

Although the copper content of the ore in the company's Phoenix mines is now only about sixteen pounds per ton, the Grand Forks smelter is operated so economically that copper is produced at a cost of about 10 1-2 cents per pound, giving a profit of about 4 cents per pound on the present price of copper. At Anyox, on the other hand, copper is being produced under 8 cents per pound, giving a profit of about 6 1-2 cents per pound. A leading Eastern financial journal states that on these figures the future of the Granby company ranks among the most valuable copper investments on the continent. The company has also raised the wage scale of its employees to the rates prevailing before the war. When it is considered that by April the company will be mining and smelting 50,000 tons of ore a month, the immense progress being made in copper mining in this province is evident."

C. P. R. AGENT CAUGHT AFTER YEAR'S SEARCH

San Francisco, Cal., April 1.—Benjamin F. Aiken, formerly a C. P. R. agent and inspector of telegraphs at Rogers Pass, B. C., has been arrested in Jamestown on a charge of embezzling \$7,000 on fraudulent time checks. He has been pursued since March, 1914. His seven associates were previously arrested.

AVIATOR MADE ATTACK ON ROYAL FAMILY

Cettinje, April 1.—An Austrian aviator made another attempt today to destroy the royal family of Montenegro. Flying high, he dropped seven bombs. Four civilians were wounded; two may die. None of the royal family was injured. The aviator escaped.

KAISER SAVES TREASURES.

Orders Removal of Pictures From Threatened Castle.

Geneva, April 1.—The German Emperor has ordered the removal to Berlin of valuable paintings and tapestries from his mountain castle at Koenigsberg, on the Alsation side of the Vosges Mountains.
