HOW STEEL NETS CATCH SUBMARINES

New York, April 14.—There is reason to believe that reports of submarines being caught in nets, and either captured or destroyed, are true. Rumors that the British Admiralty has designed a protective netting to guard against submarines have been in circulation since the announcement of the German blockade. Lately, these reports have become more persistent.

The most important fact, pointing to a confirmation of these reports, is in the Admiralty having refused to announce the particulars of the destruction of submarines. The fact is the Admiralty has reason to believe a submarine has been lost.

The English newspapers print no details and considering that England is most interested in the destruction of submarines, only pressing strategic reasons could cause particulars to be withheld.

That the details are suppressed to mystify Germany and create a feeling of uncertainty among the submarine commanders is unquestionable. It does not follow that the mystery and uncertainty is created by nets, but it is most probable that a Jules Verne imagination is not required to anticipate the preparation of nets.

Steel Nets Are Used.

In using the nets the object is to entangle the propeller of a submarine and hold the vessel fast and helpless on the bottom of the sea. A fishing net will not damage the propeller. Nets with small steel meshes from ten to fifteen feet square are used, several being sunk together at intervals. They are anchored to the river bottom, the upper end being buoyed thirty or forty feet below the surface. They must be this distance below the surface to escape detection, and also to prevent craft from fouling them.

When the submarine plunges, the net slides along the bottom of

the boat until the propeller is reached. The screws then draw in the meshes and the submarine becomes a captive from its own efforts. If the anchorage of the netting is not secure, the submarine probably would rise, but only to float helplessly on the surface. If the anchors hold, the crew of the submarine must release a distress buoy to the surface in token of surrender. If the buoy is observed, divers may cut the anchors and permit the submarine to rise. Otherwise the crew must pay the penalty.
