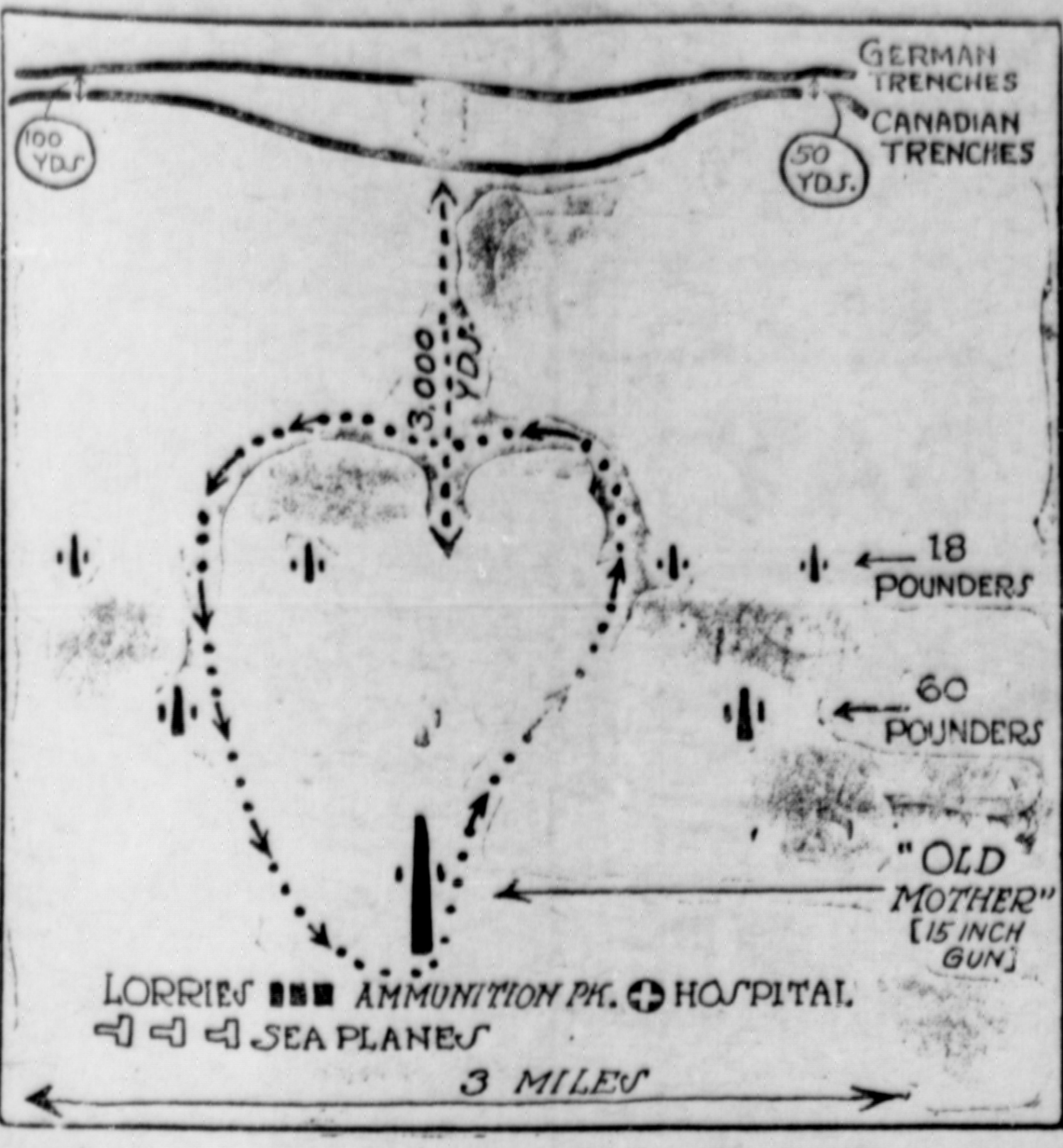

### PRESIDENT HAS NO OPINION TO GIVE ON WORLD WAR

Washington, April 14.—In a speech before the Maryland annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in session here, President Wilson said it was his belief that no man was wise enough to pronounce judgment on the European war at this time.

"But," he added, "we can all hold our spirits in readiness to accept the truth when it is revealed to us in the outcome of this titanic struggle."

The President reminded the delegates that in transacting the business of their Church they were like the men in charge of the nation's government, in reality, handling "the phases of the day."

### Sees Ideal Beneath It.

"These are days of very great perplexities, when a great cloud of trouble hangs and broods over the greater part of the world. It seems as if great blind material forces had been released which had for long been held in leash and restraint. Yet, and underneath it, you can see the strong impulses of great ideals.

"It would be impossible for men to go through what men are going through on the battlefields of Europe and struggle through the present dark night of their terrible struggle if it were not that they saw, or thought they saw, the broadening or light where the morning should come up and believed that they were standing each on his side of the contest for some eternal principle of right.

### Tribunal of World's Opinion.

"Then, all about them, all about us, there sits the silent, waiting tribunal which is going to utter ultimate judgment upon this struggle, the great tribunal of the opinion of the world; and I fancy I see, I hope that I see, I pray that it may be that I do truly see great spiritual forces lying waiting for the outcome of this thing to assert themselves, and asserting themselves even now, to enlighten our judgment and steady our spirits.

"No man is wise enough to pronounce judgment, but we can all hold our spirits in readiness to accept the truth when it dawns on us and is revealed to us in the outcome of this titanic struggle."

### ONE HONEST MAN AND WHAT HAPPENED

Seattle, April 14.—Whether a broker, wholesaler or merchant, in selling a box of strawberries on the representation that it contains a pint measure when in reality it holds more than a pint, but is sold at no additional cost, is causing an infraction of the city ordinances and is liable to arrest, is a question which Police Judge Gordon will have to decide.

The question arose in the case against Benton F. Pearce, manager of the Produce Distributors Company, of 63 Madison Street, who was arrested by J. P. Worden, an inspector in the weights and measures department, on charges that he violated the provisions of the ordinance which governs the weighing and measuring of all commodities.

Alpheus Byers, attorney for Mr. Pearce, contended that if a merchant wanted to give a customer a little extra measure he was not violating the law.

Worden contends that, although the purchasers are not being swindled when they receive an excess in measure, the official sanction of such a proposition will result in there being scores of different sizes of boxes on the market, with no set standard, which is in violation of the law.

Pearce said that he was acting as a local distributing agent for a Texas firm. His boxes are 3 3/10 inches bigger than the local standard of 37 cubic inches.
