Record of Borden Govt.

Statistics submitted to Parliament show the appaling outrages that have been committed in the Canadian Civil Service since the Borden Government took charge, and notwithstanding Mr. Borden's prior election speech at Halifax, N.S., in which he said:

"To use the power of filling positions in the public service as a reward for party service and without regard to the character and capacity of the individual selected is a gross breach of a solemn public trust. . . A private trustee so dishonoring his office would be subject to punishment by the criminal law."

Yet this same Mr. Borden, now a noble Knight, in the first three years in office dismissed 5,094 Civil servants, compelled 7,994 to resign—a total of 13,093—and replaced them with -not an equal number-but with 25,613, and that in a time when Canada should be retrenching and not increasing expenditure. The following shows where the dismissals and appointments were made: 138 were dismissed from the Department of Agriculture, and 579 put in their place; Customs lost 465, and gained a help of 1,649, increasing the cost of collecting Canada's revenue from \$2,187,000, in 1911, to \$3,-849,000, in 1914; 145 immigration officers were dropped, and 343 put in their place in spite of the fact that immigration has dropped off since 1911; the Department of Justice dismissed 142 of their staff, and appointed 258; the Postoffice "fired" 772, and took on 3,312; 4,495 postmasters were dismissed; in the inner service of the Public Works Department 125 replaced 28, going some even for Bob Rogers; in the outer service 1,208 were got rid of, and 1,877 put in their place; in the Inland Revenue Service 292 replaced 122; the Finance Department dismissed 29 and hired 199; the I. C. Railway, supposedly out of politics, had 1,132 fired, and 2,076 put in their place.

Surely a government that is guilty of such corrupt practices is not worthy of public confidence. This also explains why Canada's expenditures sprang from \$88,000,000 odd in 1911 to \$127,000,000 in 1914 and \$140,000,000 in 1915, which is altogether apart from the cost of the war.
